STRATEGIC ACTION PLAN FOR ROMA AND TRAVELLER INCLUSION (2020-2025)

Mid-Term Review Report

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1. Introduction

The Strasbourg Declaration on Roma adopted in 2010¹ provided a strong impetus for co-ordinated and concerted action of governments and European stakeholders to support national, regional and local level authorities in their efforts towards improving the social and economic situation of Roma and Travellers². The Declaration was complemented by the Thematic Action Plan on the Inclusion of Roma and Travellers (2016-2019) whose 2019 final implementation report revealed that in the four main areas in which action had been undertaken – access to education, employment, healthcare and housing – further action and co-ordination was needed. It is also recalled that the European Court of Human Rights and other Council of Europe monitoring bodies closely monitor the situation of Roma and Travellers and deal with discrimination and other human rights issues.

Following the assessment of the implementation of that Action Plan, and in order to address the current key challenges for Roma and Traveller inclusion as identified during Council of Europe stakeholder consultations (intergovernmental and civil society), the current Strategic Action Plan for Roma and Traveller Inclusion (2020-2025) is structured around three main lines of action:

- combating antigypsyism and discrimination and supporting real and effective equality;
- supporting democratic participation and promoting public trust and accountability; and
- supporting access to inclusive quality education and training.

In addition, the intersectional needs of specific groups of Roma and Travellers who are particularly vulnerable or suffer from multiple discrimination, were taken into account as a cross-cutting issue in all action under this Plan.

This Strategic Action Plan for Roma and Traveller Inclusion (2020-2025) ("the Strategic Action Plan"), approved by the Committee of Ministers on 22 January 2020, translates the strategic objectives of the Council of Europe regarding the protection and promotion of human rights, democracy and the rule of law into a policy framework for the social and intercultural inclusion of Roma and Travellers in Europe. The Plan provides a framework that is flexible and adaptable to country-specific conditions, serving as a roadmap and practical tool for the design, implementation and adjustment of programmes and actions. The objectives of the Plan are to promote and protect the human rights of Roma and Travellers, to combat antigypsyism and discrimination, and to foster inclusion in society.

The Council of Europe's actions draw on the case law of the European Court of Human Rights and build upon the findings and recommendations of the monitoring bodies, in particular the European Commission against Racism and Intolerance (ECRI), the European Committee for Social Rights of the European Social Charter, the Advisory Committee on the Framework Convention for the Protection of National Minorities and the Committee of Experts of the European Charter for Regional or Minority Languages. Support was provided by the Organisation to member States through the action plan in order to ensure better outcomes in relation to the inclusion of vulnerable and marginalised Roma and Travellers and to sustain and build upon the results achieved through the implementation of the Thematic Action Plan on the Inclusion of Roma and Travellers (2016-2019).

2. Progress report on the Implementation of actions in the three priority areas

This report aims to provide an overview of the achievements and activities under each priority area from the Plan's adoption on 22 January 2020 to 31 December 2022. Particular attention is paid to the activities and achievements of the Council of Europe from the beginning of the Covid-19 pandemic and its effects on Roma and Travellers. These special circumstances posed challenges to the implementation of planned activities which could not be foreseen during the drafting of the Strategic Action Plan. The pandemic required the Council of Europe to urgently revise its priorities and workplans, and to devise mitigating implementation strategies regarding the impact of the Covid -19 pandemic on Roma and Travellers across Europe.

2.1 Strategic Objective 1: Combating antigypsyism and discrimination and supporting real and effective equality

Roma and Travellers in Europe continue to suffer from widespread and persistent antigypsyism, which has been recognised by the European Commission against Racism and Intolerance (ECRI)³ as a specific form of racism fuelled by prejudice and stereotypes. In addition, Roma and Travellers remain victims of various forms of discrimination, including school segregation, a forced sedentary lifestyle, hate speech and hate-motivated violence in many member States. Antigypsyism creates a barrier to efforts aimed at improving the living conditions and full social inclusion of Roma.⁴

Anti-Roma and anti-Traveller prejudice, discrimination, hate speech and hate crimes require a combination of the following measures:

- Legal responses and standard-setting work (for example, on combating hate speech and hate-motivated violence) and other intergovernmental co-operation (for example, peer reviews, thematic visits and thematic reports);
- Training of the legal profession, public authorities and law enforcement in Council of Europe standards and relevant case law of the European Court of Human Rights;
- Capacity-building of national, regional and local level authorities and civil society, including through the Council of Europe Dialogue meetings with Roma and Traveller civil society;
- Specific empowerment for particular groups, such as Roma women and youth; and
- Awareness-raising actions for the general public.

The Committee of Experts on Roma and Traveller Issues (ADI-ROM) commissioned a study on the causes, prevalence and consequences of antigypsyism and possible responses thereto, taking into account the findings and recommendations of ECRI, with a view to giving guidance to the CDADI in this field. Dr Iulius ROSTAS, expert consultant, finalised the report, which has been endorsed by the CDADI.⁵

The following gives an overview of the activities carried out to reach Strategic Objective 1.

2.1.1 A legal instrument on a comprehensive approach to addressing hate speech within a human rights framework is developed

The Council of Europe Committee of Experts on Combating Hate Speech (ADI/MSI-DIS) has been working throughout the reporting period on drafting a new Committee of Ministers Recommendation on combating hate speech. The Recommendation was adopted by the Committee of Ministers at its ministerial session on 20 May 2022 in Turin and includes important provisions for combating *inter alia* hate speech targeting Roma and Traveller groups in Europe.⁶

The Committee of Experts on Roma and Traveller Issues (ADI-ROM) contributed to the drafting process by submitting written drafting proposals, background information and examples of good practice. The ADI-ROM Rapporteur on Antigypsyism and Hate Speech participated in the ADI/MSI-DIS meetings. The conclusions and recommendations of the 10th meeting of the Council of Europe Dialogue with Roma and Traveller civil society (26-27 November 2020), devoted to combating hate speech, were also submitted to the ADI/MSI-DIS, and the Ad hoc Rapporteur of that Dialogue meeting participated in exchanges of information with the ADI/MSI-DIS, the ADI-ROM and the CDADI. In 2022, the CDADI started with the implementation of its next task, which is to review promising practices at national level of the implementation of relevant aspects of the Recommendation (2022)16 on Combating Hate Speech, in co-operation with the Steering Committee on Media and Information Society (CDMSI). Furthermore, under the CDADI and the European Committee for Crime Problems (CDCP), the new Committee of Experts on Hate Crime (PC/ADI-CH) was set up and started with its task to draft a comprehensive Recommendation on combating hate crime including its investigation and victim support. This new instrument is expected to cover hate crime against Roma and Travelers and thus contribute to preventing and fighting antigypsyism.

In April 2022 Roma and Traveller CSO representatives and an academic participated in the closing conference 'Speaking Human Rights Online' in Brussels of the 'We CAN for Human Rights Speech' project, an EU-CoE cofunded project implemented by a consortium of four CSOs led by the Council of Europe. The conference reviewed present challenges and opportunities to address hate speech and provided a list of recommendations to strengthen the use of a counter and alterative narrative promoting human rights or targeted groups, including of Roma and Travellers, and European wide coordination between CSOs and other partners.

Also, members of the ADI-ROM and the Council of Europe Secretariat presented and discussed ways and means of combating hate speech against Roma and Travellers at the Conference "UNBOXING HATE SPEECH – European Impulses for Respect and Solidarity on the Web", organised by the Friedrich-Ebert-Stiftung, the German Federal Foreign Office and the Federal Ministry of Justice and Consumer Protection in the framework of Germany's Presidency of the Committee of Ministers of the Council of Europe, and at the Workshop on "Hate speech against marginalised groups", organised by the European Roma Institute for Arts and Culture (ERIAC), held online on 18 February 2021, as well as at the International Conference "Hate Speech and Antigypsyism in the Media", also organised by ERIAC and held online on 10-11 March 2021.

The European Union/Council of Europe Joint Programme (JP) "Promoting good governance and Roma empowerment at local level (ROMACTED II)" assisted the Albanian Government in the drafting of a chapter on antigypsyism in the new Action Plan for the Inclusion of Roma and Egyptians 2020-2025. The JP ROMACTED II also provided assistance in consultations with Roma civil society and local authorities in the second half of 2020 and assisted in the development of the new Action Plan for Roma Inclusion 2021-2025 in Bosnia and Herzegovina in the first half of 2021, the adoption of which is unfortunately still pending.

During 2020 and 2021, the Council of Europe Action Plan Project "Strengthening the protection of national minorities, including Roma, and minority languages in Ukraine – Phase II" assisted the Ukrainian Government in developing the draft new Roma Inclusion Strategy (post-2020) by organising public consultations with regional administrations and providing assistance in evaluating the previous Roma Inclusion Strategy 2013-2020 (jointly with UN Women).

In 2021, the Council of Europe's Roma and Travellers Team supported the Ministry of Labour and Social Policy of the Republic of North Macedonia in the preparation of the National Action Plan for Roma Women in North Macedonia for the period of 2022-2024. Assistance to this process was provided through the JP ROMACTED Phase II.

In January 2021, the Committee on Equality and Non-Discrimination of the Parliamentary Assembly of the Council of Europe prepared a report on Ethnic Profiling in Europe: a matter of great concern (rapporteur Boriss Cilevičs, Latvia, SOC), which was adopted by the Assembly as Resolution 2364 (2021). The report (adopted in committee on 27 November 2020) deals extensively with the ethnic profiling of Roma.

