### Introduction

The report provides information required by the European Committee of Social Rights in the event of non-conformity for lack of information in the Conclusions 2013 relating to the thematic group health, social security and social protection.

### ECSR:

The Committee concludes that the situation in Slovenia is not in conformity with Article 12§4 of the Charter on the grounds that:

• equal treatment with regard to social security rights is not guaranteed to nationals of all other States Parties;

•equal treatment with regard to access to family allowances is not guaranteed to nationals of all other States Parties;

•it has not been established that the retention of accrued benefits is guaranteed to nationals of all other States Parties;

• it has not been established that the right to maintenance of accruing rights is guaranteed to nationals of all other States Parties.

#### Article 12§4 - Social security of persons moving between States

The Government of the Republic of Slovenia explains that equal treatment in respect of social security rights is ensured to all migrants from the EU Member States and to the nationals of the countries with which Slovenia concluded bilateral agreements on social insurance.

Bilateral agreements on social insurance are concluded with all former republics of the Socialist Federal Republic of Yugoslavia from which the majority of migrant workers come from.

Taking into account immigration trends the following activities were undertaken by the Slovene Government from 2011 till today:

1. In 2013, the National Assembly adopted an incentive to conclude an agreement with Turkey. Negotiations are planned to start in the first half of 2015.

2. In 2013, the Ministry of Labour, Family, Social Affairs and Equal Opportunities (Ministry) gave an initiative to the competent authorities of the Russian Federation to study the possibility of concluding a bilateral agreement on social security. In 2014, the Ministry received the reply from the Embassy of the Russian Federation to the Republic of Slovenia that Russian Federation is interested in concluding a bilateral agreement and that the competent Russian authorities will contact the Ministry.

Bilateral agreements with the following countries: Albania, Andorra, Armenia, Azerbaijan, Georgia and Moldova are currently not planned as the migration from these countries is very limited or does not exist. In case of bigger migration flows from these countries the Ministry will consider concluding new bilateral agreements on social security.
