# Programme

### Background information – reminder:

The present Evaluation Meeting is part of a pilot project under which the Council of Europe Child Participation Assessment Tool (CPAT) has been or will yet be applied in a series of countries in three rounds of application / work cycles:

- Cycle I (2014-2015): Estonia, Ireland, Romania
- Cycle II (2016-2017): Bulgaria, Italy, Latvia
- Cycle III (2018-2019): Finland, Malta, Slovenia

The Evaluation Meeting of July 2018 thus closes the second work cycle by considering and reviewing the CPAT based on the experience of now six countries where different stakeholders have applied the tool in collaboration with national and European experts.

Countries interested in the upcoming third work cycle are also invited to the meeting so as to get acquainted with the methodology, learn from previous experiences and specify their own expectations and needs. A general exchange of views will be aimed at defining the current obstacles and tools required for embedding child participation in various institutional contexts on a sustainable basis. The presentation of good practice from various countries shall be an additional contribution to the discussion and future activities.