2.1.2 Awareness of Roma and Traveller issues of the general public is increased through awareness-raising activities

The Council of Europe aims to raise the awareness of the general public through participation in information or awareness-raising events, for example, the online Round Table "Roma and Travellers in Europe and Ireland", organised on 31 March 2021 by the German Embassy in Dublin in the framework of the German Presidency of the Committee of Ministers of the Council of Europe. The event involved the German Ambassador to Ireland, the first female Irish Senator of the Irish Traveller community, the member in respect of Ireland in the Advisory Committee on the Framework Convention for the Protection of National Minorities, the Executive Director of ERIAC and the Secretary to the Committee of Experts on Roma and Traveller Issues (ADI-ROM).

Awareness-raising activities also include the production, publication and dissemination of information and teaching materials such as the Factsheets on Roma History or the books on the representation of Roma in major European museum collections such as the Louvre and the Prado. The Roma and Travellers Team operates a dedicated website, as well as Facebook and Twitter accounts. Part of this strategic intervention is also aimed at the inclusion of an antigypsyism focus on the activities of the Joint Programmes and at mainstreaming anti-discrimination in civic education and school curricula. This also includes co-operation activities with ERIAC.

In May 2022 the Youth Department co-organised, together with the National Youth Councils of North Macedonia, Romania, Ukraine and Bulgaria and the Regional Roma Education Youth Association, a study session at the European Youth Centre Budapest about Multi-Sectoral Cooperation for Inclusion of Roma Youth and Marginalized Groups. The activity strengthened social inclusion of young Roma and other marginalised youth and promoted awareness, understanding and cooperation in societies covered by these organisations. The activity resulted in practical guidelines for advocacy work and for local authorities, local youth councils and young people, for social inclusion and involvement of Roma youth in decision-making processes. Examples of good practice brought up during the activity will feed into the national level dialogues on the topic. This has been the first time that several national youth councils undertook an activity to look into how they can support Roma youth inclusion. It is hoped that this initiative will be further supported and replicated as a result of a draft recommendation on Roma youth participation.

In April 2021, the JP ROMACTED II, jointly with the Council of Europe Office in Tirana, organised a virtual debate on "Combating antigypsyism: a forward-looking perspective in Albania", organised in co-operation with the Ministry of Health and Social Protection, the EU, and the German CM Presidency. Participants included ROMACTED stakeholders. ROMACTED outcomes and publications were presented. Also, in April 2021, the JP ROMACTED II, jointly with the Council of Europe Office in Belgrade, organised a round-table discussion on "Overcoming Antigypyism in Europe", with high-level participation of Ambassadors, international stakeholders, ERIAC and Roma NGOs.

JP ROMACTED II mobilised Roma communities and participating municipalities by raising awareness of the importance of the commemoration of International Roma Day and the flying of the Romani flag on municipal flagpoles. Activities took place in April 2020, April 2021 and April 2022. Roma history factsheets were disseminated to the seven beneficiaries of the JP ROMACTED II during the first half of 2020; the pedagogical book "Romani Legends and Fairy Tales" was published and disseminated in Albania at the end of 2020 and at the beginning of 2021. A Romani week was organised in Albania, Montenegro and North Macedonia in April 2022.

In April 2021, ROMACTED II, together with the Council of Europe Office and ERIAC Serbia in Belgrade, held a commemorative session under the theme "Overcoming Antigypsyism in Europe" with the presence of the Executive Director of ERIAC, the Ministry of Human and Minority Rights and Social Dialogue, the German (CM Presidency) Embassy in Belgrade and the Portuguese Embassy (EU Presidency) followed by the launch of a virtual exhibition and visit to ERIAC Serbia in Belgrade.

In June/July 2021, an online workshop on human rights-based narratives to counter anti-Roma and Traveller hate speech⁸ was organised in co-operation with the European Roma Grassroots Organisations Network (ERGO) and Phiren Amenca International Network, in the context of the EU-CoE co-funded project 'We CAN for Human Rights Speech'. The workshop brought together 21 CSO representatives and campaign activists from across Europe, including from Roma and Traveller background. Participants gained competences to develop human rights based narratives and designed campaign materials⁹ which were used among others to contribute to the 2 August, Roma Holocaust commemoration.

In November 2021, a series of capacity building activities were organised with Roma communities in North Macedonia on Roma identity and combatting antigypysism. In May 2022, 35 labour inspectors in North Macedonia enhanced their knowledge on antigypsyism in a workshop on "Preventing and Combating Human Trafficking in North Macedonia" and "Promotion of Diversity and Equality in North Macedonia", which were organized in the framework of the EU/CoE JP Horizontal Facility II. In July 2022, activities were undertaken within the EU/CoE JP Horizontal Facility "Promotion of diversity and equality in Serbia" on building the capacity of Roma youth from Community Action Groups in Serbia on the topics of antigypyism and combatting hate speech narratives.

Throughout 2021, a series of campaign events and social media posts raised awareness about the Roma and Travellers' community in Georgia¹⁰ as part of the 'I Choose Equality' campaign which aimed to raise awareness about human rights and anti-discrimination policy and their importance for securing democracy, peace and prosperity in Georgian society. The campaign was conducted through the co-operation project "Fight against

discrimination, hate crime and hate speech in Georgia"¹¹. The project also produced publication for the Georgian Police Academy "Policing in Diverse Society" which includes chapter on Roma people in Georgia.

Awareness of Roma and Traveller issues was also increased through co-operation with the European Law Students' Association (ELSA) Italy within the JUSTROM Programme, which lasted from May 2020 to February 2022 and entailed several trainings, including preparatory webinars for the 33 teams which were enrolled in the XVIII National Moot Court Competition. The case study in this competition was related to Roma women's rights. Also, within the JUSTROM Programme, 12 videoclips were developed and published, showcasing women's empowerment resulting from the implementation of this programme.

The Office of the Commissioner for Human Rights carried out an online dialogue with the Portuguese authorities on rising racism against Roma and violence against women. The Commissioner also sent a letter to the Speaker of the Czech Parliament concerning the proposed law on the compensation scheme for the women victims of forced sterilisation. The letter was read out in the Czech Parliament on 10 March 2021.

The draft *Report on discrimination against Roma and Travellers in the field of housing (14590)* was prepared by the Parliamentary Assembly's Committee on Equality and Non-Discrimination and debated in the Standing Committee in May 2021. The report highlights the following points:

- Antigypsyism and anti-nomadism as the root cause of the problem;
- Staging of evictions by politicians;
- Intersectional issues.

It also points to a lack of good examples and successful initiatives in housing in Council of Europe member states and the failure of National Roma Inclusion Strategies in this field.

At its 5th meeting in Rome on 15 to 17 March 2022, the joint EU/CoE programme Roma Women's Access to Justice (JUSTROM) and the Roma Political Schools were presented to the members of the CDADI, which supported both programmes and the dissemination of their results.

2.1.3 Performance of institutions dealing with Roma and Traveller rights is enhanced through professional training; access to justice by Roma and Travellers is increased through capacity-building activities

In 2020, the Council of Europe's Roma and Travellers Team published the Toolkit for Police Officers: Council of Europe standards on racially motivated crimes and non-discrimination including relevant case law of the European Court of Human Rights with the aim of supporting police officers to better understand, investigate and prosecute human rights violations.

The Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity (SOGI) Unit of the Council of Europe worked closely on Roma and Traveller issues and implemented training sessions on policing hate crime against LGBTI persons (including against Roma LGBTI persons) for law enforcement officials in Romania.

Part of the capacity-building objectives was also the updating of the training module on Roma within the online European Programme for Human Rights Education for Legal Professionals (HELP). In December 2020, the EU/Council of Europe Joint Programme "Roma and Traveller Women's Access to Justice (JUSTROM)" finalised the HELP module on Roma. The updated module is available in five languages: English, Bulgarian, Greek, Italian and Romanian and was launched in all four JUSTROM countries: Bulgaria, Greece, Italy, and Romania. Available versions in Albanian, Bosnian, Georgian, Macedonian, Montenegrin and Serbian also exist in the HELP e-learning platform of the Council of Europe and can be taken freely, leading to an individualised 'statement of accomplishment' upon completion. 350 participants took part in national tutored courses, out of whom 82% completed the 2-3 months' courses. As self-learning, there are more than 2000 people enrolled.

This strategic intervention also includes the implementation of JUSTROM, including tailor-made training modules for law enforcement and legal professionals. In February 2020, JUSTROM provided training for legal professionals on anti-discrimination, gender equality and Roma issues, training of facilitators on anti-discrimination and gender equality, and training for national coordinators on gender and Roma mainstreaming issues.

From June 2020 to February 2022, JUSTROM, in partnership with the European Law Students' Association (ELSA) Italy, the Association for Legal Studies on Immigration (ASGI), the Naples Bar Council, LUMSA University, and the Rome Juvenile Court, organised a series of training sessions for legal professionals in Italy, focusing, inter alia, on raising awareness of the work of the JUSTROM programme, in the context of the new challenges presented by the Covid-19 global pandemic for vulnerable Roma communities, especially with respect to access to legal services. Other relevant topics included the Italian framework of the human rights of ethnic minorities and Roma, the issue of statelessness, and relevant legal proceedings in Italy to achieve regularisation and access to citizenship status for members of the Roma community.

In March and April 2021, JUSTROM created a pool of trainers in implementing countries, which institutions could tap into for training in the future. Moreover, under JUSTROM, 81 Training for Trainers (ToTs) and cascading training sessions were held on the following topics: Council of Europe Convention on preventing and combating violence against women and domestic violence, Council of Europe Convention on Action against Trafficking in Human Beings, statelessness, gender equality, and European Court of Human Rights standards related to the rights of Roma and women. The ToTs and cascading training sessions were held in Bulgaria, Greece, Italy and Romania and targeted lawyers (including free legal aid lawyers), law students, municipal staff, social workers, health mediators, law enforcement officials and staff of non-governmental organisations.

