SBAA background



About the SBAs

- 397.4km of terrestrial territory
- United Kingdom overseas territory
- SBA Administration funded by MOD
- A primary function of the SBAA is to ensure that the SBAs can be used in support British Forces Cyprus, including the provision of Military Training Activities.

Our biodiversity

- Very important fly-way and migration route
- Numerous endemic and red list species
- Important habitats & protected species
- Nationally and internationally protected areas



Bird Trapping & Poaching in the SBAs

- Is an island-wide multi-faceted problem extending into SBAs
- 'Ambelopoulia' is an expensive Cyprus delicacy. Birds are lured, illegally captured by non-selective methods, slaughtered and sold for profit by organised groups or consumed by individuals
- Strong links to organised crime







Where did the Strategic approach come from?

- Result of political & media pressure on SBAA and UK government from local and International NGOs
- Identified the activity as a significant risk to the SBAA
- Legal obligations of the SBAA (national & international)



Establishing the SBAA approach



The Annual Action Plan

- Delivered by SBA Police Community Action Team(CAT)
- Phased approach
 - 1. Phase 1 Pre-season preparations (July-Sept)
 - 2. Phase 2 Trapping season(Sept-April)
 - 3. Phase 3 Post season activities (May-June)

Objectives of plan:

- To <u>disrupt and deter</u> bird trappers
- Intelligence led operations utilizing 'Hot net' list
- Implementation of new <u>legislation</u> in line with RoC
- Utilize available <u>technology</u> (Drones & covert surveillance cameras)
- Arrest offenders / High investigation standards / Secure best evidence / scene findings for Prosecution / 'Zero tolerance!' / Deterrent Court punishments
- Communicate SBA Police & partnership work, with successful operational outcomes on Social media


- Illegal use of water supplies & boreholes

- Removal of Acacia trees







Current situation

- Understanding the affect of the pandemic
- Acacia management (£3m spent annually by MOD)
- Funding significant ongoing annual SBA Police resource
- Protected site management plans/actions to further reduce bird-trapping & poaching
- Successful community engagement increasing support for Acacia management & habitat restoration
- Requirement to maintain technological and tactical advantages (skills and knowledge)





Looking forward: Next steps & challenges

- Maintain approach:
 - tactical co-ordination partnership
 - update legislation and legal powers
- Justifying resources for further reductions (against other risk/threats to SBAA)
- Habitat management to support further reduction;
 - legacy of Acacia saligna
 - Access to sites
- Shift focus to preventative measures & deterrents;
 - Education and awareness
 - Pro-active habitat management
 - Access management
 - Eco-tourism potential
