



Adapting and validating the initiative based on youth requirements and feedback.





Synergies with the Legal bodies

- Penal Law and its article 58 for the year 1937
- Child law 126 for 2006- article 116 bis: criminalizes with hefty penalties use of computerS, internet, intranet, or cartoon to commit or instigate exploitation of children in prostitution or pornography even if the crime does not actually take place.
- NCCM child helpline 16000 network is legally acknowledged as protection mechanism
- The telecom act 10 for 2003
- The e-signature law 15 for 2004
- The IPR law 82 for 2002
