Abridged report (06/12/2013) CDMSI (2013)011

The Steering Committee on Media and Information Society (CDMSI) met in Strasbourg on 3-6 December 2013. The meeting was chaired by Andris Mellakauls (Latvia). The agenda is to be found in Appendix I.

During the meeting, the CDMSI took the following decisions:

For Committee of Ministers' decision

Draft Declaration of the Committee of Ministers on the protection of journalism and safety of journalists and other media actors

- <u>it finalised</u> the draft text and <u>agreed</u> to submit it to the Committee of Ministers for adoption (appendix II);

the Russian Federation made the following statement: "The Russian Federation has to place formally on record that while it supports the main ideas of the Declaration on the protection of journalism and the safety of journalists, the Russian Federation considers it necessary to disassociate itself from using the term "other media actors" which has no basis in binding international legal documents. The Russian Federation does not consider that the use of the term "other media actors" in the Declaration can be interpreted even in the form of recommendation, as giving any special legal status to bloggers, human rights defenders, whistle-blowers or "others who perform public watchdog functions", as well as to the so-called "new media", which is merely a tool for certain individuals to exercise their right to freedom of expression. The problems of the protection and safety of the mentioned category may be discussed and regulated separately. The Russian delegation draws the Committee's attention to the fact that the Declaration is applicable only in the measure of its compatibility with the Russian Federation's Constitution, federal legislation and international treaty obligations and has no influence on positions that the Russian Federation may take on the issue, both in the Council of Europe and in other fora."

Draft Committee of Ministers' Recommendation to member states on a Guide on human rights for Internet users

Draft explanatory memorandum to the draft Committee of Ministers recommendation on a Guide on human rights for Internet users - <u>it examined, amended and finalised</u> the draft recommendation, <u>took note</u> of the explanatory memorandum, and <u>invited</u> the Secretariat to finalise it on the basis of discussions during the meeting and <u>agreed</u> that the appendix of the draft recommendation should include a reference to it in a footnote;

- and in the absence of a quorum for approval towards the end of the meeting, <u>it</u> <u>agreed</u> that comments on the draft recommendation and/or the explanatory memorandum could be sent by e-mail to the Secretariat by 16 January 2014. In the absence of any reactions the draft recommendation and the explanatory memorandum will be considered as approved by the Plenary and will be transmitted to the Committee of Ministers (GR-H) for consideration with a view to possible adoption (appendix III);

For information

- <u>it took note</u> of the information provided by Jan Kleijssen, Director of Information Society and Action against Crime, and held an exchange of views with him on the Committee of Ministers Declaration on risks to fundamental rights stemming from digital tracking and other surveillance technologies, on the Recommendation on gender equality and media, and on the adoption of the Council of Europe budget for 2014 and 2015;

- it <u>discussed</u> the critical situation of resources in the Media and Information Society Department and <u>expressed</u> serious concern about the lack of resources in the Media Cooperation Unit and the Media Division., While recognising the growing importance of internet governance, it <u>insisted</u> that supporting that line of work with resources should not be carried out at the expense of media issues;

- <u>it stressed</u> that, under the current circumstances, it might not be possible to give meaningful follow up to the outcomes of the Ministerial Conference in Belgrade;

- responding to proposals by Jan Kleijssen, it <u>decided</u> that in each of its future meetings, a specific agenda item should offer member States the possibility to report on their implementation and dissemination of adopted standards at domestic level ;

<u>Media</u>

- <u>it held an exchange on</u> the thematic debate on 12 December 2013 on the "Safety of journalists – Further steps for the better implementation of human rights standards", <u>noted</u> that it would be streamed via internet and <u>met</u> the Austrian Permanent Representative, Ambassador Rudolf Lennkh who, as chairperson of the Committee of Ministers, will moderate the debate;

