Organisations

The central administration is represented by the Ministry of Culture and its deconcentrated county offices (41 County Directorates for Culture and one for the Municipality of Bucharest). Each county directorate employs around ten persons, almost half of which are administrative: director, chief accountant, secretary, driver. The few heritage specialists (usually only one for historic monuments, one for archaeology, and one for movable heritage

for each county) hardly can cope with the tasks they are supposed to perform: heritage inventory, monitoring, approval of planning projects, export licenses, monitoring of archaeological excavations and surveys, fight with illicit traffic of cultural good, expertise, communication etc. The situation became even worse in the last years: because of low wages and the frozen of jobs in the public sector since 2009, some specialists left and were not replaced. Half of the county directorates lack archaeologists. There is a proposal to transform those county directorates in inspectorates with a more focused task of monitoring the heritage laws in practice. Another proposal is to decentralize them as local administration offices. Unfortunately, the main problem, that of qualified staff for cultural heritage, is neglected.

Advisory bodies of the ministry are the National Commission for Historic Monuments (Comisia Națională a Monumentelor Istorice - CNMI) and its 12 regional commissions, the National Archaeological Commission (Comisia Națională de Arheologie - CNA), and the National Commission for Museums and Collections (Comisia Națională a Muzeelor și Colectțiilor - CNMC). The three national institutes in the field of cultural heritage under the Ministry of Culture (National Institute for Historic Monuments - INMI, CIMEC - Institute for Cultural Memory and the Office for Historic Monuments-ONMI) were merged into a single organization in 2009 and 2011 under the name of National Heritage Institute (INP).

By Emergency Ordinance no. 72/2013 on the reorganization of public institutions under the Ministry of Culture, in force since 06.28.2013, new changes in the structure and responsibilities of the institutions were introduced in an effort to cut further costs: Administration for Historical Monuments and Archaeological Sites is created, as public institution with legal personality under the Ministry of Culture, financed from own revenues and subsidies from the state budget by taking the National Heritage Institute activities relating to the management of historic monuments and archaeological sites.

The National Heritage Institute was reorganized as a result of its division and take over of its activity in the management of historic monuments and archaeological sites by the Administration of Historical Monuments and Archaeological Sites and certification activities in historic monuments by the National Institute for Cultural Research and Training and merge by absorption with the National Center for the Preservation and Promotion of Traditional Culture, which is dissolved.

The National Commission for Historical Monuments (CNMI), 21 members, has 12 Regional Commissions for Historical Monuments (CZMI) with approx. 108 members (9 members each). For details see <http://arhiva.cultura.ro/Documents.aspx?ID=74>

In June 2013, the Ministry of Culture proposed to modify the Law 422/2001 on the protection of historic monuments by Government Emergency Ordinance and to dissolve the 12 Regional Commissions for Historic Monuments. Their activity is going to be taken by the National Commission for Historical Monuments. The draft Emergency Ordinance amending and supplementing Law no. 422/2001 on the protection of historical monuments does centralize advisory activity works for historical monuments and the area of their protection. According to specialists in the field, the approval and monitoring activity risk to be blocked, since there are a total of 26,673 historical monuments and perhaps hundreds of thousands of other buildings in the protection zone.

Regarding the inspection of the physical condition of the historical monuments, the Ordinance provides for the establishment of a "general inspections of the control activity protecting historical monuments." In Romania there are 26,673 classified monuments and thousands of historical monuments with a high potential for classification. At this time in the Ministry of Culture there are 10 employees who manage heritage monuments. A simple calculation shows that the 10 employees should inspect a total of 10 monuments / day, 250 days / year (average days), at an average of 700 km / day. The main reasons invoked for this recentralization are two: 1) the budget of the Ministry of Culture is 39% lower in 2013 than in 2012 and have to reduce spending (but many of the members of Regional Commissions worked for free) and 2) following a modification of the Regulation of the organization and functioning of the Commissions for Historical Monuments, in March 2013, their members are forbidden to have any projects in the field to avoid conflicts of interest.