Research on the barriers to Roma women's access to justice was conducted, with the purpose of raising awareness of key stakeholders on this topic, responsible for policy development in this area. Qualitative research was conducted in Bulgaria, Greece, Italy and Romania which draws on data from interviews, focus group discussions and questionnaires with Roma women, Roma and pro-Roma civil society organisations, and state actors. With the purpose of enhancing the knowledge and skills of future professionals to respond effectively and adequately to the needs of Roma women and girls in specific national contexts, syllabi on anti-discrimination were developed for pre-service training and in-service training. The first one is the "Understanding and Combating Antigypsyism, Anti-Roma Discrimination and Gender Inequality" and the second one is "Non-Discrimination, Gender Equality and Roma Women - Syllabus for Italy".

On 14 January 2022, the "Good Practices on Improving Relations Between Police Representatives and the Roma Communities" webinar took place, within the joint EU/Council of Europe programme JUSTROM3. The webinar enabled participants to increase their knowledge on ways to introduce community policing at municipal level and share good practices to improve relations between police and Roma communities. On 21 January 2022, the "Roma mainstreaming in community development" webinar took place, within the joint EU/Council of Europe programme JUSTROM3. The event was attended by representatives of municipalities from Portugal and countries where the joint programmes JUSTROM3 and ROMACT are implemented (Bulgaria, Greece, Italy and Romania), including representatives from NGOs and collaborators of the two programmes, who shared experiences and ideas in respect of Roma community development.

JUSTROM processes have been documented in a systematic way. With the purpose of sharing knowledge and encouraging future replication by other member States, a collection of good practices was published. On 23-24 February 2022, within the final event of the JUSTROM programme, participants discussed the role of equality bodies and national human rights institutions in advancing Roma women's rights and enhancing their access to justice.

The Strategic Action Plan also aims at improving the reporting of discrimination and hate crimes. In this regard, the Council of Europe Ukraine Action Plan Project developed and rolled out a training course for Odessa University together with the Ministry of Interior on "Protection of vulnerable groups in policing". The training was included in the University's teaching curricula in 2020. During the second half of 2020, the project also facilitated dialogue between Roma NGOs and law enforcement agencies to discuss ways of improving prevention and reporting of hate crimes targeting Roma in the Ukraine.

A Thematic Visit on how to stimulate governments to employ Roma and Travellers in governmental institutions and public administration took place in Skopje from 20-22 June 2022. The thematic visit was hosted by North Macedonia, and Croatia, Moldova, Portugal, and the Slovak Republic were partner countries. The purpose of this thematic visit was to identify how governments can be stimulated to employ Roma and Travellers in governmental institutions and public administration at the local, regional and national level. The exchanges and peer review allowed for an overview of the efficiency and effectiveness of the implementation of National Roma Inclusion Strategies (both in EU and non-EU countries), with a special emphasis on the issue of employment and namely employment in governmental institutions and public services. It also allowed to examine existing national policies and laws, employment agencies and recruitment bodies policies and special measures and exemption employment policies for Roma and present good practices.

2.1.4 Visibility of Council of Europe actions, incl. the case law of the European Court of Human Rights and the findings and recommendations of the monitoring bodies, is increased

This strategic objective relates to the work of the European Court of Human Rights (ECtHR) and the European Committee for Social Rights, as well as relevant monitoring bodies, such as ECRI or the Advisory Committee on the Framework Convention for the Protection of National Minorities.

The Roma and Travellers Team has widely disseminated judgments concerning verbal or physical violence against Roma, particularly by law enforcement officials and lack of effective investigation (see, for example, *X and Y v. North Macedonia*, no. 173/17, 5 November 2020 and *R.R. and R.D. v. Slovakia*, no. 20649/18, 1 September 2020), ¹² as well as cases concerning the living conditions of Roma populations, namely eviction without any offer of alternative accommodation for Roma living in an unauthorised camp (see *Hirtu and Others v. France*, no. 24720/13, 14 May 2020)¹³ and allegedly insufficient measures to ensure access to safe drinking water and sanitation for Roma communities (*Hudorovič and Others v. Slovenia*, nos. 24816/14 and 25140/14, 10 March 2020)¹⁴, or *Terna v. Italy*, where the Court examined the applicant's complaint about taking care of her granddaughter, who she had custody of since birth, and failure to implement visiting rights. An important recent judgment where the Court found a violation of Article 14 in conjunction with Article 8 concerning state obligations affords redress to Roma individuals for discriminatory public statements by a politician (*Budinova and Chaprazov v. Bulgaria*, no. 12567/13, 16 February 2021). ¹⁵ Finally, another important decision is the case of *Lacatus v. Switzerland* which concerned the fine imposed on a poor and vulnerable Roma woman for unintrusive begging, and subsequent imprisonment for five days for non-payment, where the Court found a violation of Article 8. ¹⁶

The Directorate of the Jurisconsult of the ECtHR continues to monitor Roma-related cases and the Press Unit continues to update the Factsheet on Roma and Travellers.¹⁷

In November 2020, the Commissioner for Human Rights made a submission to the Committee of Ministers in the context of the supervision of the execution of the 2007 ECtHR judgment in the case of *D.H. and Others v. the Czech Republic* about school segregation of Roma children. She also made a submission on the case of *Yordanova and Others v. Bulgaria* about the planned eviction of Roma people from an informal settlement in Sofia.¹⁸

15 complaints on Roma rights and their implementation status were received by the Secretariat of the European Social Charter in the reporting cycle concluded on 24 March 2021; and three new collective complaints on Roma rights have been received since then.

Since January 2020, several monitoring reports of the Advisory Committee on the Framework Convention for the Protection of National Minorities (FCNM) have been adopted. 19 out of 24 Resolutions adopted by the Committee of Ministers since January 2020 on the FCNM implementation included Roma-related recommendations. Several new topics were addressed by the Advisory Committee, including:

- 1. Impact of early marriages on school absenteeism and dropouts (Croatia, Cyprus, Montenegro, Portugal, Serbia, and Spain);
- 2. Compensation for past sterilisation of Roma women (Czech Republic and Slovak Republic);
- 3. Historical revisionism in relation to the Roma and Sinti Holocaust (Croatia);
- 4. Impact of Covid-19 on national minorities, including Roma (Croatia, Czech Republic).
- 5. Derogatory wording in policy documents and official language dictionaries (Czech Republic, Slovak Republic and Spain).
- Developing an action plan to combat both antigypsyism and anti-nomadism (Norway).

This strategic objective also looks at follow-up activities in Council of Europe member States on CM recommendations and the promotion of ECRI General Policy Recommendation No. 13 (revised) on combating antigypsyism and discrimination against Roma.

Since January 2020, ECRI carried out several country monitoring visits that partly focused on the situation of Roma and Travellers and published reports and interim follow-up conclusions that included recommendations or reviews of the implementation of recommendations concerning Roma and Travellers. The recommendations pertaining to Roma issues in the context of ECRI's country monitoring work are accessible in the ECRI-HUDOC database.

In March 2020, the Ukraine Action Plan Project provided online training for the State Service for Ethnic Policy of Ukraine about Council of Europe standards on combating discrimination, including Council of Europe standards and tools for the inclusion of Roma.

This intervention also aims to develop further non-binding legal instruments to combat the violation of Roma and Traveller rights. In Ukraine, the Ukraine Action Plan Project facilitated access to identity documents by providing assistance to the State Migration Service of Ukraine in devising and implementing the fast-track ID procedure, as well as a chatbox responding automatically to questions from potential applicants and guiding them through the new simplified procedure. Other activities under the project included assisting in the establishment of the Inter-Ministerial Task Force on the Roma Inclusion Strategy and in organising its first meeting in Ukraine in April 2021. The project also facilitated the first online exchange of international best practices for Roma inclusion by the Ombudsoffices of 18 Council of Europe member states with a large Roma population (event organised under the auspices of the Office of the Ombudsperson of Ukraine in May 2021).

2.2 Strategic Objective 2: Supporting democratic participation and promoting public trust and accountability

The participation of Roma and Travellers in political and public life has increased over the past decade. However, it does not yet adequately reflect the demographic weight of Roma and Traveller communities, particularly at local level. Evidence has shown that Roma and Travellers, particularly women and youth, encounter a variety of social barriers and prejudices that severely impede their capacity to effectively participate in public and political life. ¹⁹ Consequently, they are largely absent from local or national political arenas and decision-making processes. This invisibility undermines their potential to reverse embedded marginalisation and discrimination. It is essential to enhance their participation and representation in public and political life in order to bring them closer to local, national and European decision-making bodies and improve their active participation and interaction with public administration as well as their presence in the public sphere.

2.2.1 Participation of Roma and Travellers in public and political life at local, regional, national, and European level is increased

The Steering Committee on Anti-Discrimination, Diversity and Inclusion (CDADI) has produced a study on the active political participation of national minority youth in Council of Europe member states. During its plenary meeting in December 2021 it set up a working group which is preparing a draft Recommendation on active political participation of national minority youth.

In 2022, the Joint Council of Youth started drafting a Committee of Minister's Recommendation on Promoting the Participation of Roma Young People in Democratic Processes and Structures. With a view to address structural and systemic barriers to participation of Roma youth across member states, including in youth policy structures and programmes, the Joint Council on Youth set up a Task Force on Roma youth participation which, in 2020 and 20121, analyses patterns of Roma youth participation and made recommendations for addressing them through Roma and youth programmes, starting with the Youth for Democracy programme. The work of the Task Force, which included several Roma youth organisations, was significantly supported by the study on Roma Youth Participation and Inclusion in Standards, Policies, and Programmes in Europe, carried out by Margareta Matache for the Council of Europe. The study grounds the work and conclusions of the Task Force in a broader context, perceptions and needs of Roma young people, Roma organisations and Europe/international organisations concerned with the human rights and social inclusion of Roma people in Europe. The study strengthens need and evidence-based approaches for youth policy interventions.

