# Eastern Partnership – Cooperation against Cybercrime (CyberCrime@EAP)

### Launching conference

#### **BACKGROUND**

The Project on Cooperation against Cybercrime is one of four projects under the Eastern Partnership Facility of the European Union and the Council of Europe. The project has a duration of thirty months, a budget of Euro 724,040 and it is implemented by the Council of Europe. Countries participating in the Eastern Partnership are Armenia, Azerbaijan, Belarus, Georgia, Moldova and Ukraine.

The specific project purpose is to strengthen the capacities of criminal justice authorities of the Eastern Partnership countries to cooperate effectively against cybercrime in line with European and international instruments and practices.

It started on 1 March 2011 with a three-month inception phase. This phase will be marked by the launching conference on 30 and 31 May 2011 in Tallinn, Estonia, organised in cooperation with the Estonian Ministry of Justice.

#### **CONFERENCE OBJECTIVES**

The launching conference will discuss effective measures against cybercrime and is aimed at the following:

- To exchange views on strategic priorities regarding cybercrime and electronic evidence
- To discuss the themes covered under this project which represent essential elements of strategies against cybercrime
- To adopt a workplan of the project
- To confirm the establishment of working groups in each country with which the project shall cooperate in the implementation of activities.

#### **PARTICIPANTS**

Each country is invited to appoint four participants representing:

- 1. Ministry of Justice (dealing with criminal and procedural legislation and the implementation of international treaties)
- 2. Ministry of Interior or police (specialised in high-tech crime) and 24/7 Points of Contact
- 3. The Office of the Prosecutor General (specialised in cybercrime or economic and organised crime)
- 4. A body responsible for the coordination of cybercrime/cybersecurity policies and strategies (if applicable).

The cost of participation of the representatives of these institutions shall be covered by the Council of Europe.

Policy- and decision-makers from Ministries of Justice and Ministries of Interior and offices of the Prosecutor General from each project country are encouraged to attend the event in order to express their views on priorities regarding the fight against cybercrime and their support to the project. The cost of their participation will not be covered by the Council of Europe.

Representatives of relevant institutions from Estonia and other European Union countries as well as international and private sector organisations are invited to participate at their own cost.

The working languages of the conference will be English and Russian.

This launching conference will also serve as the first project Steering Committee Meeting.
