Democracy and Populism

Public meeting chaired by former French Minister, Catherine Lalumière, President of the Association of Schools of Political Studies of the Council of Europe.

Fuelled by simplistic lies, misrepresentation and rabble-rousing rhetoric based on the myth of giving power back to the people, populism is increasingly colouring public debate and threatening democracy in Europe and beyond.

From Trump to Putin and from Brexit to Beppe Grillo, what exactly do we mean by "populism"? What of stigmatisation of refugees, negative stereotyping of migrants and trivialisation of racism and xenophobia? Is populism an inevitable consequence of pluralism or just a temporary disease affecting democracy? What can be done to counter populist discourse and disinformation?

The debate will be interpreted into English, French and Russian.









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