On the basis of the work of the Task Force, the Joint Council on Youth (CMJ) agreed to undertake the preparation of a Recommendation of the Committee of Ministers to member states on Roma Youth Participation. This is included in the Terms of Reference of the CMJ for 2022-2025.

To this end, a drafting group was set up in April 2022; after 3 meetings it is expected that a final draft text of the recommendation will be discussed at the meeting of the CMJ in October, with a possible adoption by the CM in the course of 2023. Roma youth civil society organisations, alongside with other stakeholders, have been regularly consulted and invited to contribute to the process of preparing the recommendation.

In 2020, the JP ROMACTED provided training and capacity-building activities for local Roma community members, officials and staff of local authorities in the 61 participating municipalities of the programme in the Western Balkans and Türkiye through in presence, on-line and hybrid meetings. ROMACTED also implemented a small grants scheme supporting 49 projects of local development initiatives including preventive measures and direct emergency responses to needs resulting from the outbreak of the Covid-19 pandemic, such as:

- Maintaining contact with local and central authorities to highlight the precarious situation of Roma citizens;
- Participation in crisis management teams and other similar actions at local level and coordination of actions at national level;
- Initiation and implementation of actions by respective support organisations jointly with other relevant stakeholders and actors.

JP ROMACTED Phase II established 104 Community Action Groups (CAGs), 69 Institutional Working Groups (IWGs) and 44 Municipal Taskforce Groups throughout the 78 participating cities and municipalities in the Western Balkans and Türkiye. Over 500 community members were trained on specific topics which had been identified as priorities during 2021.

A group of 20 youngsters (50% women) from the Roma, Ashkali and Egyptian communities were part of the 1st cohort of the Political School seminar in Kosovo, which was supported by the Roma and Travellers Team. The purpose of the Roma Political School is to foster and bridge the gap in political and public participation between Roma and non-Roma, which is reflected in the multiple expected project results following this pilot event as follows:

- Improved capacities of Roma youngsters in Kosovo to better comprehend and participate in political processes;
- Increased interaction and cooperation between Roma youngsters from different municipalities;
- Strengthened role of the civil society sector as a transformative force in Kosovo, in relation to full integration of non-majority communities in Kosovo;
- An established alumni network of 20 youngsters from Roma community, which could also be utilised and nurtured in the future with other activities.

Roma Political Schools were also organised in Albania, Greece, Italy, Portugal, Spain and Ukraine from June to December 2021. They aim at preparing young Roma women and men for active public and political participation in their country at the local, regional and national levels.

From January 2020 to December 2022, the JP "Building up political will and understanding of Roma inclusion at local and regional level (ROMACT)" worked with local communities and local authorities by actively contributing to building the capacity of Roma communities via Community Action Groups (CAGs) to participate in local decision-making processes. Between January 2020 and December 2022, 75 CAGs were established. CAG members are representatives of Roma communities actively participating in the process initiated by the Programme at local level. During the given period, the following activities were implemented and contributed to the participation of Roma in public life:

- <u>Bulgaria</u>: 37 coaching and training sessions were conducted for CAG members (298 participants - 147 men and 151 women) in 24 different municipalities, covering topics such as advocacy and negotiation skills; monitoring the Municipal Action Plan for Roma Integration; assessing and prioritising community needs; participating in the municipal budget drafting process, etc. in 5 training sessions. Moreover, 12 training sessions (300 participants - 100 men and 200 women) gathered

together CAG representatives and local authority representatives from 41 municipalities on topics such as project planning and management; conducting community surveys; different approaches for working with and within the Roma community; partnership management; and participation of CAG members in the municipal budget process.

- Romania: 16 coaching sessions for CAG members (76 participants - 27 men and 49 women) were organised in 13 municipalities, focussing on project planning and implementation, including the implementation of ROMACT small grants schemes.

Between January 2020 and December 2022, the JP ROMACT promoted inclusive democratic governance at local level while ensuring that Roma are integrated in the measures and services provided by administration. During the given period, ROMACT contributed to building the capacity of local authorities to engage in effective and inclusive policy responses for the needs of Roma communities in 26 municipalities in Bulgaria and 41 municipalities in Romania. During the same period, 42 municipalities issued official decisions for the establishment of Municipal Taskforce Groups for Roma Inclusion, gathering together Roma CAG members, municipal representatives and other relevant stakeholders at local level, in view of preparing Joint Action Plans for Roma inclusion.

To increase the representation and participation of Roma women and Roma youth in public decision-making processes and their inclusion in relevant training courses and related activities, as well as in the creation of specific training modules, the Roma and Travellers Team organised the Roma women Leadership Academy in Kosovo* between September and November 2020.

In Spring of 2021 a draft research on "Political participation and ensuring the electoral rights of national minorities, including Roma, in Ukraine" was prepared by the CoE project "Strengthening the protection of national minorities, including Roma and minority languages of Ukraine" - Phase II in cooperation with the Council of Europe project "Supporting the transparency, inclusiveness and integrity of electoral practice in Ukraine"

On 15 March 2021, the Committee on Equality and Non-Discrimination of the Parliamentary Assembly adopted the draft resolution on "Enhancing participation of women from under-represented groups in political and public decision-making", including recommendations and (in the report) extensive analysis on promoting Roma women's political participation.²⁰

On 8 April 2021, the PACE General Rapporteur on combating racism and intolerance, Momodou Malcom Jallow (Sweden, UEL) made a statement for International Roma Day 2021, "Give a voice to Roma youth and civil society organisations in Parliaments."

A Roma perspective on the effects of climate change was presented during a webinar organised in the framework of the World Forum for Democracy on climate change and minorities by a Roma speaker. In October 2020 and April 2021, the Roma and Travellers Team undertook Roma pro-vote campaigns including the production of pedagogical videos focusing on voting procedures with Roma communities in Albania and Portugal.

This strategic objective will also be achieved through the organisation of international Roma women's conferences and related meetings. Two meetings with Roma and Traveller women were held online in September and December 2020, respectively, in preparation for the 8th International Roma Women's Conference (IRWC), which took place in Strasbourg on 24-26 November 2021. About 10-12 women participated in each preparatory meeting and the preliminary draft conference programme was developed.

In response to the violent aggression of the Russian Federation against the Ukraine, on 1 April 2022 the Council of Europe's Roma and Travellers Team and the No Hate Speech and Cooperation Unit organised an online Consultation meeting with Roma NGOs active in Ukraine²¹. 35 representatives of Roma NGOs from all over Ukraine attended the consultation; they discussed the current needs of Ukrainian Roma, in particular humanitarian aid, evacuation passages and access to support services for refugees and displaced people, legal aid and policies; and documentation of war crimes. The second Consultation meeting with the Roma NGOs was held on 1 July. The Roma NGO representatives (40 participants) emphasized the importance of

equal access to receiving IDP status and payments, registration of documents, as well as humanitarian aid and temporary housing.

2.2.2 The capacity of national and local authorities is enforced to perform their roles and responsibilities in an effective and efficient manner when designing and implementing plans, policies and projects, particularly active inclusion measures that improve the situation of Roma and Travellers

In June 2021, the CDADI adopted the Model Framework for an intercultural integration strategy at the national level developed by the Working Group on Intercultural Integration (GT-ADI-INT). The purpose of the Model Framework is to guide national policy practitioners in their efforts to design integration policies which help build inclusive and cohesive societies. It is the first international guidance document to serve as a basis for national intercultural integration strategies grounded on human rights standards. During the reference period, GT-ADI-INT has been also working on the Recommendation CM/Rec(2022)10 on multilevel policies and governance for intercultural integration, which was adopted by the Committee of Ministers in April 2022.

Workshops for locally elected officials were organised focusing on key principles, responsibilities and motivation for engaging in effective policy responses to local development needs of Roma. Until December 2020, the JP ROMACTED organised a series of workshops and webinars on Roma Responsive Budgeting at local level to train municipal officials in Albania and Serbia on the use of the methodology.

In April 2021, the ROMACTED Handbook was published and is currently available in Albanian, Bosnian, English, Serbian and Turkish in print and online (via the ROMACTED website), translated and adapted to respective contexts. Additional methodological and pedagogical tools and a series of situational analysis, assessments, and studies were produced. To pave the way for the implementation of one of the priorities of Phase II, a pilot Guideline on Roma Responsive Budgeting at Local Level was published, presenting the lessons learnt from testing this approach in Albania in 2020.

By June 2022, capacity building activities within JP ROMACTED II targeted over 350 municipal officials on needs and priorities in the Roma communities, participatory local strategic planning, Roma Responsive Budgeting principles, and monitoring the implementation of Local Action Plans.

The JP ROMACT focused on building the skills and commitment of local authorities, supporting them to better work with Roma communities, to plan more effective actions for improving the living conditions of disadvantaged people and to access and make better use of funding. During the reporting period, the following relevant activities were conducted for representatives of local municipalities, who participate in the programme:

- <u>Bulgaria:</u> 17 coaching sessions/workshops were organised for municipal representatives on the functions and tasks of the Roma Inclusion Working Group; on the development and monitoring of the Municipal Action Plan for Roma Integration, on funding opportunities, on data collection and community needs assessment; and on intercultural relationships.
- Romania: 152 coaching sessions/workshops were organised for 1136 municipal representatives (277 men and 859 women) in 48 municipalities, focusing on project planning and implementation (including projects funded by the ROMACT small grant scheme), public procurement, accessing structural and cohesion funds (including using MySMIS platform), partnership management, elaboration of local development strategies, as well as inclusive education.