That caused a mass demission of architects, art historians, restorers and other specialists that were members in those commissions. Professional organizations and experts protested against this extreme measures considering that they have the right to work in their profession and that there are other methods to avoid conflict of interest than forbidding the most prestigious heritage specialists to be members in these commissions. A new National Commission for Historical Monuments was nominated by the Minister of Culture by Order No. 2330 from 13.06.2013 (www.cultura.ro/uploads/files/OMC_2330_13.06.2013.pdf)

The National Commission for Historic Monuments has advisory role for the Ministry of Culture, meets monthly and discusses/approves classification/declassification of historic monuments, interventions to historic monuments, legislation changes and any other matter regarding the protection, conservation, restoration and integration of immovable heritage.

The county and local councils are responsible for the care of cultural heritage in their area. Unfortunately, short term interests in economic development often surpass the interest for protecting and restoring cultural heritage as a source of sustainable development on the long term. For local authorities and population in general, priorities like water supply, roads, new buildings, better services and jobs cannot compete with protecting the remains of the past. In a society on the road of development and reducing the differences in economic standards, cultural heritage is neglected - if not seen as old clothes you would like to change with new ones. Beyond political statements, we cannot speak of a unitary practical approach everywhere in the country. At county and town or commune levels, the care for cultural heritage as a factor for sustainable development depends very much on resources, tradition, and people in charge and active actors in the field. But good examples in many places (like the recent restoration of the fortified precinct and towers of the city of Braşov entirely with funding from the County Council) have the power to stimulate ambitions and changing attitudes in other areas of the country.

The work of ICOMOS embraces a wide field of activities, including both the urban and rural cultural heritage, major monuments of international value and also more modest settlements and environments of significant local and regional characteristics. Heritage People

In the recent years, the legislation for the protection of cultural heritage introduced the mandatory evaluation and validation of the persons and companies working in the field of restoration, conservation and classification of cultural heritage goods, and archaeological excavations. The accreditation is granted by the Ministry of Culture at the proposal of the three National Commissions: the National Commission for Historic Monuments (experts in historic monuments, restoration companies), the National Commission of Archaeology (archaeologists for field excavations), and the National Commission for Museums and Collections respectively (experts in movable heritage, conservators and restorers for movable goods, restoration laboratories). The dossiers of the candidates are examined by specialised subcommissions. The main criteria are: candidate's education and training, experience, recommendations from known specialists, scientific titles.

The official registers of licensed experts and specialists in the field of cultural heritage are made public on the Internet. In May 2013, there were 654 persons in the field of immovable cultural heritage: 510 specialists in conservation and restoration of historic monuments (see the list at <http://inp.org.ro/atestare-specialisti-si-experti/registrul-specialistilor-in-protejarea-monumentelor-istorice>) and 144 experts in protection of historic monuments (see the list at <http://inp.org.ro/atestare-specialisti-si-experti/registrul-expertilor-in-protejarea-monumentelor-istorice>).

For archaeological excavations, 835 have been licensed since the year 2000 until May 2013 (see the Register of Archaeologists, <http://acera.cimec.ro>) but only half of them are active in the current field excavations.

For movable heritage, there are 831 licensed experts in the fields of movable cultural heritage (see http://www.cimec.ro/scripts/RegistruExpert/PatrimoniulMobil_R1/sel.asp) and 532 licensed conservators and restorers (see http://www.cimec.ro/scripts/RegistruExpert/PatrimoniulMobil_R2/sel.asp). In total,

1363 names but again, not all the certified persons are active at present. The register of experts in movable heritage can be searched by name, heritage field, county or institution/organization.

By Emergency Ordinance no. 72/2013 on the reorganization of public institutions under the Ministry of Culture, in force since 06.28.2013, Centre for Professional Training in Culture was reorganized as a result of merging by absorption of the Research and Consulting Center in Culture, which is dissolved, and by merging the historical monuments attesting activity of the National Heritage Institute, and changes its name in the **National Institute for Cultural Research and Training**, public cultural institution with legal personality under the Ministry of Culture, financed from own revenues and subsidies from the state budget. Traditionally, the Training Centre of the Ministry of Culture has organized formation courses

for museum curators, librarians, archaeologists and heritage managers, among others. The institution, entirely living on its own revenues until this reorganization, had severe financing problems in the last five years as a result of the austerity budget restrictions of the cultural institutions, forced to cut their budget chapters for the training of personnel. The restrictions on hiring new people in the public sector also limited the number of candidates for training courses. The institution diversified its training programmes with topics like project management, photography, web design and participated in several European projects but still struggle to exist. Sometimes documentation can be kept, either temporarily or permanently, by research institutes and universities for their own excavations and surveys. No archaeological excavation is approved without an agreement between the excavation team and the county museum in the area of which the site or archaeological area is located regarding the deposition of finds.

