# Some conclusions

#### General

There is a good case for further development in EDC/HRE in the six countries of the partnership

This case is based on what EDC/HRE has the potential to deliver (a) in societal terms, (b) in wider benefits.

The case studies of pilot projects show that further development is not only a theoretical but also a practical possibility.

There already exists a pool of good practice in each country on which to build.

Lessons learned from 6 years of school-based local projects stimulated by the Summer Academies

#### Lessons from the pilot projects

Partnership working – youth organisations (Georgia)); university (Belarus); parents (Az) Role of non-formal youth education (Georgia) Role of young people's participation in the education process (Moldova) Role of school leaders (Armenia) Starting where people are – (questionnaire- Ukraine) Bottom-up, grass roots approach – like-minded volunteers (All)

#### Reminders

School is real life – not a game Democracy is a mindset Power of the 'hidden curriculum' (Jackson, 1968)

EDC/HRE is just as important as rest of the curriculum – professional competencies/ training opportunities/ assessment

## Challenges

Lack of resources in local languages Resistance to the concept Going beyond the group of like-minded volunteers Embedding in school practice so it feels normal Introducing real and difficult issues – not just the easy ones An effective form of democratic school governance Getting others on board – parents, funders, authorities Building a coherent curriculum – key concepts re-visited in ever-more complex ways in different phases of education (continuity and progression) Going beyond 'numbers '/ ticking boxes - building in quality Strategic planning – school level – school development Co-ordination, monitoring, evaluation – school level

### New opportunities

Council of Europe tools – piloting programme National curriculum or strategy reviews/ revisions Relevance of active citizenship skills and outlook to employability and national prosperity Introduction of global competencies into national PISA assessments Share & Connect platform/ European Wergeland Centre – alumni networks -linking
