# REPORT

Document by the General Secretariat Cultural Heritage, Landscape and Spatial Planning Division

## **1. Opening of the meeting**

Mr Jean-François SEGUIN, Chair of the Council of Europe Conference on the European Landscape Convention, welcomed the participants (List of Participants in Appendix 1 to this report) and presented the agenda of the meeting (Appendix 2 to this report).

The aim of the meeting organised in two sessions (on 14 January with the participation of the States and Regions and on 17 January with the participation of the Expert), was to finalise the "Template for the Council of Europe European Convention Information System ELCIS (L6)" with a view to presenting it to the 6<sup>th</sup> Council of Europe Conference on the European Landscape Convention (Strasbourg, 3-4 May 2011) and to the 4<sup>th</sup> Meeting of the CDPATEP (4-5 May 2011).

## Background of the activity:

On 12-13 May 2009 [CDPATEP (2009) 20], the CDPATEP adopted the Guiding Principles for a Council of Europe Database on the European Landscape Convention to be implemented by a group of specialists with the task of proposing the machinery to be developed for the European Landscape Convention in parallel to what is already being applied to the cultural heritage conventions.

On 23 September 2009, the Committee of Ministers of the Council of Europe took note of the abridged report of the CDPATEP [CM/Del/Dec(2009)1066].

On 4-5 May 2010 [CDPATEP (2010) 25], the CDPATEP: took note of the report of the 6<sup>th</sup> expert meeting for the establishment of a Council of Europe Information System of the ELC [CEP-CDPATEP (2010) COE/ELC/L6] and of the draft "Template for the presentation of the landscape policies of the member states of the Council of Europe" in preparation; proposed that the Parties to the ELC conduct a trial run of the final version of this template before it is goes online; the delegates of France, the Slovak Republic and Slovenia had already expressed the wish to test this system; asked the Bureau of the CDPATEP to select a number of Parties to the Convention for this purpose on the basis of the proposals received, having due regard to criteria of geographical representativeness and administrative organisation.

On 2-3 December 2011 [CDPATEP (2010) 49], the Bureau of the CDPATEP: took note of progress achieved for the setting up of the Information System of the European Landscape Convention and decided that a number of Parties to the Convention and regions would test the final version of the questionnaire in 2011 before its publication on the Council of Europe website (4 States: France, Portugal, Slovak Republic, Slovenia and 2 regions: Wallonia and Catalonia); and noted the technical co-operation carried out with HEREIN experts and the interest in using a same system.

# 2. Establishment of the Council of Europe European Landscape Convention Information System

The participants examined and amended the first of the two working documents of the meeting (as they appear in the Appendix 3 to this report: First document: "Template information grid for the presentation of the landscape policies of the Member States of the Council of Europe" - *without Article 6*; Second document: Template *on Article 6*) and decided of the calendar of the work process:

- 11 February 2011 (Council of Europe Office, Paris): Work meeting of the two countries (France, Portugal) and regions (Walloon Region and Catalonia) on the revised version of the first documents and on the second document on Article 6 (to be sent by the Secretariat as working documents) in order to prepare a unify the two documents in one version;

- the revised version resulting from this meeting will be sent by E-mail to Mr A. Olivier, as a consultant expert of the Council of Europe so that he can work on it by the second week of March 2011;

- the Secretariat will then send the document received from the expert to the representatives of the four selected States (France, Portugal, Slovenia, Slovak Republic) and two selected regions (Walloon Region and Catalonia) to allow them to test the template;

- 20 April 2011 (Council of Europe Office, Paris): meeting of these selected States and regions in order to possibly adapt the template following the test period;

- 3-4 May 2011 (Council of Europe, Strasbourg): Presentation of the "Template for the Council of Europe European Convention Information System ELCIS (L6)" to the 6<sup>th</sup> Council of Europe Conference on the European Landscape Convention;

- 5-6 May 2011 (Council of Europe, Strasbourg): Decision to be taken by the CDPATEP on the follow-up of the process of the CoE ELC Information System.

