Outline

Background and justification

The growth in the use and development of information and communications technologies (ICTs) go hand in hand with the rise of crimes committed against or through the use of computer systems. The Council of Europe approach to protect societies worldwide in the cyberspace is based on the development and implementation of the Budapest Convention on Cybercrime, through a suitable programme of capacity building for criminal justice authorities.

Sustainable Judicial Training programmes on cybercrime and electronic evidence are the only effective manner of ensuring that judges, magistrates and prosecutors have sufficient knowledge to fulfil their roles effectively. The Judicial Training approach of the Council of Europe is to empower countries to develop their own programme by providing the first levels of training and then supporting countries as they integrate the available training into their training curricula Judicial Training strategy.

Taking into account its vision and mission, the Judicial Training Institute (JTI) in Accra is best situated to ensure the continuing judicial education for judges and magistrates on cybercrime and electronic evidence.

Expected outcome

Carried out under Objective 3, Result 3 of the GLACY+ project, Judicial Training, the Introductory Cybercrime and Electronic Evidence Training of Trainers Course is expected to establish a group of trainers who will be able to instruct their peers in the introductory skills and knowledge required to fulfil their respective roles and functions in cases of cybercrime and electronic evidence.

This course is based on the training materials developed by the Council of Europe and it has been designed to provide judges and magistrates an introductory level of knowledge on cybercrime and electronic evidence. The course includes legal as well as practical information

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about the subject matters and concentrates on how these issues impact on the day-to-day work of judges, magistrates and prosecutors.

The course will focus on the development of training skills, subject-specific knowledge and trainer-facilitated group activities.

The training skills course together with the Introductory Cybercrime and Electronic Evidence course create a 5 day train the trainers (ToT) course. By the end of this five-day course, the trainees will have basic knowledge of:

- cybercrime and electronic evidence;
- how judges, magistrates and prosecutors can deal with them;
- what substantive and procedural laws as well as technologies can be applied, and
- how urgent and efficient measures as well as extensive international co-operation can be taken.

Participants

Participants should be judges, magistrates and prosecutors aspiring to become trainers for their peers, and to dedicate their time and newly acquired skills to preparing and delivering training at the national level. They should therefore be available to deliver at least one training course in the 12 months following the initial training and to enhance their own skills by taking the second Council of Europe 'advanced' trainer's course.

The Introductory Judicial ToT will be attended by an estimated number of 27 participants, from the Judicial Service, Ministry of Justice and Attorney General, Ghana Police Service, National Security Council Secretariat (NSCS), Economic & Organised Crime Org. (EOCO), Bureau of National Investigations (NBI), National Communication Authority (NCA).