The JP ROMACT Programme also included a small grants scheme aiming to support the implementation of short-term priorities of the Roma communities involved in the process at local level. During the reporting period, ROMACT disbursed a total of 107 small grants to municipalities, local NGOs representing the CAGs, and schools in the most deprived locations of the ROMACT municipalities. Moreover, in view of improving and supporting the effective implementation of different policies and regulations at local level, ROMACT experts provided technical assistance to municipalities to develop and apply procedures related to the legalisation of informal settlements or illegal housing, registration of a permanent address and to obtaining IDs.

From January 2020 to December 2022, based on evidence on the ground, ROMACT published a number of analytic reports and guidelines on topics of concern at local level for the improvement of inclusion policies and strategies, facilitating links with relevant institutions at regional and/or national level (to be found at

Resources | ROMACT (Council of Europe-romact.org).²² A revised and improved version of the ROMACT handbook was also published in Bulgarian, English and Romanian. Each version contains specific parts that are adapted to the local and national contexts.

The Ukraine Action Plan Project is also aimed at enhancing participation of national minorities, including Roma, in the decision-making process at local level. At the beginning of 2021, five pilot local communities with a high number of ethnic minorities, including Roma residing in these communities were selected and started working on the draft local action plans, based on the adapted ROMED/ROMACT/ROMACTED methodology. During the second half of 2020, the project produced an evaluation report on the impact of the decentralisation reforms on national minorities, including Roma in Ukraine, assessing the access to local-level decision making processes. Awareness-raising campaigns on promoting the participation of national minorities, including Roma, in the decentralisation process and decision-making processes at local level were conducted in 2020.

A research paper entitled "Empowerment of Roma and Traveller women: a change under construction. Towards a Roadmap for Advancing Gender Equality of Roma and Traveller Women in Council of Europe member states" was presented by the author, Dr Zora POPOVA, to the ADI-ROM at its 2nd meeting on 8-9 October 2020, followed by the presentation and discussion of an addendum on good practices at the 3rd ADI-ROM meeting on 16-17 March 2021.²³

In 2022, the new Committee of Experts on Intercultural Integration of Migrants, which was established under the CDADI, started to work on a capacity-building programme and tools for migrant integration in view of supporting its implementation at national level. Those tools will also contribute to the integration of refugees including Roma refugees from the Ukraine.

Over 60 participants from all over the world joined a webinar on 'Intercultural approaches to Roma and Traveller Inclusion for the local level' on 27 April 2022. The webinar was organised by the Intercultural Cities Programme (ICC) in co-operation with the Roma and Travellers Team. Prior to the event, ICC members were surveyed to collect policy practices that could eventually be shared across the ICC network.

The very rich programme included speakers with experience in increasing Roma inclusion in their cities from Albania, Bulgaria, North Macedonia, Romania, Spain and the United Kingdom. There were presentations on good practice from the Intercultural Cities of Bradford (Roma Strategy 2021-25), and Barcelona (Council of Roma people). Following the event, the ICC database of good practices has been enriched with new data on local actions in support of the intercultural inclusion of Roma and Travellers.

2.2.3 The capacity of local authorities to access and use national and international funding, particularly EU funds, to support their Roma inclusion strategies, is increased

Since 2020, a total of 73 project applications for funding were prepared with the technical assistance of ROMACT experts (47 in Bulgaria and 26 in Romania). Municipalities partnering under ROMACT regularly received training and coaching on how to access different funding schemes and on how to develop good projects, such as for the Structural and Cohesion Funds or the EEA/Norway Grants. While screening for available funding sources is carried out systematically for all ROMACT municipalities, a comprehensive document was prepared in Romania on the upcoming EU funding that would be relevant for marginalised Roma communities: *ROMACT review Operational Programmes proposed for Romania in the programming period 2021-2027*. Up until December 2022, capacity building activities on accessing IPA and other funds were provided in the context of the JP ROMACTED II Programme in Montenegro, North Macedonia and Serbia.

2.2.4 The level of Roma and Traveller expertise and understanding across the Council of Europe Secretariat is increased

The holding of regular Inter-Secretariat meetings and other relevant internal information events on Roma and Traveller issues contributed to the sharing of expertise and understanding across the Council of Europe. A Task Force on the Implementation of the Strategic Action Plan for Roma and Traveller Inclusion (2020-2025) furthers the mainstreaming of Roma and Traveller issues in all relevant policy areas of the Organisation and assures coordinated stocktaking of implementation activities. It also serves as a platform to ensure synergies and co-operation when designing and implementing relevant initiatives. The first meeting of the Inter-Secretariat Task Force (ISTF) took place on 4 March 2020 and included a presentation of the final version of the Action Plan to other departments of the Council of Europe Secretariat, as well as an exchange of information on all past, present and future Roma and Traveller-related activities with all participating departments. At the second Task Force meeting, held on 11 March 2021, an update on relevant activities was presented and a methodology for the elaboration of this first implementation report was devised. The third ISTF meeting took place on 24 June 2021 and focused on the contributions for the first implementation report received from all participating departments. The fourth ISTF meeting took place on 29 April 2022 and informed participants about the upcoming Mid-Term Review Report.

Similarly, the regular biannual meetings of the Council of Europe Dialogue with Roma and Traveller civil society contribute to achieving the above-mentioned result. The 9th meeting of the Council of Europe Dialogue with Roma and Traveller civil society (29-30 October 2020) focused on the implementation of the Strategic Action Plan for Roma and Traveller Inclusion (2020-2025), as well as the impact of the Covid-19 crisis on Roma and Traveller communities. The 10th meeting (26-27 November 2020) focused on combating hate speech directed against Roma and Travellers. The meeting took stock of the characteristics and prevalence of hate speech faced by Roma and Traveller communities and the impact of the Covid-19 crisis in this context. Participants were also invited to present and discuss different civil society and member state measures and good practices in combating hate speech. The 11th meeting (29-30 April 2021) took stock of the characteristics and prevalence of antigypsyism and the impact of the Covid-19 crisis in this context. Participants were also invited to present and discuss different civil society and member State measures and good practices in combating antigypsyism. The 12th Dialogue meeting took place on 2-3 November 2021 and focused on "Teaching the History of Roma and Travellers". The 13th Dialogue meeting took place on 10-11 May 2022 and took stock of the rights of Roma and Traveller children and included a presentation on the new Council of Europe Strategy on the Rights of the Child (2022-2027).²⁴

Activities also focused on awareness-raising with Council of Europe Permanent Representations and Council of Europe staff, especially on important days related to Roma history and culture (8 April - International Roma Day, 16 May - Romani Resistance Day, 2 August – European Roma Holocaust Memorial Day, 5 November - World Day of Romani Language). A flower casting ceremony took place on 8 April 2021 and 2022 in Strasbourg (Passerelle de l'Aubépine, near the European Youth Centre) on the occasion of International Roma Day, and in commemoration of the 50th Anniversary of the First World Romani Congress held near London in 1971. In 2021, the ceremony was conducted by a Council of Europe delegation headed by Snežana Samardžić-Marković, Director General of Democracy. In 2022, that delegation gathered Council of Europe Deputy Secretary General Björn Berge and participants of the seminar "Roma Youth Together 2022".

From 7-9 April 2021, the Conference "Roma Youth: Together for Emancipation and Empowerment. The role of history in the integration of young Roma today" was jointly organised by the Roma and Travellers Team and the Youth Department, under the aegis of the German Presidency of the Committee of Ministers, and in co-operation with the European Roma Institute for Arts and Culture (ERIAC), the European Roma Grassroots Organisations (ERGO) Network, the Phiren Amenca International Network, the International Roma Youth Network "ternype", and the Central Council of German Sinti and Roma.

Following the same approach, the Council of Europe Youth Department, with support of the Roma and Travellers Team, in cooperation with Phiren Amenca International, ERGO Network and the European Roma Institute of Arts and Culture, organised a seminar "Roma Youth Together 2022" at the European Youth Centre in Strasbourg from 6 to 8 April 2022, bringing together youth leaders and youth workers in Roma communities and youth organisations and representatives of organisations and networks working with Roma communities from all across Europe. The seminar re-connected Roma youth leaders with European youth policy processes and exchanges on strategies and priorities for youth empowerment and participation, especially after the cancellation of many activities due to the pandemic, and associated young people with the celebration of the International Roma Day in the Council of Europe. Participants provided input to the contents of a draft of the

Recommendation on Roma youth participation (currently under preparation) and discussed how to be involved in the youth campaign on revitalising democracy. The Deputy Secretary General, Bjørn Berge, addressed the participants and took part in the flower-casting ceremony on International Roma Day.

2.3 Strategic Objective 3: Supporting access to inclusive quality education and training

Common challenges for many educational institutions across Europe when it comes to Roma and Traveller children include non-enrolment, early school leaving, school dropouts, and irregular attendance. The Organisation's work on inclusive education continued to raise awareness of the need to ensure the legal prohibition of segregated schooling policies and practices, supported member States in the development and application of desegregation strategies in line with the case law of the European Court of Human Rights, and promoting parental participation for quality education and schooling through civil society and other stakeholders at local level. The EU/Council of Europe Joint Project "Inclusive Schools – Making a Difference for Roma Children (INSCHOOL)" was instrumental in this process.

