The Bureau is invited to take note of the information contained in this document and, if applicable, give guidance to the Secretariat as to the implementation of the work programme for 2018-19.

CDCPP work programme 2018 – 2019 based on its Terms of Reference

	Terms of Reference
0.	Under the authority of the Committee of Ministers, in the framework of the European Cultural Convention, building notably on the outcomes of relevant ministerial conferences, and having regard to the Secretary General's reports on the State of Democracy, Human Rights and the Rule of Law and the relevant decisions by the Committee of Ministers, the CDCPP will oversee the Council of Europe's intergovernmental work in the field of culture, heritage and landscape, and advise the Committee of Ministers on all questions within its area of competence. Taking due account of relevant transversal perspectives, the overall aim is to share information on policy, exchange best practice and develop standards as appropriate relating to culture, heritage and landscape in States Party to the European Cultural Convention and other relevant Conventions. With this purpose, the Committee is instructed to:
1.	(i) contribute to the Council of Europe's key values, especially to fostering democracy, through its work in the fields of culture, heritage and landscape, and act as a forum where States share information and good practices, devise and follow-up innovative policies and strategies related to the sustainable management of culture, heritage and landscape and contribute to the promotion of intercultural dialogue;
1.1 Culture	<p>Modalities: Council of Europe Platform Exchanges on Culture and Digitisation Timeframe: 2018-19</p> <p>Expected outcomes: Policy inspirations, exchange on good practices and Council of Europe guidelines and Recommendations to member States on addressing the challenges and opportunities related to the digitisation of culture.</p> <p>Beneficiary(ies): Member States of the Council of Europe (and other States signatory to the European Cultural Convention).</p> <p>Current situation:</p> <p>Four Platform Exchanges on Culture and Digitisation held as multi-stakeholder events between 2014 and 2017 (Baku, 2014; Linz, 2015; Tallinn, 2016; Karlsruhe, 2017) proved to be inspirational and productive work settings. Debates held between cultural policy makers, practitioners, artists, researchers and the interested public generated material for three Council of Europe recommendations (CM/Rec(2016)2 on the Internet of citizens, CM/Rec(2017)8 on Big Data for Culture, literacy and democracy, and a forthcoming Recommendation on Culture's contribution to strengthening the Internet as an emancipatory force. In 2018-19, two further Platform Exchanges are envisaged. Pending resources, the 2018 event will take place on 12-13 October in Rijeka, Croatia (in the framework of the Croatian Presidency of the Committee of Ministers of the Council of Europe) and dealing with the topic of Artificial Intelligence and implications for culture and creativity. Details of the 2019 Platform Exchange will be defined later in 2018. Several countries and institutions have expressed interest in hosting the event.</p>

In 2018, three new activities will be launched to celebrate the Year and set the basis for its legacy beyond 2018, mainly two new funding schemes for communities (Call for European Stories) and countries (support to cross-frontier events), as well as focus on the youth and children through the European Heritage Makers Week storytelling experience.</p> <p>In 2018, there are six specific Programme Objectives:</p> <p>Objective 1: National and regional 'European Heritage Days' events are organised within one weekend, week or month. The Meeting aims to present experiences of public policies adopted, or being developed, concerning the implementation of Article 6 c. of the European Landscape Convention on *education*, according to which "Each Party undertakes to promote: ... *school and university courses* which, in the relevant subject areas, address the values attaching to landscapes and the issues raised by their protection, management and planning".

It states that the Convention "applies to the entire territory of the Parties and covers natural, rural, urban and peri-urban areas. *It includes land, inland water and marine areas*. It concerns landscapes that might be considered outstanding as well as everyday or degraded landscapes".

¹ The Association of the Compendium of Cultural Policies and Trends (CCPT) had its official launch on 9 November at the 16th Assembly of Compendium Experts, organised within the framework of the Czech Republic Chairmanship of the Committee of Ministers of the Council of Europe. As part of this launch, the CCPT’s first General Assembly and first Board Meeting were held. The CCPT has 13 members: Albania, Belgium, Cyprus, Council of Europe, CUPORE (Finland), European Association of Cultural Researchers (ECURES), ERICarts, France, Iceland, Latvia, Romanian National Institute for Cultural Research and Training (Romania), Sweden, Switzerland, Austria, Germany, Lithuania and the Netherlands have made recent enquiries with regard to joining, but have to finalise the legal details of membership. The Netherlands in addition is sponsoring the Association by donating €60 000 to the 2018 budget. The CCPT has a functioning Board of 6 members: Chair – Marjo Mäenpää (CUPORE, Finland), Vice Chair – Siobhan Montgomery (Council of Europe Secretariat), Treasurer – Anna Villarroya (Chair of ECURES Board), Secretary – Jean-Cédric Delvainquière (France), members – Kimmo Aulake (Chair of the CDCPP) and Carmen Croitoru (Director of the Romanian National Institute for Cultural Research and Training). The next Board meeting will be held on 6 April by Skype.

Beneficiaries: Member States of the Council of Europe (50 states signatory to the European Cultural Convention)

Current situation: the Boekman Foundation (Netherlands) shall be the next service provider as from 1 April 2018.

