Means of communication (e.g. by post, fax, e-mail ¹):	<p>Central authorities can receive letters of request by post, email or fax but these methods are not usually secure channels of transmission. Double criminality requirement, if applicable:	<p>In the UK dual criminality is required for coercive measures such as restraint and confiscation of assets and search and seizure.