2.3.1 The removal of concrete obstacles to equal access to quality education is supported at national and school level; the capacity of teachers to manage diversity and adopt inclusive teaching methods is enhanced

Obstacles to equal access to quality education are reduced through coaching and support of school staff and members of the co-ordinating groups through the JP INSCHOOL Programme. From October 2019 to June 2021, JP INSCHOOL provided 1122 interventions in all 22 schools by facilitators with the objective of providing support/coaching in inclusive education teaching to schoolteachers, teaching assistants and teaching staff through the use of the "Index for Inclusion: A Guide to School Development Led by Inclusive Values" by Tony Booth and Mel Ainscow, the main project methodology. Two translations in Romanian and Czech of the Index for Inclusion were supported by the INSCHOOL Project as a way to further promote an innovative education methodology based on inclusive values. At present, the JP INSCHOOL Programme is preparing promotional and dissemination events related to the Czech and Romanian translation of the methodology among education professionals in cooperation with relevant Ministries of Education. The facilitators also assisted in the preparation and readjustment of Inclusive School Development Plans by the Coordinating Groups based on which grant applications were prepared and grant agreements with inclusive education activities were concluded. The grant support was provided to 20 schools in the three countries of implementation, and supported activities such as remedial classes, workshops, digital access support for pupils, psycho-emotional support to school communities (students, parents and teachers), developing educational publications and teacher aids, activities with a focus of responding to the negative effects imposed by the COVID-19 pandemic and capacity building activities for teachers. By the end of the second cycle of the JP INSCHOOL (June 2021), the activities directly involved 4 114 children (2 033 Roma children), 480 parents (192 Roma parents) and supported 268 teachers. Specifically, under the grant support provided to schools, more than 113 education activities were organised by schools, indirectly reaching around 7 500 children.

From March to June 2021, an INSCHOOL international training course was organised to raise participants' understanding of the benefits of inclusive education. It was also aimed at developing their professional competences in methodological and pedagogical work with the intention of organising and implementing high quality and inclusive educational activities for all children, including Roma children, and other groups having different learning and educational needs. The training was attended by principals, teachers and education professionals from the Czech Republic, Romania and the Slovak Republic. In Romania in 2021, JP INSCHOOL commissioned a country report which includes specific policy recommendations on supporting quality and inclusive education. The report was based on the experience of the entire school community as part of the INSCHOOL project and the application of the "Index for Inclusion" methodology and will serve as a reference and guidance to relevant education stakeholders involved in dealing with inclusive education in the country. The INSCHOOL Stocktaking Conference organised on 28 June 2021 was an opportunity to ensure exchange of knowledge among relevant policy makers and education partners from the Czech Republic, Romania and the Slovak Republic about the achievements and challenges in the educational system. Conference participants acknowledged the benefits of the INSCHOOL methodology and reaffirmed their commitment to inclusive education and practice for all children, including Roma.

As part of the third cycle of implementation of JP INSCHOOL (December 2021 – August 2023), an institutional needs mapping exercise was initiated in Portugal, Romania, and the Slovak Republic with the objective of identifying institutional, human and organisational needs of relevant inclusive education and Roma inclusion stakeholders. The mapping report will support the development of a specific and country-based programme of activities which will support the development and implementation of national inclusive education policies

and promote innovative education practices, in line with European standards and principles on quality inclusive education in Bulgaria, the Czech Republic, Portugal, Romania and the Slovak Republic.

Within the framework of the Council of Europe Action Plan Project, the Council of Europe supported the Ukrainian authorities in co-operation with ERIAC in enhancing the quality of teaching in the Romani language. The Council of Europe provided assistance in establishing the inter-agency Working Group for the codification of Romani and codified a dictionary of 700 words in Romani, which will serve as a basis for the development of teaching materials. In the course of 2021 and 2022, assistance will be provided in the development of a curriculum and of teaching materials in the Romani language for primary schools.

An ADI-ROM Thematic Visit hosted by Bosnia and Herzegovina on legislation and policies related to begging, with a special focus on children took place in Sarajevo from 13-15 October 2021. Partner countries included Belgium, Finland, France, and Greece. The thematic visit report focused on the situation of the most vulnerable Roma children who are occasionally or consistently resorting to begging or forced to beg. The exchange between the partner countries and the host country highlighted the fact that mechanisms and protocols exist at state and municipal level which should be activated when victims of child trafficking have been identified but that when implemented the authorities' action often lack strength, coordination and cooperation between relevant stakeholders. Without any additional measures the impact of punishing both the victims (Roma children), their parents and communities is weak and may also prove to be a discriminatory approach. Standardisation of the protocols is essential across the municipal services, cantons/regions and different governmental entities.

The Youth Department translated and published the manual "Mirrors: Manual on combating antigypsyism through human rights education" in Hungarian, German, Portuguese, Russian and Ukrainian and the handbook "Right to remember" in German and Ukrainian.

Under the CoE project "Strengthening the protection of national minorities, including Roma and minority languages of Ukraine" - Phase II the presentation of Romani language curriculum for 1-2 grades in the Ukraine was scheduled for 24 February, but could not be conducted because of the Russian invasion of the Ukraine. The work on the curriculum for 3-4 grades was renewed in July.

ECRI published several country monitoring reports since 2020. All reports feature an inclusive education chapter. In many of these reports, recommendations have been made with a view to tackling segregation of and bullying against Roma children in schools.²⁵ On 30 June 2020, ECRI held a webinar on inclusive education in times of the Covid-19 pandemic, including on how to mitigate the issue of distance education for Roma and migrant children. A teacher from the Slovak Republic spoke about her experience.

Several opinions of the Advisory Committee on the Framework Convention for the Protection of National Minorities adopted in 2020-2021 include recommendations on improving access to quality education for Roma pupils and students (Albania, Latvia), fighting school segregation (Bulgaria, Hungary, Romania, Serbia, Ukraine) and further reducing school absenteeism and early dropouts (Cyprus, Latvia, Portugal, Serbia, Spain).

The Education Department of the Council of Europe acts as International Partner Organisation in the EEA/Norway Grants Programme in Bulgaria, Romania and the Slovak Republic, supporting the social inclusion of vulnerable groups with a focus on Roma. The three programmes assist municipalities and civil society organisations in implementing measures aimed at the social inclusion of children and youth at risk, including Roma, through education and youth work, as well as integrated measures for Roma inclusion. Specific advice and support have been provided to the three beneficiary countries in designing open calls for projects, selecting the projects for funding, and monitoring their implementation. Links and communication channels with relevant Council of Europe standards such as the CM Recommendation (2012)13 on ensuring quality education, the Council of Europe Quality Label for Youth Centres, were provided, complementing activities implemented by the JPs INSCHOOL and ROMACT.

Despite the Council of Europe's decades-long engagement with Romani issues, the educational inclusion of Romani children and adolescents continues to present major challenges. In 2018-19 a Council of Europe expert group set out to elaborate more detailed guidance, proposing new ways of managing the educational inclusion of Romani children and adolescents. The group's proposals, which have implications for the educational inclusion of other linguistic and cultural minorities, are based on the Council of Europe's concept of plurilingual and intercultural education.

This work was presented to the Steering Committee for Education and at various internal and external events/meetings to relevant stakeholders including Roma NGOs. It was followed by a call for interest to member states to participate in a policy experimentation that aims to improve educational inclusion of Romani children and adolescents through plurilingual education. After bilateral exchanges and extensive negotiations three countries, Greece, Slovakia and Slovenia have decided to participate in the Romani-Plurilingual Policy Experimentation. The policy experimentation was launched on 23 March 2022 with high level participation from ministries of education. It will run for four school years from 2022 to 2025 in 12 primary schools in the participating member states, and provide both quantitative and qualitative data and evidence from practice that will inform and guide further policy development in this field.

2.3.2 The teaching of Roma history and the Roma Holocaust is promoted and included in school curricula and textbooks, including through training of trainers and teachers

On 1 July 2020, the CM Recommendation CM/Rec(2020)2 on the inclusion of the history of Roma and/or Travellers in school curricula and teaching materials was adopted by the Committee of Ministers. The text is available on the websites of the Committee of Ministers and the Roma and Travellers Team in 22 languages. ²⁶

On 17 March 2022, the CM Recommendation CM/Rec(2022)5 on passing on remembrance of the Holocaust and preventing crimes against humanity was adopted by the Committee of Ministers. The text is available on the Committee of Ministers website and encompasses the remembrance of all victims of Nazi crimes including, among others, the Roma.²⁷

In 2020 and at the beginning of 2021, the Roma and Travellers Team published the following awareness-raising and teaching materials in order to support the implementation of the aforementioned recommendation:

- Analytical Report on the Representation of Roma in European Curricula and Textbooks
- The representation of Roma in major European museum collections: Volume 1 The Louvre
- The representation of Roma in major European museum collections: Volume 2 the Prado

In April 2022, a webinar on "Teaching the History of Minorities in Europe: the Case of Roma History" was coorganised by the Observatory on History Teaching in Europe and the Roma and Travellers Team. It gathered 60 participants, including scholars and government representatives.

In 2020, the Roma and Travellers Team also supported the production and publication of a trilingual (English, Albanian, Romani) volume of Romani legends and fairy tales by the Albanian artist Sead Kazanxhiu. In addition, the teaching of the Romani language is promoted by the Council of Europe. On 5 November 2020, the World Day of Romani Language, the Chair of the Committee of Experts for the European Charter for Regional or Minority Languages and a representative of the Romani Language Programme in the Education Policy Division of the Council of Europe Secretariat contributed to the International Conference "Safeguarding our Romani Language", organised by ERIAC.

In its opinions on Portugal and Spain, the Advisory Committee on the Framework Convention for the Protection of National Minorities recommended the authorities promote the teaching of Roma history for all students and referred to the above-mentioned CM Recommendation.

The Council of Europe supported the study on The Roma Holocaust/Roma Genocide in Southeastern Europe published in June 2020, by the Auschwitz Institute for the Prevention of Genocide and Mass Atrocities. The Council of Europe, the International Holocaust and Remembrance Alliance, the François-Xavier Bagnoud Center for Health and Human Rights and the Roma Integration team of the Regional Cooperation were partners in this study.

