- ICTA Legal division has been working closely with the Cyber Crime Division of the Council of Europe over the years and we are delighted by the recent announcement made by the Council of Europe inviting Sri Lanka to join the Budapest Cyber Crime Convention.
- I am told that this international conference and Sri Lanka's inclusion as a priority country of the Council of Europe Project "Global Action on Cyber Crimes" (GLACY), are a direct result of Sri Lanka being invited to be part of this very important global Convention.
