Challenges when working with radicalised groups

- 'Extreme' by definition
 - very far from agreeing with the opinions of most people
 - situated at the farthest possible point from a center
 - exceeding the ordinary, usual, or expected
 - From Latin *extremus* and *exterus* being on the outside

Challenges when working with radicalised groups

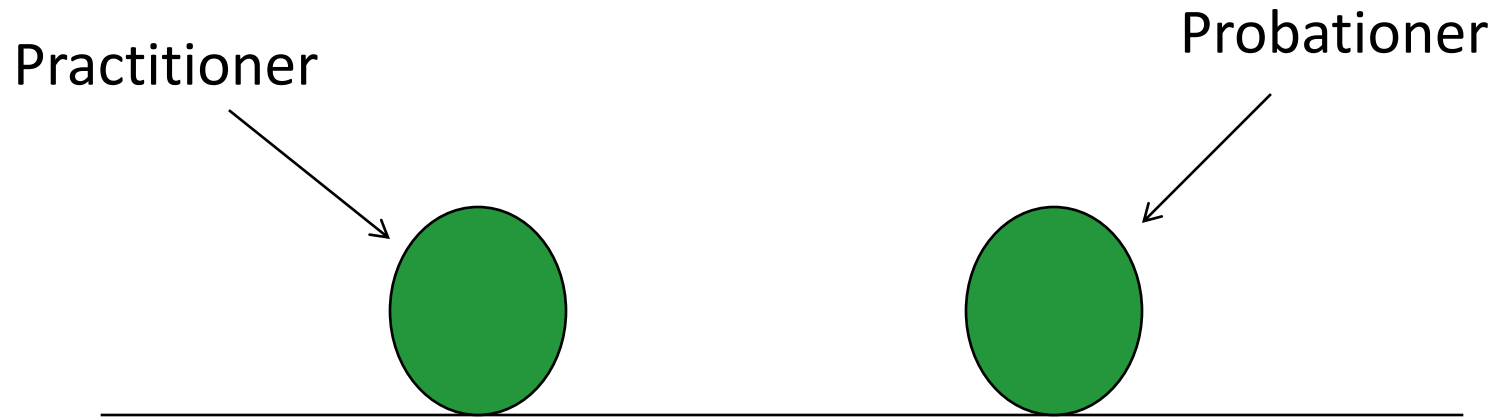
- “There is no consensus on what constitutes success in reforming a terrorist.” (Horgan & Braddock, 2010)
- Unique form of violence and a multidimensional threat. (Rohan, 2012)
- Identity is complex and deep rooted.
- Delegitimizing the ideology requires sustained engagement, counselling, rebutting, refuting, and other counter-ideology measures.