#### TEMPLATE INFORMATION GRID FOR THE PRESENTATION OF LANDSCAPE POLICIES IN THE MEMBER STATES OF THE COUNCIL OF EUROPE

#### Prepared by the Secretariat of the Council of Europe and the Landscape Convention Expert Group (25 May 2010)

Article 10.1 of the Convention ensures that the existing competent Committee of Experts (CDPATEP) set up under Article 17 of the Statute of the Council of Europe is designated by the Committee of Ministers of the council of Europe to be responsible for monitoring the implementation of the Convention.

Under the provisions of this Article and of Article 8 (concerning the mutual assistance and exchange of information), the parties undertake to cooperate to strengthen the effectiveness of measures taken and in particular to exchange information on all matters covered by the provisions of the Convention.

Recommendation CM / Rec (2008) 3 of the Committee of Ministers to member states on the guidelines for the implementation of the European Landscape Convention provides that each party contributes to the creation of a database on the Internet site of the European Landscape Convention Council of Europe, which will provide a 'toolbox' to promote technical and scientific assistance through the collection and exchange of landscape experience, work, and research.

As part of this process, CDPATEP has charged the Secretariat and a group of experts to develop an information system on the European Landscape Convention to facilitate the implementation of the main articles of the Convention, by understanding how policies are implemented in practice. Analysis of this information will then help to identify any potential problems and issues and identify appropriate technical assistance through exchange of information, experience and best practice and mutual support programmes to help raise standards.

In its first stage, this information system will focus on the main elements of the Convention:

- Article 1 Definitions of terms protection, management, planning
- Article 6 Specific measures:
  - 6C Identification and assessment,
  - 6D Landscape quality objectives,
  - 6E Implementation,
- Article 8 Mutual assistance and exchange of information;
- Article 10 Monitoring of the implementation of the Convention.

The information system is expected to meet the following objectives:

- enable authorities and the public to access information and experiences relating to landscape protection, management and planning;
- contribute to the monitoring of the implementation of the Convention (Article 10)
- allow Parties who wish to use this information system for national use;
- eventually provide an 'observatory' to analyse and highlight how a rapidly changing society may benefit from caring for landscape;
- facilitate monitoring the development of landscape policies in accordance with the European Landscape Convention;
- maintain and develop cooperative landscape networks and encourage mutual assistance and exchange of 1nformation between parties;
- provide effective information, facilitate the establishment of forums and an interactive data network, and encourage people, especially young people, interested in landscape;
- provide useful information for research and action.

# NOTES

#### 1. Database

It is important to understand that the information grid is not a questionnaire but, when developed, will be the front end to a database; this requires robust, consistent and coherent data that can be easily be compiled and analysed. Many questions are therefore 'closed' ie Yes/No answers, lists with tick boxes, or requiring numeric data – this will allow results to be directly comparable between countries. Where appropriate 'open' questions have also been included which permit free text answers that can further describe, or qualify the data. More general reports can be generated from the free text portions of the information grid.

## 2. Completing the Grid

The grid covers a wide range of aspects related to the implementation of the European Landscape Convention; much of the information required is complex, and it is understood that not all content providers will be able to furnish the relevant data in the form required. There is therefore no requirement or necessity to complete all answers in the first instance. However, the utility of this data in actually understanding, and providing evidence of implementation how implementation actually works in practice, is clear. It is hoped that administrations will see the utility of the data that is requested for their own internal purposes, and begin to consider whether it is possible to collect the relevant information in the form required. In this fashion, it is intended that as the reporting cycle develops the database will become more complete, and give a fuller picture of implementation that at the outset of the process.

