Workshop 1: Backlog reduction tool

The CEPEJ adopted the Backlog Reduction Tool in 2023. The pilot courts contributed to the elaboration of this tool by sharing their experiences in fighting backlog of cases. This workshop is a follow-up to the discussion at the 16th plenary meeting held in 2023 to see how best to implement the Backlog Reduction Tool.