- <u>it took note</u> of the Conference of the Council of Europe Gender Equality Commission, organised in partnership with the Ministry of Education, Culture and Science of the Netherlands on *"Media and the image of Women"* (Amsterdam, 4-5 July 2013), of a report by the members of the CDMSI who attended it, and of the Council of Europe Gender Equality Strategy 2014-2017, and <u>agreed</u> that the incoming Bureau of the CDMSI should consider closer co-operation with the Gender Equality Commission; - <u>it took note</u> of the Conference *"The hate factor in political speech – where do responsibilities lie?"* (Warsaw, 19-20 September 2013) and <u>agreed to establish contact</u> with ECRI, the Secretariat of the campaign "Young People Combating Hate Speech Online" and all other relevant Council of Europe bodies for a possible follow-up;

Council of Europe Conference of Ministers responsible for Media and Information Society (Belgrade, 2013)

- <u>it thanked</u> Serbia for hosting the conference and for their hospitality;

- <u>it noted</u> that following the Secretary General's presentation of the conference report on 10 December 2013, the Committee of Ministers would decide on actions for the CDMSI's work for the coming years which would have to be prioritised, taking due account of available resources;

Protection of journalism and safety of journalists

- <u>it took note</u> of an exchange of letters between the UNESCO and the Council of Europe on possible co-operation between both organisations on safety of journalists issues and <u>held an exchange of views</u> with Guy Berger, Director of the Division of Freedom of Expression and Media Development of UNESCO (FEM); it <u>noted and supported</u> the proposal to set up a joint steering group including the OSCE and to finalise arrangements concerning this project by exchange of letters;

- <u>it took note</u> of the report by the Chairperson of a conference organised by Access Info on "Transparency of Media Ownership" and <u>discussed</u> the issue;

Draft Declaration of the Committee of Ministers on the protection of journalism and safety of journalists and other media actors

5 December 2013

Draft Declaration of the Committee of Ministers on the protection of journalism and safety of journalists and other media actors²

(Adopted by the Committee of Ministers at the **the meeting of the Ministers' Deputies)

- 1. Journalists and other media actors in Europe are increasingly being harassed, intimidated, deprived of their liberty, physically attacked and even killed because of their investigative work, opinion or reporting. These abuses and crimes are often met with insufficient efforts by relevant state authorities to bring the perpetrators to justice, which leads to a culture of impunity.
- 2. This alarming situation is not exclusively limited to professional journalists and other traditional media actors. As the United Nations Human Rights Committee in its General Comment No. 34³, and other intergovernmental bodies have recognised, the scope of media actors has enlarged as a result of new forms of media in the digital age.⁴ Those at risk also include others who contribute to shaping public debate and persons performing journalistic activity or public watchdog functions.
- 3. The right to freedom of expression, to receive and impart information, ideas and opinions without interference is guaranteed by the European Convention of Human Rights (article 10) and constitutes one of the fundamental principles upon which a democratic society is based. The public watchdog functions of the media are crucial for upholding these rights and for the protection of all other human rights. Misuse of power, corruption, discrimination, criminal activity and human rights violations have come to light as a direct result of the work of investigative journalists and other media actors. Making the facts known to the public is essential for redressing such situations and holding to account those responsible.
- 4. Journalists and others who perform public watchdog functions through the media are often in a vulnerable position vis-à-vis the public authorities or powerful interests groups because of their role in informing the public and provoking debate on issues of public interest. Obstacles created in order to hinder access to information of public interest may not only discourage journalists and other media actors from fulfilling their public watchdog role,⁵ but may also have negative effects on their safety and security.
- 5. Attacks against journalists and other media actors constitute particularly serious violations of human rights because they do not only target individuals but deprive others of their right to receive information, thus restricting public debate, which is at the heart of pluralist democracy.

² The Russian Federation made a reservation concerning the CM draft Declaration specifically denying its application to "other media actors" as the Russian Federation considers this term to be unspecific and without any basis in binding international legal documents.