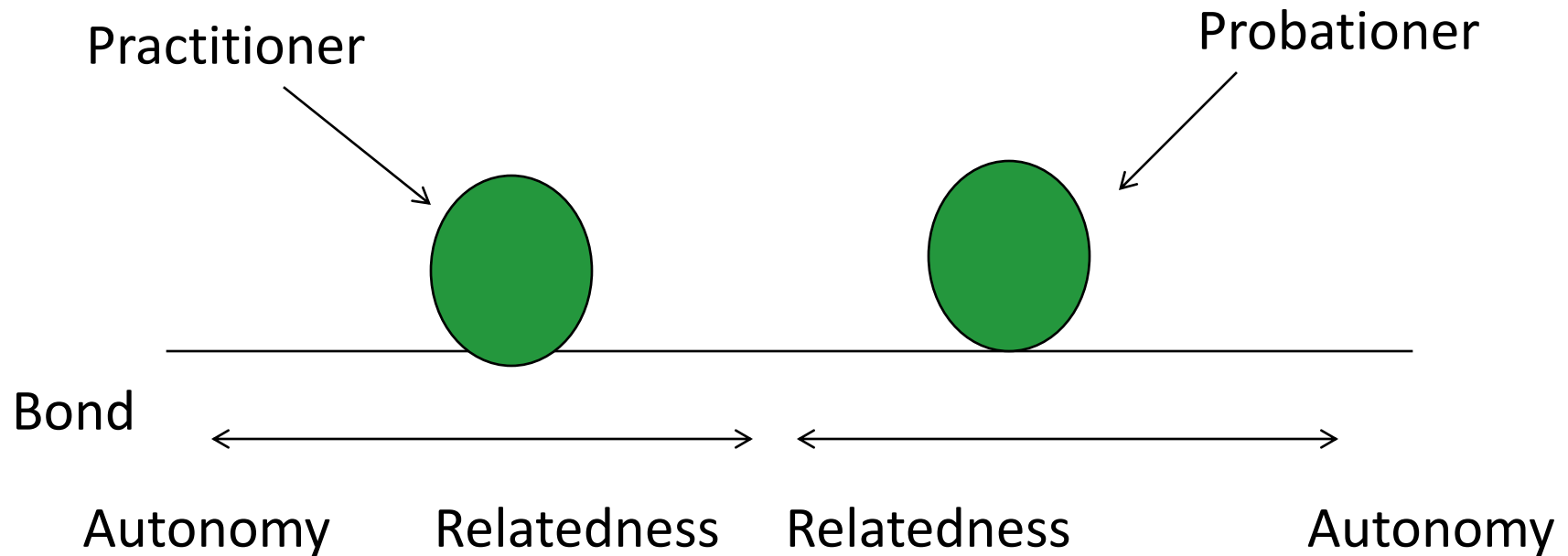

Relationship Tears and Repairs- Ruptures

- Ruptures are temporary tears in a relationship
- They can take place prior to a relationship forming, or once a relationship has developed.
- Little is known about ruptures within Probation practice.
- Ruptures are a normal part of practice-they are dependant on a number of variables.
- Once a relationship tears, it needs to be repaired in order to safeguard the relationship.

■ Boundaries and Duplicity

“Oh yeah, course they’re sly, POs are sly, I’ve been arrested in here [the Probation office] a few times by police, coming for your interview, as if nothing is the matter, through the back door.”