#### 3. Answers

Each question is designed to try and gather information that will be useful in helping to understand how the provisions of the ELC actually work in practice. In this sense, because the information grid is not about compliance, there are no perfect questions, and in the same way there are no perfect answers. Content providers should attempt to answer each question as best as they can, with the information available.

## 4. Instructions / Help

When the database is developed, it will be web-enabled so that it can be filled in on-line. For each question it will then be possible to access specific information and instructions related to that question in the form of on-line help.

## 5. Language

The language and phraseology of all the questions will need to be checked for clarity, and by the expert group to ensure that the meaning of the questions is clear and expressed in ways that landscape specialists will understand.

#### 6. Glossary

The information grid will have to be supported by a comprehensive glossary and thesaurus that explain in more detail the specialist terms and words that are use. This is necessary to ensure that the answers are as consistent and coherent as possible.

## 7. FTEs

Staff numbers should be provided in FTEs (Full Time Equivalents).

An FTE of 1.0 means that the person is equivalent to a full-time worker, while an FTE of 0.5 signals that the worker is only half-time (eg two half time workers equals 1.0 FTE).

FTEs provide a consistent method for comparing staff resources (numbers of staff) between different organisations and countries.

#### 8. Stable URLs

Every effort should be made to include stable URLs

#### 9. Definitions

All terms used in te questions will require consistent definitions set out in a 'thesaurus'. The Working Group will need to consider these definitions once the final format/shape of the questions has been agreed.

#### 10. Levels

Questions / groups of questions / combinations of questions drawn from the Grid will need to be answered at different levels (National / Regional / Local / Other [ONG?]); although the data categories remain the same, the way the question is expressed (language) may need to be reformulated or adjusted slightly to avoid confusion between these different levels. The questions set out in the grid (below) are currently formulated for a national response – this could either be at the national state level, or at the level of semi-autonomous units of a federal state (eg Swiss Cantons, Belgian Regions, German Länder etc).

When the database has been developed it is intended that where appropriate, each question will be specifically customised for the relevant level.

#### 11. Lists

The order of the lists and sub-lists may require adjustments in order to reflect logical sequence. This needs to be done once all the questions are finalised.

Article 10.1 of the Convention ensures that the existing competent Committee of Experts (CDPATEP) set up under Article 17 of the Statute of the Council of Europe is designated by the Committee of Ministers of the council of Europe to be responsible for monitoring the implementation of the Convention.

Under the provisions of this Article and of Article 8 (concerning the mutual assistance and exchange of information), the parties undertake to cooperate to strengthen the effectiveness of measures taken and in particular to exchange information on all matters covered by the provisions of the Convention.

Recommendation CM / Rec (2008) 3 of the Committee of Ministers to member states on the guidelines for the implementation of the European Landscape Convention provides that each party contributes to the creation of a database on the Internet site of the European Landscape Convention Council of Europe, which will provide a 'toolbox' to promote technical and scientific assistance through the collection and exchange of landscape experience, work, and research.

As part of this process, CDPATEP has charged the Secretariat and a group of experts to develop an information system on the European Landscape Convention to facilitate the implementation of the main articles of the Convention, by understanding how policies are implemented in practice. Analysis of this information will then help to identify any potential problems and issues and identify appropriate technical assistance through exchange of information, experience and best practice and mutual support programmes to help raise standards.

In its first stage, this information system will focus on the main elements of the Convention:

- Article 1 Definitions of terms protection, management, planning
- Article 6 Specific measures:
  - 6C Identification and assessment,
  - 6D Landscape quality objectives,
  - 6E Implementation,
- Article 8 Mutual assistance and exchange of information;

Article 10 Monitoring of the implementation of the Convention.

The information system is expected to meet the following objectives:

- enable authorities and the public to access information and experiences relating to landscape protection, management and planning;
- contribute to the monitoring of the implementation of the Convention (Article 10)
- allow Parties who wish, to use this information system for national use;

- facilitate monitoring the development of landscape policies in accordance with the European Landscape Convention;