³ Journalism is a function shared by a wide range of actors, including professional full-time reporters and analysts, as well as bloggers and others who engage in forms of self-publication in print, on the internet or elsewhere, and general State systems of registration or licensing of journalists are incompatible with paragraph 3. Limited accreditation schemes are permissible only where necessary to provide journalists with privileged access to certain places and/or events. Such schemes should be applied in a manner that is non-discriminatory and compatible with article 19 and other provisions of the Covenant, based on objective criteria and taking into account that journalism is a function shared by a wide range of actors.

- 6. The European Court of Human Rights has held that the role played by journalists in a democratic society confers upon them certain increased protections under Article 10 of the Convention. The exercise of media freedom, including in relation to matters of serious public concern, also involves duties and responsibilities. The safeguard afforded by Article 10 to journalists in relation to reporting on issues of general interest is subject to the proviso that they are acting in good faith in order to provide accurate and reliable information in accordance with the ethics of journalism'.⁶
- 7. The European Court of Human Rights has established that states are required to create a favourable environment for participation in public debate by all persons, enabling them to express their opinions and ideas without fear.⁷ To do this, States must not only refrain from interference with the individual's freedom of expression, but are also under a positive obligation to protect their right to freedom of expression against the threat of attack, including from private individuals, by putting in place an effective system of protection.
- 8. Eradicating impunity is a crucial obligation upon States, as a matter of justice for the victims, as a deterrent with respect to future human rights violations and in order to uphold the rule of law and public trust in the justice system.⁸ All attacks on journalists and other media actors should be vigorously investigated in a timely fashion and the perpetrators prosecuted. The effective investigation of such attacks requires that any possible link to journalistic activities is duly taken into account in a transparent manner.
- 9. A favourable environment for public debate requires States to refrain from judicial intimidation by restricting the right of individuals to disclose information of public interest through arbitrary or disproportionate application of the law, in particular the criminal law provisions relating to defamation, national security or terrorism. The arbitrary use of laws creates a chilling effect on the exercise of the right to impart information and ideas, and leads to self-censorship. Furthermore, prompt and free access to information as the general rule and strong protection of journalists' sources are essential for the proper exercise of journalism, in particular in respect of investigative journalism.⁹
- 10. Surveillance of journalists and other media actors and tracking of their online activities can endanger the legitimate exercise of freedom of expression if carried out without the necessary safeguards and can even threaten the safety of the persons concerned. It can also undermine the protection of journalists' sources.
- 11. In view of the foregoing, the Committee of Ministers
- alerts member states to the increasing number of reports of attacks on journalists and other media actors in several parts of Europe, including specific dangers female journalists are faced with. These constitute attacks on the right to freedom of expression, to hold opinions and to receive and impart information and ideas and to other fundamental rights provided for in the European Convention on Human Rights;
- commits itself to facilitating the development of internet-based platform drawing on information supplied by interested media freedom organisations to record and publicise possible infringements of the rights guaranteed by Article 10 of the European Convention on Human Rights
- urges member States to fulfil their positive obligations to protect journalists and other media actors from any form of attack and to end impunity in compliance with the European Convention on Human Rights and the case-law of the European Court of Human Rights; and to review at least once every two years the conformity with these obligations on the part of member States;

- encourages member States to contribute to the concerted international efforts to enhance the protection of journalists and other media actors, by ensuring that legal frameworks and law enforcement practices are fully in accord with international human rights standards. The implementation of the UN Plan of Action on the Safety of Journalists and the Issue of Impunity is an urgent an vital necessity;
- will intensify its standard setting and co-operation activities for the protection of journalism and the safety of journalists and other media actors as a priority and contribute expertise to other international organisations with regard to the particular competence of the Council of Europe;
- will consider further measures to ensure the protection of journalists from threats and acts of violence as well as measures to eradicate impunity; and alignment with the European Convention on Human Rights of laws and practices concerning defamation, anti-terrorism and protection of journalists' sources;
- will address the specific challenges and threats that women journalists are confronted with in the course of their work.