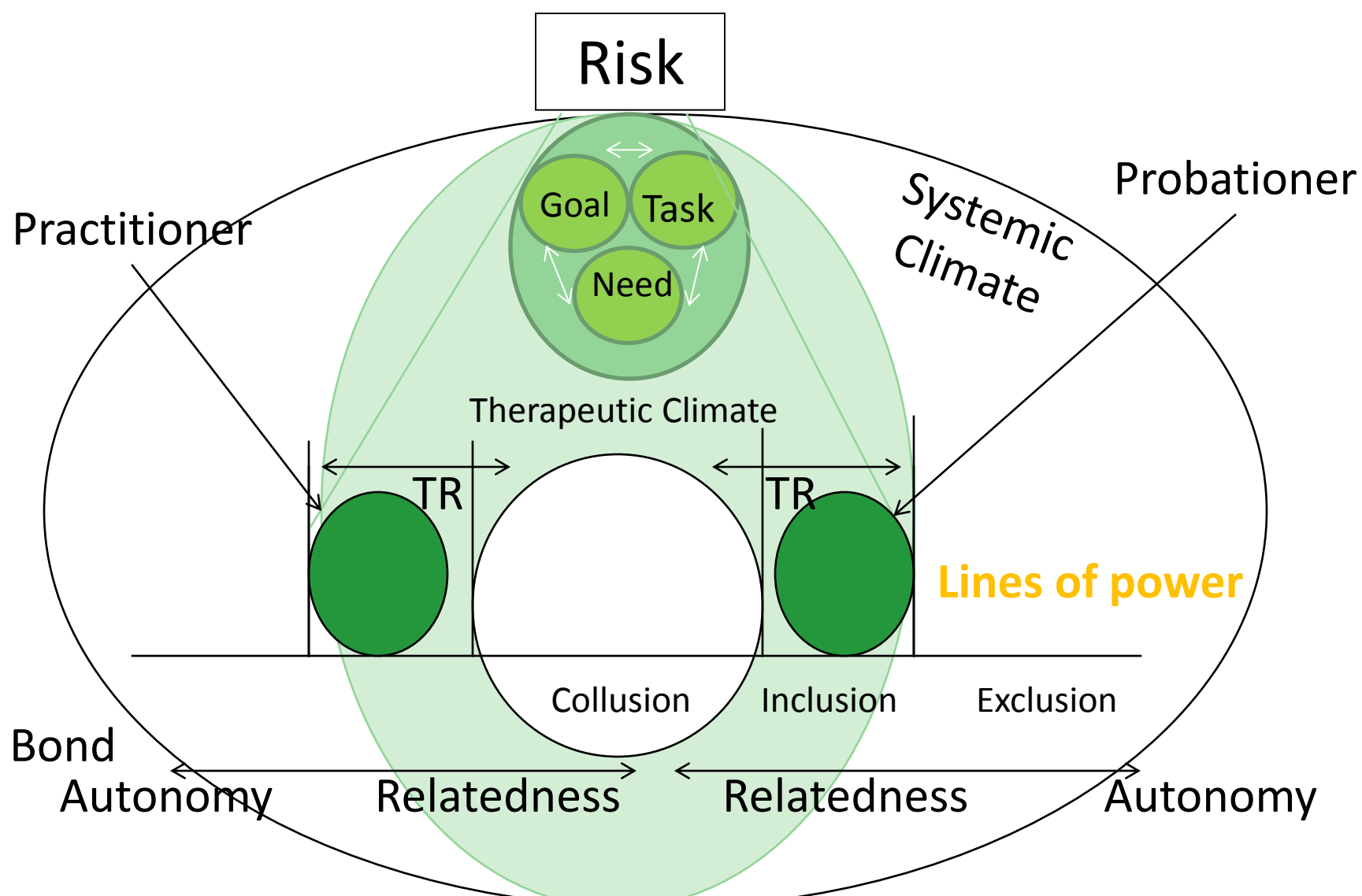


Relational Ruptures

- Boundaries and Duplicity
- **Crossing the line: The visibility of power**
- *“It is nice and woolly, but when you challenge them, it puts that relationship at risk.”* (Probation Officer)
- *“They are very polite, they are very positive, they are very cheerful unless you do something wrong of course and then they are very forthright”.*
(Probationer)



The dynamic model of TCRs and Ruptures



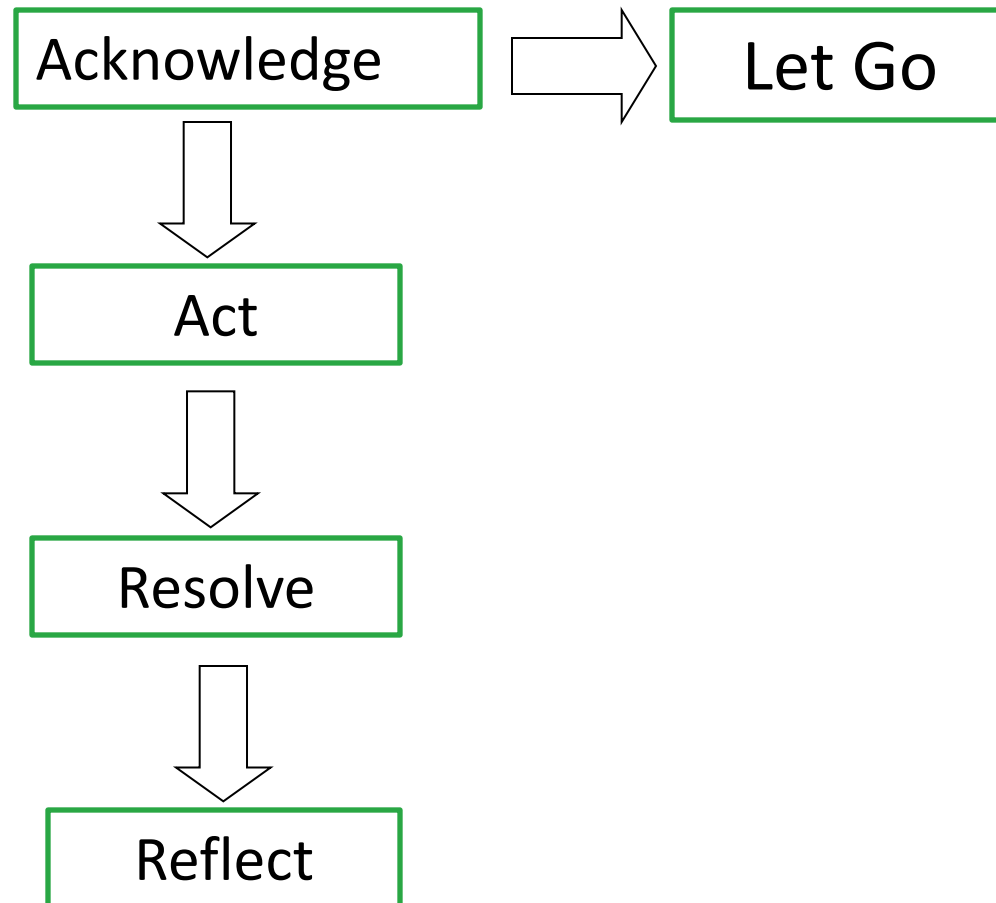

■ Managing Ruptures



Key Messages

- Work with the individual –placing force to encourage movement.
- Work with the practitioner- explore values, fears and anxieties.
- Work with the relationship- here and now working
- Acknowledge constraints of the system-how can these be eased?
- Acknowledge the journey and measures of success

Key messages

- Develop therapeutic correctional relationships to-
 - facilitate change
 - support the processes of letting go and building up new identities.
- Acknowledging and using ruptures to promote growth
- Working on a small scale to increase visibility.
- Looking at processes not outcomes.
