Background

Since 2015 the Sustainable Development Goals shape the development agenda globally. While Goal 4 specifically targets education, most of the goals are interlinked with the individual knowledge, practice and responsibility that formal and non-formal education can provide.

All three Baltic countries are going through formal educational reforms - development of the new curriculum, defining competency frameworks and new educational standards.

How can global development education contribute to this process?

Global development education ensures knowledge and skills that link global and local dimensions – *glocalisation* – promoting individual and collective responsibilities, as well as policy change, supporting sustainable global development. Organisations working in the field of global development education for more than 10 years have acquired a consolidated experience in the professional development of formal and non-formal educators, through initial and in-service training, working with the different target groups on diverse topics related to sustainable development.

The Riga follow-up meeting aims at identifying the contribution of the global development education in the new reforms of the curriculum in the light of the sustainable development goals, building of the recommendations of the Baltic Regional Seminar held in Tallinn in October 2016, and of the first follow-up meeting held in Vilnius in May 2017.

Common challenges and practices in all three Baltic States will be identified and follow-up actions agreed through the plenary sessions and working group sessions.

The follow-up meeting is part of monitoring process of the recognition and implementation of global development education in the Balkan, Baltic, South-East Europe and Mediterranean, and Visegrad countries, running over the period 2016-19. This monitoring process is based on the strategic recommendations of the 3rd European Congress on Global Education organised by the NSC in Zagreb, 2015, and on the CoE Recommendation CM/Rec (2011)4 on education for global interdependence and solidarity.

The follow-up meeting is organised and implemented by North-South Centre of the Council of Europe with the support of the European Commission and in cooperation with its Baltic partners, Eesti People to People (Estonia), the Latvian Platform for Development Cooperation (LAPAS), the Lithuanian Children's and Youth Centre, and the Ministry of Education and Science of the Republic of Lithuania.

SIA Getliņi EKO is a company which manages Getliņi, the largest municipal solid waste landfill in the Baltic States. The landfill is one of the most modern landfills in Europe; at the moment, it is created and developed as a modern and safe waste recycling center.

Biodegradable waste has been used for production of biogas, meanwhile materials and metal products useful for processing have been delivered to



companies engaged in the recovery and recycling of these materials. Modern greenhouses are built in the territory of SIA Getlini EKO landfill. Annually, SIA Getlini EKO produces about 500 tons of tomatoes.
