Background

Since 1998, the Compendium of Cultural Policies & Trends in Europe (www.culturalpolicies.net) has been run as a joint venture between the Council of Europe and the European Institute for Comparative Cultural Research (ERICarts), in collaboration with independent national experts and specialists from over 40 governments in Europe. Now fully established and recognised as the unique information and monitoring system in its domain, a transfer of responsibilities into more hands has been agreed upon by all stakeholders, including the Steering Committee on Culture, Heritage and Landscape (CDCPP) of the Council of Europe at its last session in May 2017: At the end of 2017, the partnership between the Council of Europe Secretariat and the ERICarts Institute in the management and editorial supervision of the Compendium will be replaced by a new, expanded governance structure in the form of an association under Dutch law that remains open to future accessions of stakeholders.

The 16th Assembly of Compendium Experts held in Prague under the Council of Europe Chairmanship of the Czech Republic will be the public starting point for this new Compendium "architecture", most probably including debates and decisions about the future **division of main responsibilities** within the new organisation as well as about **content priorities after 2017**. The Council of Europe and ERICarts, both representing the legacy and intellectual property of the Compendium, will continue to have a special role as the Founding Members of the new association.

During the last two decades, the Compendium contributed substantially to both policy making and research or documentation projects in Europe and beyond, in addition to being regularly used as a source of information by tens of thousands of individuals in Europe and worldwide. This successful performance would not have been possible without its **community of independent experts** and their professional work at "arm's length" from funders and other stakeholders. These experts, many of them represented by the European Association of Cultural Researchers e.V. (ECURES), have been involved in the development phase, including at the last meeting of stakeholders and experts in Cyprus, March 2017. In the new structure, they will keep their essential role as independent experts at the heart of the association. This could become even more important, should the new organisation be able to carry out additional projects or move, at a later stage, towards a European Research Institute Consortium.

In line with the tradition of previous Compendium Assemblies, there will also be a **Public Forum** on Friday the 10th November organised in cooperation with the Arts and Theatre Institute Prague that will focus on the "Role and mission of National Cultural Institutions in the context of the 100th Anniversary of the Birth of Nation-States in Central and Eastern Europe".

The walk "From story to story" - walking through old Prague in the footsteps of Franz Kafka

Walk through old Prague in the footsteps of Franz Kafka and see the traces he has left everywhere in the town, much as Prague has left in him. This mutual influence can be seen in his writings – the places where he lived, his experience and his observations are all present in his writing. The walk "From story to story" aims at showing the different aspects of Kafka prose and gives examples of short pieces of his work inspired by particular places in the Old Town, and noted by him in his diaries, letters or as stories and fragments.

Guided visit of the National Gallery in Prague

The Medieval Art exhibition in Bohemia and Central Europe is housed in the Convent of the Poor Clare nuns, which is one of the oldest examples of gothic architecture in Czech Republic. It was founded in 1231 by St Agnes of Bohemia and her brother Václav I, the Bohemian King.

The exhibition on the first floor traces the development of Czech art from the panel paintings and sculptures of the 13th century to the beginning of the 16th century. Vyšší Brod and Třeboň altarpieces, panel paintings by Master Theodoric, St Vitus Madonna or St Peter of Slivice are the most important masterpieces from the 14th century and around 1400 when Bohemia and Prague were significant European art centres.
