- I am delighted to welcome you to this meeting on behalf of the Council of Europe.

For this, we as an intergovernmental institution rely on the Charter on education for democratic citizenship and human rights, which provides us with a clear framework and mandate for action. We need to demonstrate – in a very tangible way – that international cooperation in this area does have an added value, and does have a real impact on the education policy and practice in our countries. And it is only together with all of you that we can achieve this goal.
- Today we face very critical challenges in Europe, be it the consequences of the economic crisis, or the rise of the extreme parties, or the events in Ukraine. I/We believe that Education for democracy plays an important role in addressing these challenges. We need to deliver tangible results, both in short and in the long term. And we need to make sure that this work is very visible, and that makes a positive and lasting change in our countries.