3. Cross-Cutting Issues

It is increasingly recognised that there can be several – intersecting - grounds for discrimination at play in a given case. A person who is a victim of racial discrimination might also suffer discrimination on any other ground covered by Article 14 of the European Convention on Human Rights, amongst others, sex, religion or belief, sexual orientation or gender identity, age or disability. These different forms of discrimination are not mutually exclusive; multiple discrimination requires multi-layered responses. Unfortunately, neither the

concepts of multiple discrimination nor of intersectionality have yet been integrated into legal remedies, policy making or data collection.

In line with the 2010 Strasbourg Declaration on Roma, which highlights women's rights and gender equality, the Council of Europe remains sensitive to multiple discrimination and intersectionality as cross-cutting issues which permeate all specific actions in a horizontal way. The capacity of the Organisation to address multiple discrimination and intersectionality was greatly enhanced by the creation of a new intergovernmental structure (CDADI) with a broad anti-discrimination, diversity and inclusion mandate.

The 8th International Roma Women's Conference held in Strasbourg on 24-26 November 2021 included for the first time on its agenda workshops on Intersectional Romani Feminism- A dialogue on its practice and meaning and on Being LGBTI and Roma or Traveller women. A research paper on Roma LGBTI Activism and Intersectional Antigypsyism has been commissioned by the Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity Unit within the project "Human Rights and Equality of LGBTI Persons III". The research sheds light on the experiences of Roma LGBTI persons in the Western Balkans. Research findings show that that the public discourse on Roma LGBTI persons has a problem-oriented focus rather than celebrating the specificity of the intersectional identity aspects. Additionally, the research aims to bring forward Roma LGBTI voices to counter intersectional discrimination. The findings will contribute to the development of cooperation activities in the member States on Roma LGBTI intersectionality.

Specific cross-cutting activities undertaken by the Council of Europe include the legal empowerment component of the JP JUSTROM, which has an intersectional approach, focusing on Roma women's rights. From March 2020 to February 2022, the JP JUSTROM held Roma women mentoring programmes in Bulgaria, Greece and Italy. JUSTROM facilitators motivated 37 Roma women to be trained and mentored to become community leaders in order to represent their communities. In total, 126 mentoring sessions were organised on topics such as basic principles of human rights, provision of legal aid, family law issues, children's rights and statelessness, social and health rights. They also benefited from mentoring sessions on opportunities in education and employment, on how to set up an NGO, on vocational guidance, and on Roma women's participation in decision making. Information days were organised in all JUSTROM implementing countries, with municipalities or other local actors targeting both municipal civil servants and Roma women to promote mutual understanding and remove barriers and problems faced by Roma women to enhance provision of services and rights.

Following the JUSTROM mentoring programme, Roma women leaders organised a total of 239 outreach activities across various settings, including schools and their communities. The activities varied in nature and were a first important step for Roma women community leaders to put into practice the skills learnt during the mentoring sessions. Other activities within the JUSTROM programme's empowerment component consisted of the organisation of 33 information days with municipalities or other local actors targeting both municipal civil servants and Roma women, with the purpose of promoting mutual understanding and removing barriers faced by Roma women to enhance the provision of services and rights. Within the same component, 266 awareness raising gatherings took place and 53 meetings of Roma women leaders with representatives of municipalities, equality bodies and other institutions.

The Parliamentary Assembly's Committee on Equality and Non-Discrimination prepared the draft report *Enhancing participation of women from under-represented groups in political and public decision-making* (4503) and the draft report *Addressing inequalities in the right to a safe, healthy and clean environment,* debated in June 2021, will take into account environmental racism.

The latest GREVIO (Istanbul Convention) baseline evaluation reports on Slovenia (2021), Poland (2021) and Romania (2022) include findings on how to improve the protection of Roma women and girls from gender-based and domestic violence and provide them with adequate support. The protection of Roma women from gender-based and domestic violence was also discussed during GREVIO's monitoring visits to Bosnia and Herzegovina. Moreover, GREVIO is likely to assess the situation of Roma women experiencing gender-based violence during visits to North Macedonia and Croatia.

In its statement adopted at its 88^{th} plenary meeting (29 March -1 April 2022) on the consequences of the aggression of the Russian Federation against Ukraine, ECRI pointed to reports about unjustified differential treatment of *inter alia* Roma fleeing Ukraine. It hopes that these reports would be effectively investigated and that the authorities would ensure that there is no discrimination against any of the people who should be offered protection and assistance.

In 2020-2021, the Drafting Committee on Migrant Women (GEC-MIG) met four times. It was a subordinate body to the Gender Equality Commission (GEC) and tasked by the Committee of Ministers to draft a Recommendation on migrant and refugee women, which would replace Recommendation Rec(79)10 concerning women migrants. The resulting Recommendation CM Rec (2022)17 on protecting the rights of migrant, refugee and asylum-seeking women and girls was adopted by the GEC in November 2021 and by the Committee of Ministers on 20 May 2022²⁸. The GEC also continued the dissemination of its "Sexism: See it. Name it. Stop it! Campaign!", which includes an intersectional perspective. Tools are available in 25 languages.

Given the wish expressed by donors from the EEA/Norway Grants to increase the Council of Europe's work on Roma rights in the funding mechanism, the Cooperation Unit within the Gender Equality Division (GED-Coop)²⁹ has been working closely with the Roma and Traveller's Team (RTT) to provide resources to relevant programmes. In addition, through the EEA/Norway Grants' SYNERGY Network against domestic and genderbased violence, the RTT has held an increasingly visible role in conferences and meetings on specific topics related to violence against women and was involved in planning and implementing meetings and conferences since 2000.

In 2022, the ADI-ROM set up a working group that started to prepare a Committee of Ministers Recommendation on equality for Roma and Traveller women and girls.

Activities carried out in response to the COVID-19 pandemic in order to alleviate the negative impact of the health and sanitary crisis on Roma and Traveller communities

Activities to alleviate the negative impact of the COVID-19 health and sanitary crisis on Roma and Traveller communities were originally not foreseen in the Strategic Action Plan for Roma and Traveller Inclusion (2020-2025), approved by the Committee of Minsters before the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic in Europe.

As of Spring 2020, the Committee of Experts on Roma and Traveller Issue (ADI-ROM) has placed the impact of the COVID-19 crisis on Roma and Traveller communities as a recurrent item for topical and urgent debate on the agenda of its meetings. In related debates, it has shared experiences and examples of good governmental practice to mitigate the risks and put together a compilation of best practices in member States. It also contributed to the study conducted in 2020 by the CDADI on "COVID-19: an analysis of the antidiscrimination, diversity and inclusion dimensions in Council of Europe member States", which led to the preparation and adoption of 2021 Guidelines of the Committee of Ministers of the Council of Europe on upholding equality and protecting against discrimination and hate during the COVID-19 pandemic and similar crises in the future. The CDADI furthermore published a compilation of promising and good practice examples of responses to the COVID-19 pandemic in the fields of non-discrimination, diversity and inclusion.

Since April 2020, the JP JUSTROM Programme has undertaken the following activities:

- Direct participation in local and national emergency campaigns in line with instructions from relevant national or local sanitary authorities;
- Information dissemination (Facebook, WhatsApp support groups, phone calls, flyers, etc.), distribution of hygiene products, material and food, translation and distribution of healthcare/ COVID-19 related national brochures/instructions in minority languages, distribution of educational material to Roma children;
- Facilitating access to Roma communities by actors leading prevention and/or emergency activities (municipalities, NGOs, Red Cross, Civil protection, etc., depending on the context);
- Assisting Roma women community leaders involved in or initiating activities in the communities to prevent, mitigate and/or overcome the negative impact of the COVID-19 pandemic;
- Legal consultation and information on access to healthcare;
- Legal monitoring of possible abuses during the crisis period and reporting to the relevant national authorities and/or the Council of Europe;
- Advocacy work towards relevant local authorities for the provision of public services, in particular access to healthcare, water, and municipal services;
- Raising the awareness of Roma communities about their rights regarding access to healthcare and sanitary services.

Between May and June 2020, JP INSCHOOL alleviated difficulties faced by schools following the outbreak of COVID-19, following a needs assessment, by re-adjusting its granting scheme by offering grants of up to € 2,000 to five schools in Romania. More specifically, the action aimed at:

- Capacity-building of school staff and teachers in using ICT and online platforms for more effective learning and pupil engagement;
- Support and coaching of teachers and schools in improving remote contact and communication with parents and children;
- Emotional and psychological support for teachers, parents and students in overcoming anxiety due the confinement and physical isolation; and
- Effective and post-lockdown support for children and teachers in their transition back to schools.

In the first half of 2021, at the time of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Roma and Travellers Team established co-operation with the Ministry of Education and Research of Romania through a Memorandum of Understanding with the main aim of ensuring support to schools to provide access to inclusive quality education and training within the Romanian educational system. As a result, 39 microgrants were provided to schools in disadvantaged localities in 2020/2021. The total funds provided amounted to nearly $\leq 90,000$ under the first wave of the pandemic. Activities took place between November 2020 and December 2021. The support provided was inspired by the JP INSCHOOL experience at practice level and included the application of the project methodology.