Minimal documentation required for the archaeological excavations, either preventive or systematic ones (technical report, preliminary report, topographic plan etc.) is stored at the Ministry of Culture, Cultural Heritage Department, and, in digital copy, at the National Heritage Institute in Bucharest. The archaeological excavation reports are published in annual volumes of the series "Chronicle of Archaeological Excavations in Romania" by the Ministry of Culture and the National Heritage Institute (INP). They are also available online (the volumes in pdf format, CD-ROMs with text, illustration and interactive search indexes, and online database). See the online database at <http://cronica.cimec.ro> (4,288 reports for the period 1983 - 2012, last updated July 2013). The database can be searched by year of excavation, county, locality, historical period and category of sites. Each spring around 200 new excavation reports regarding the previous year are added. Since 2012, illustrations of the reports were added in the database. The reports can be also accessed through a

A few years ago, a special department of Heritage Police was created both at national level and county level inside the Romanian Police. Those departments specialised in heritage protection, recruited archaeologists to work in interdisciplinary teams and improved control and protection of heritage in their areas. Several illicit traffic networks with international connections were dismantled in that period and the first condemnations of cultural heritage traffickers in court were achieved due to that activity. There were also increased collaborations with Interpol and Police bodies from other countries.

In May 2010, in the course of the reorganisation of the Romanian Police, at the same time with many government organisations, agencies and public institutions due to the financial crisis and austerity measures, Heritage Police Department disappeared from the new organogram and its staff no more deals with fighting illicit traffic of cultural goods, sites robbery and preventive measures but with all kinds of common offences and breaking of the law like car thefts or home burglaries. Those measures have bad consequences in the fight against illicit traffic of cultural goods, heritage legislation enforcement and sites and monuments protection.

Thus: "Art. 40. In order to stimulate the historical monuments protection, the natural bodies owning such objects and use their own sources to partially or totally pay the maintenance, repair, preservation, consolidation, restoration, enhancement works, as well as cultural programs and projects, benefit, in conformity with the present law, of a minimum 50% discount of the fees and taxes usually charged by the local authorities for these works. Art. 41 (1) The owners of the historical monuments buildings are totally exempt from the real estate tax, except for the places used for economical or commercial activities. (2) No taxes shall be paid for the ground surface occupied by the buildings (3) According to the present law, the local councils may relief the taxes for the historical monuments grounds bearing no construction, depending on the

affected surface and of the period the historical monuments are at the disposal of the public to be visited, as well as of the specialised institutions to conduct researches on the respective historical monuments. Art. 42 (1) The legal and natural bodies which inherit an immovable object classified as historical monument which they use as dwelling or for un-commercial activities are exempt of the stamp tax if they commit themselves in writing at the county office for culture, religious affairs and the national cultural heritage covering their residence, to perform, within 12 months, the restoration and consolidation works, established in the technical documentation approved and endorsed under the conditions of the present law. (2) In rightfully motivated cases and with the endorsement of the county or Bucharest Directorates for Culture, the deadline stipulated at paragraph (1) may be extended only once for another 12 months. In reality, many owners of historic monuments regard that as a burden because of the many restrictions imposed by law. They cannot repair their property without a project approved by the competent authority, have to use traditional materials and work with accredited restoration companies, cannot modify or change in any way their house etc. Not more than one grant per year was approved for private owners of historic monuments."

Integrated Approach

The legal system on cultural heritage established in 2000 - 2001 through the three main laws regarding archaeological heritage, movable cultural heritage and historic monuments was consolidated by many other normative acts (Government ordinances, ministerial orders, laws, standards and recommendations) covering probably around 1000 pages in twelve years: 36 acts regard historic monuments, 14 archaeology, and 18 movable heritage only ! The laws suffered several modifications and additions, being republished in 2007. On the 30th of October 2012 new changes and additions proposals to the heritage laws were published on the site of the Ministry of Culture and National Heritage (<http://www.cultura-net.ro/Dezbateri.aspx>). Working on an integrated Cultural Heritage Code is the main objective of the next years.
