#### Recommendation No. 149 (2010) of the Standing Committee

All Contracting Parties to:

Implement without delay the actions specified in the 'Action Plan for the Eradication of the Ruddy Duck in the Western Palaearctic, 2011–15'

#### **General targets**

- Eradication of the Ruddy Duck in the wild in the Western Palaearctic by 2015
- Phase out all captive populations of Ruddy Ducks, if possible by 2020

#### **Update methods and responses**

- Questionnaire about progress against targets and actions
- 18 answered at least part of the questionnaire
- 10 provided only information on Ruddy Ducks
- 20 no response, notably Denmark, Germany, Ireland



## Prioritisation and responses

1. Regularly held >10 Ruddy Ducks, 2010 to 2016 or where poses major concern for breeding White-headed Duck



2. Held <5 Ruddy Ducks at least once, 2010 to 2016




3. No Ruddy Ducks, 2010 to 2016














## Conclusions & recommendations

- Note extent of control numbers and period to reduce population size

- IAS regulation should ensure compliance

- Perhaps little movement between countries each needs to enact a control programme
- Note extent of control numbers and period to reduce population size
- Concerted programmes, involving year-round effort, are needed
- Additional drive needed to complete task in the UK
- Information gap in Germany, Ireland & Denmark addressed by IAS?
- Information gap on captive birds needs addressing
- Release of captive birds is a potential concern