From April 2020 to December 2022, JP ROMACT awarded 46 small grants to different stakeholders in partner municipalities in Bulgaria and Romania, focusing on awareness-raising and material aid aimed at overcoming the impact of the pandemic on the most vulnerable in the Roma communities. The projects included information campaigns, distribution of protective items, food items and hygiene products, as well as disinfection of public spaces. From April to December 2020, JP ROMACTED awarded top-up funds to 49 small grants scheme projects to five beneficiaries and supported organisations in Montenegro and Turkey to ease the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic. JP ROMACTED II had a specific component that targeted post-COVID activities in the Western Balkans and Turkey. From June 2021 onwards, specific action plans were drawn up with beneficiaries, and community needs assessments were undertaken in the areas of education, employment, housing, and health in Roma communities. In March 2022, an assessment report was published in Kosovo as part of the JP ROMACTED II Programme on the rate of COVID-19 vaccinations in the Roma Ashkali Egyptian communities on: access, information, hesitancy, and barriers. The report is available in English, Albanian, Serbian and Romani.

In parallel, many departments in the Council of Europe adapted their work programmes to take account of the crisis, ranging from activities to safeguard and promote the respect for human rights, democracy and the rule of law in times of crisis, to the actual and very practical provision of support and assistance in cash or in kind to communities in situations of particular vulnerability. These activities are listed hereafter.

In Spring 2020, the Gender Equality Division started to gather information, in co-operation with the GREVIO Secretariat, on the gender equality-related impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. In October 2020, a conference on this topic was organised together with the Greek CM Presidency and subsequently a report was produced. Analysis has shown that the COVID-19 pandemic has affected women and men differently. From the rise in gender-based violence against women, including domestic violence, to effects on paid and unpaid work, women, especially women from disadvantaged groups such as Roma, are more negatively impacted than men in the enjoyment of their basic rights and economic independence.

On 22 April 2020, the European Committee of Social Rights, the body responsible for overseeing the implementation of the European Social Charter, issued its Statement of Interpretation on the Right to Protection of Health in Times of Pandemic. This statement emphasizes the interrelation of the right to protection of health with other rights enshrined in the European Social Charter, such as the right to social and medical assistance, the right to housing, the right to freedom from poverty and social exclusion, and the right to safe and healthy working conditions.

On 19 May 2020, ECRI's Bureau issued a statement expressing alarm about reports of growing hardships suffered by groups of concern to ECRI, in particular Roma and migrants, as well as the increased exposure of these groups to hate speech and violence, during the COVID-19 pandemic. In the reference period, ECRI adopted two annual reports highlighting that during the COVID-19 pandemic, the situation of Roma and Travellers deteriorated to a greater extent compared to other groups in society, especially in terms of access to education, work, health and other basic services.

On 29 May 2020, the Advisory Committee adopted a Statement on the COVID-19 pandemic and national minorities in which it expressed its deep concern that the COVID-19 pandemic had exacerbated the vulnerability of certain national minorities, Roma and Travellers in particular, and deepened the already existing inequalities in many Council of Europe Member states. Since March 2020, the Advisory Committee has requested information from state authorities about the impact of COVID-19 on national minorities, in particular on the most vulnerable ones, including Roma and Travellers. On 18 May 2020, the Committee of Experts of the European Charter for Regional or Minority Languages (COMEX) expressed concern over the lack of communication in regional or minority languages during the health crisis, and on 3 July 2020 published a statement on regional or minority languages in online education in the context of the COVID-19 pandemic.

During the second half of 2020, the Ukraine Action Plan Project provided assistance to the Office of the Ombudsperson in preparing the report on "The Impact of the COVID-19 Pandemic on the Roma Community in Ukraine", which was presented to the public in December 2020. Materials of the Ministry of Health related to the prevention of Covid-19 were translated into the Romani language and disseminated in Ukraine.

The Children's Rights Division organised a "COVID-19 and children's rights" webinar in March 2021 through the Steering Committee for the Rights of the Child (CDENF), focusing on "Overcoming educational challenges" covering the challenges relating to ensuring access to distance education and learning for all children, including children from ethnic minorities, children in care and other vulnerable groups; the report and presentations are available at: https://www.Council of Europe.int/en/web/children/-/Covid-19-and-childrens-rights-overcoming-education-challenges.

PACE

On 27 March 2020, the PACE Rapporteur on Discrimination against Roma and Travellers in the field of housing, František Kopřiva (Czech Republic, ALDE), made a <u>statement</u> on the impact of the pandemic on these groups "COVID-19: Rapporteur denounces discrimination against Roma and Travellers".

On 8 April 2020, PACE General Rapporteur on combating racism and intolerance, Momodou Malcom Jallow (Sweden, UEL) made a <u>statement</u> for International Roma Day 2020, "Covid-19/International Roma Day: honouring resilience and resourcefulness in the face of anti-Gypsyism and discrimination" (Parliamentary Assembly – Committee on Equality and Non-Discrimination).

The Standing Committee on behalf of the Parliamentary Assembly prepared a report by the Committee on Equality and Non-Discrimination, which was adopted by the Assembly as Resolution 2339 (2021) on Upholding equality in times of crisis and pandemics: gender, equality, and non-discrimination (rapporteur Petra Stienen, the Netherlands, ALDE). The report (adopted in the committee on 10 July 2020) deals extensively with the impact of the pandemic on Roma and Travellers.

At the Parliamentary Assembly's Committee on Equality and Non-Discrimination, a hearing took place on 2 February 2021 with the participation of a representative of a Roma organisation and a member of the Council of Europe Roma and Travellers Team, as part of the preparation of the report of Edite Estrela (Portugal, SOC) on addressing inequalities in access to environmental rights.

On 29 March 2021, the Sub-Committee on the Rights of Minorities and No Hate Parliamentary Alliance of the Parliamentary Assembly held a Webinar on "Environmental rights and climate change in Europe: hearing the voices of minorities and indigenous peoples", including examination of environmental racism against Roma, as part of the preparation of the report of Edite Estrela (Portugal, SOC) on addressing inequalities in access to environmental rights.

On 19 April 2021, the Parliamentary Assembly adopted Resolution 2368 (2021) and Recommendation 2198 (2021) on Preserving national minorities in Europe (rapporteur Elvira Kovács, Serbia, EPP/CD). The related report (adopted in committee on 27 November 2020) deals inter alia with issues concerning Roma as national minorities.

5. Conclusions and way forward

The implementation of the Strategic Action Plan for Roma and Traveller Inclusion (2020-2025) in the reporting period allowed for making significant progress in the three priority areas and in better mainstreaming Roma and Traveller issues across the work of the entire Organisation. Since March 2020, however, the work has been impeded by the COVID-19 pandemic which has posed unprecedented challenges in the sphere of human rights protection. In particular, the circumstances of vulnerable groups already discriminated against, such as Roma and Travellers, have become even more dire, including through the increase of hatred and xenophobia, diminishing employment and growing numbers of Roma and Traveller children dropping out of school, due to limited access to distance learning.³⁰

Still, the Council of Europe was able to make a difference for Roma and Travellers by advocating for changes in the member States and supporting them in their endeavours. The main achievements of this reporting period include most importantly the strengthening of the capacities of local authorities to respond to the needs of Roma and Travellers, capacity building and empowerment for Roma women, enhancing effective participation of Roma and Travellers in decision making processes, monitoring the situation of Roma and Travellers during the COVID-19 pandemic and strengthening the resilience of Roma and Traveller communities and individuals, as well as the capacities of member States to respond to the pandemic, especially by supporting local level initiatives and strengthening inclusive education.

The work on several new Council of Europe standards relevant to the protection and inclusion of Roma and Travellers has been finalised during this reporting period and led to the adoption of the new CM Recommendations on combating hate speech, on intercultural integration and on migrant, refugee and asylum-seeking women and girls. Furthermore, new studies on supporting minority youth participation and combating antigypsyism have been published. The work on new standards, such as recommendations on equality for Roma and Traveller women and girls and the active political participation of national minority youth is underway. Similarly, the Roma and Traveller Team is working on a capacity-building programme and tools supporting the implementation of Recommendation CM/Rec(2020)2 on the inclusion of the history of Roma and/or Travellers in school curricula and teaching materials at national level. Other important developments include decisions by the ECtHR related to Roma and Travellers such as on school segregation, ethnic profiling and police violence, the prohibition of begging, forced evictions and discrimination.

The joint European Union and the Council of Europe Programme "Roma Women's Access to Justice" ended in February 2022 after being implemented in three phases (JUSTROM 1-3) since October 2016. The JUSTROM Programme focused on addressing multiple discrimination and improving related access to justice of Roma women in Bulgaria, Greece, Italy and Romania. The activities of JUSTROM Programme were organised around four pillars: empowerment of Roma women, providing information and legal assistance, enhancement of professional resources and increase of synergies and partnerships. During its implementation it reached over 20000 beneficiaries, raised awareness, skills and knowledge of Roma women, developed several capacity building tools as a legacy that can be used after the end of the programme by all relevant national and international stakeholders and partners of the programme. The capacity building process resulted in pools of trainers and enhanced expertise of various professionals on topics such as: anti-discrimination, Council of Europe Convention on preventing and combating violence against women and domestic violence, Council of Europe Convention on Action against Trafficking in Human Beings, statelessness, gender equality, and European Court of Human Rights standards related to the rights of Roma and women, etc. Other capacity building tools developed by JUSTROM are the revision of the Roma module within the anti-discrimination Council of Europe HELP course, a collection of good practices, and syllabi on anti-discrimination, gender equality and Roma women.

During the reporting period, the planned peer-to-peer exchanges and intergovernmental face-to-face meetings suffered from the lockdown and travel ban across Europe. However, many were replaced with online meetings and webinars to the extent possible and with working more closely with local communities most affected by the consequences of the pandemic. Also, despite the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, the Roma and Traveller Team managed to organise an important event, namely the 8th International Roma Women's Conference in Strasbourg in November 2021.

During the upcoming reporting period, all departments of the Council of Europe Secretariat are invited to continue focusing on the three priority areas: combating antigypsyism and discrimination, supporting democratic participation, and access to inclusive quality education.
