# Why the EU supports

#### Principle:

Member states/free legal professions responsible for judicial training

#### Reasons for EU intervention:

- Better implementation of EU law (on fundamental rights: also EU Charter)
- Mutual trust in cross-border cases





#### Why the EU acts

#### Added value of EU intervention

- <u>Dissemination of training material across borders</u>
   E-Justice portal: <a href="https://e-justice.europa.eu">https://e-justice.europa.eu</a>
   (including "Advice for training providers")
   In future: European training platform
- Financial support for cross-border training
- <u>Facilitate the exchange of experiences</u>
   Human rights: connect "HELP in the 28" and the EUI Charter training project







# EU approach to cross-border training

Training content follows the training needs

- Integrate EU law instead of special EU law trainings
- HELP: integrates human rights instead of special Convention training


Joint training activities of participants from different Member States

HELD: icintly developed training material

HELP: jointly developped training material, but mainly national training activities









# EU approach to cross-border training

E-learning: magic bullet or overrated?

- Assess acceptance (age, Member State, profession)
- Interactive (not pdf online)

#### Evaluation of training activities

- Feedback to trainers/experts
- Impact assessment, not only "happy sheets"





# **2017** developments

2017 funding priorities on judicial training: Structure instead of judicial themes

- Create cross-border cooperation structure among training providers for justice professions
- Prepare better recognition of training activities abroad (when training is obligatory)
- Cross-border initial training activities
- Joint study visits to EU courts





# **2017 developments**

2017 funding priorities on judicial training: Structure instead of judicial themes

- Training activities with easy linguistic access
- Training activities for multipliers (such as trainers, EU law coordinators)
- Cross-professional training activities

# **2017 developments**

Prepare new EU training strategy (update of 2011 Communication) – some ideas:

- Tackle gaps (court staff/bailiffs, initial training)
- adjust targets ("5% per year") to the role of EU law today and to the importance of cross-border participation
- address additional professionals (prison and probation staff)
- consider EJTN's "9 principles of judicial training", expand to court staff, monitor