The 2018 workplan shall contain the following main tasks:

- A new methodological grid for the country profiles and comparative statistical tables and the tables for the monitoring and comparisons sections of the website;
- Visual and navigation improvements to ensure that the Compendium remains user-friendly on computers and mobile devices such as smartphones and tablets, as well as in step with mainstream ICT trends;
- Review of the Compendium communication policy, particularly with a view to attracting new members;
- Evaluation and quality control of the Compendium, taking into account the transitional nature of 2018 owing to the change in business and governance model and the change in Service Provider.
- Board meetings will continue regularly throughout this transitional year.

In addition:

- Eurostat has invited the Compendium Association to a meeting on 9-10 April to discuss a possible cooperation on the new Compendium grid;
- a new project manager, Helen Johnson, has been engaged by the Boekman Foundation specifically to work on the Compendium project. She is a bilingual (Dutch/English) communications professional with a background in journalism and reporting on culture and arts. In particular she was an editor for *Kunststof*, the Dutch national public radio programme on arts, culture and media and editor-in-chief for *Nieuwe Liefde magazine*, a quarterly publication on culture, philosophy and politics;
- the Compendium Association will participate at this year's meeting of the European network on cultural management and policy (ENCATC) being held in 26-29 September in Bucharest.

HEREIN Network</p> <p>A first workshop was organised in April 2017 with the participation of both CDCPP members and HEREIN national coordinators to discuss concrete proposals for decisions related to the following topics:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Discussion of the results of the IT Audit commissioned by the Secretariat; • Identification of the core public to be addressed by the HEREIN website; • Re-organisation of the present website to facilitate its usage; • Pertinence of the thematic studies with respect to the HEREIN main goals; • Involvement of HEREIN national coordinators in future developments; • Increase of the coherence of planned activities within the CDCPP's political orientations. <p>Following the decisions on HEREIN taken at the June CDCCP meeting and the confirmation/renewal of National Coordinators, a second workshop was organised in November 2017 to present the new tools available for the HEREIN Network and to define the concrete proposals of activities for 2018 that will include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Completion/revision of the Country Profiles; • Modification of the structure of National reports; • Setting up of thematic workgroups on specific issues; • Development of additional thematic sections in the HEREIN website.
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First meeting of the working group on National Reports

Applying the decision to prioritize the revision of the National Reports, a first meeting was organised in March 2018 to discuss a first draft proposal for a new National Report structure. Aware of the need to facilitate the search for information within the National Reports, significant discussions led to the revision of the initially proposed structure. After consultation and the necessary adjustments, a second meeting will be convened in May to identify the appropriate questions to adequately complete the new version of the National Reports.

II. HEREIN System

The contents of the existing System have been improved in 2017:

- National reports: improved search bar;
- Participative surveys: new survey created for the heritage of historic cableway installations;
- Thesaurus: terms and definitions displayed inside website content;
- HEREIN gardens: improved content;
- Strategy 21: publication of examples – setting up of a search bar.

Launch of a new collaborative space

In order to foster all-year round exchanges between the HEREIN National Coordinators, a dedicated collaborative space has been launched in February 2018 and opened also to interested CDCCP members. The revision of the existing Country Profiles according to a new structure has been developed through the Collaborative Space. A participative survey on restorers' regulations is also currently active on the Collaborative Space. Finally, discussions on the specific topics to address by the two additional working groups planned have been launched.

Preparation of a new HEREIN website

A revamped version of the HEREIN website developed in 2017 to increase the attractiveness of the website for all stakeholders will be launched in mid-2018, incorporating in particular:

- a more attractive layout and content structure;
- the revised version of the country profiles;
- an improved thesaurus section;
- a revised version of National Reports (pending the adoption of a new structure).

The Council of Europe expert also continues to provide technical assistance to the national coordinators in order to resolve any technical issues and to develop the necessary modifications in the HEREIN website.

<p>3.3 Landscape</p>	<p>Modalities: European Landscape Convention Information System of the Council of Europe</p> <p>Timeframe: 2018-2019</p> <p>Expected outcomes: To provide mutual technical and scientific assistance through the collection and exchange of landscape experience and research, as provided for in Article 8 of the Convention.</p> <p>Beneficiary(ies): Member States of the Council of Europe and, in particular, 38 States Parties to the European Landscape Convention.</p> <p>Current situation:</p> <p>European Landscape Convention Information System of the Council of Europe</p> <p>To ensure exchanges of information and monitoring of the implementation of the Convention in the various member States of the Council of Europe, a document setting out the landscape policies pursued in the member States was produced on a regular basis and presented on the occasion of the Council of Europe Conferences on the European Landscape Convention. The use of the European Landscape Convention Information System, set up pursuant to Recommendation CM/Rec(2013)4 of the Committee of Ministers to member States on the European Landscape Convention Information System of the Council of Europe and its Glossary, permit access online to information concerning national and regional policies that have been developed.² Addressed to authorities, organisations or citizens seeking useful information on landscape policies, the glossary has been produced in order to explain certain terms employed.</p> <p>The States Parties to the Convention are invited to make use of this Information System and its glossary in the context of their co-operation, to work together on developing it further and to continue to exchange information on all the matters covered by the provisions of the Convention, in order to promote an awareness of landscapes and the policies relating to them. The national Representative correspondents of the Information System of the Council of Europe European Landscape Convention are invited to update or complete, and validate, this questionnaire by 15 May 2018, with a view to preparing the National Reports on the implementation of the Convention.</p>
