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1. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

GEPAC - "Support to the anti-corruption strategy of Georgia" – started on 1 September 2007. The present report summarizes the activities carried out during the inception phase of the project, from 1 September 2007 to 30 October 2007.

1.1 Beneficiary Country and Institution(s)

The beneficiary country is Georgia.

The main project partner from the Georgian side is:

1.3 Implementing Organization

The Council of Europe is responsible for the implementation of the project and the use of the project funds under the contract with the Ministry for Development Co-operation of the Kingdom of the Netherlands. Within the General Secretariat of the Council of Europe in Strasbourg, the Economic Crime Division (Technical Co-operation Department, Directorate General of Human Rights and Legal Affairs) is responsible for overall management and supervision of the project. A Team Leader and two National Advisers, and a Local Project Officer, based in the Ministry on Reforms Coordination in Tbilisi, are supporting the implementation of the project.

1.4 Project Objective

The overall objective of GEPAC is to contribute to democracy and the rule of law through the prevention and control of corruption in Georgia in accordance with European and other international standards, as well as GRECO recommendations.

2. PROJECT ANALYSIS

2.1 Country Situation

According to recent surveys and studies, corruption is considered to be one of the key problems of Georgian society. The majority of people believe that corruption – in different forms as bribes, corrupt lobbying, trading in influence, nepotism, abuse of office, and other – is a common practice in everyday life. Corruption and conflicts of interest are reported to be widespread and integrity to be weak in most State and public bodies, including the executive, the judiciary as well as in Parliament and among elected officials at central, regional and local levels. In 2007, Georgia ranked 79 in Transparency International's Corruption Perception Index; an improvement compared to previous years but still among the lowest of the 47 Council of Europe Member States.

The "National Anti-corruption Strategy of Georgia" was prepared by a working group led by the National Security Council between May and July 2005, and adopted by Decree N550 of the President of Georgia of 24 June 2005.

The "Action Plan for the Anti-corruption Strategy (2005-2006)" was drafted by a working group led by Kakha Bendookidze, State Minister for Reforms Coordination, and adopted by Decree N377 of the Government of Georgia of 12 September 2005. This was approved by Decree N155 of the President of Georgia of 28 March 2006.

The State Minister for Reforms Coordination is supervising the implementation of the Action Plan. In addition, according to the above mentioned Decrees, each institution appoints Contact Points tasked with and accountable for the implementation of the relevant anti-corruption measures (Working Party on Implementation of the Anti-corruption Strategy and Action Plan); the Contact Points are obliged to report, every two months, to the Office of the State Minister on Reforms Coordination.

Given the importance the Georgian Government continues to attribute to anti-corruption issues, and in order to maintain the momentum created by the Anti-corruption Strategy and Action Plan, GEPAC was launched to provide necessary expertise and to contribute to the actual implementation of relevant reforms during 2007, 2008, and 2009.

In early October 2007, the President of Georgia, Mikheil Saakashvili, publicly announced the establishment of "a special anti-corruption commission", which would report to him and to the Speaker of the Parliament. The creation of such a structure was confirmed by the State Minister on Reforms Coordination Mr Kakha Bendookidze during the Start-up event of GEPAC, which took place in Tbilisi on 26 October 2007. In response to this decision, the project will therefore also assist the Georgian authorities in defining the nature, legal and institutional framework of the future specialised anti-corruption structure in line with the European and international standards.

In November 2007, Georgia faced its most serious political crisis since the 2003 "Rose Revolution". A week of anti-government protests in the capital Tbilisi prompted President Saakashvili to impose a state of emergency on 7 November for a period of 15 days. The Council of Europe and the wider international community strongly urged the President Saakashvili to lift the state of emergency, which was lifted on 16 November 2007. Early presidential elections have been set for 5 January 2008. Against the background of this political crisis, and pending the outcome and aftermath of the presidential elections, the project team has decided to postpone certain activities, which require political stability for their successful implementation. While the Workplan have been agreed during the Start-up Event and have not been altered, the timelines have since been adjusted to take into account the political situation in the country and to allow realistic timelines. This concerns activities foreseen only under Output 1: "Round table on tools of reporting, co-operation and monitoring the implementation of anti-corruption measures" initially for seen for November 2007 and which will take place in January 2008; "Preparation of a feasibility study on the spesialised anti-corruption structure" foreseen for December 2007 which will start in January 2008.

2.2 Project Objective

GEPAC aims at strengthening national capacities in support of the implementation of Georgia's Anticorruption Strategy and Action Plan, in compliance with European and international standards. In order to achieve this objective, the project works in five complementary directions:

- strengthening the capacities of the anti-corruption policy institutions in order to manage, coordinate and monitor the implementation of the Anti-corruption Action Plan;
- co-ordinating and monitoring the implementation of the Anti-corruption Action Plan through reviewing the Anti-corruption Strategy and up-dating the Action Plan;
- elaborating and improving primary and secondary legislation concerning criminalization and prevention of corruption;
- strengthening the capacities of the prosecution to investigate and prosecute high-level corruption; and
- introducing pilot activities to enhance integrity and institutional capacities as tools for the prevention of corruption.

2.3 Expected Results and Methodology

The expected results are to update the existing Anti-corruption Strategy and Action Plan so that they reflect and include policy actions to implement all GRECO recommendations made in the report of the Second Round of Evaluation and in the OECD/ACN Monitoring Reports; to elaborate anti-corruption and economic crime related draft amendments which comply with international and European standards and/or best practices; to increase the capacity of the Prosecution to investigate high-level cases of corruption; to establish corruption-prevention plans and other.

Moreover, the project will support the conduction of a feasibility study and identification of possible models of creation of a specialized body/structure (see above under 2.1) responsible for the coordination of national efforts in combating and prevention of corruption.

These objectives will be achieved through close co-operation with all relevant stakeholders, the identification of international and national experts, through organizing round-tables, workshops and study visits for practitioners, preparation and finalization of feasibility studies and conducting surveys, and drafting of legal texts in accordance with the UN Convention against Corruption (UNCAC).

2.5 Inputs

The following types of activities are proposed within the project:

Expert advise – provided by the LT-Adviser within his/her competence/experience or, as necessary, by ST-Advisers selected according to their specific field of competence, through direct conversation with individual officials or groups of officials on the issues specified in the Work Plan and wherever necessary.

Expert opinions – will be provided in writing, as necessary, to comment on the pieces of legislation or their drafts or other documents, by independent experts from the Council of Europe Member States, via the CoE Secretariat.

Study visits to other CoE Member States - provide first-hand experience to complement the theory and help individuals to examine possible changes to their own procedures and approaches, and also initiate the basis for launching co-operation and networking with other CoE Member States.

Roundtables and seminars - allowing stakeholders/professional groups and individuals to look at ways in which their own policies can be reformed. They will also be used to contribute specialist knowledge to a broader debate on a given issue.

Workshops - allow a particular task to be undertaken involving multiple co-operating parties. Experts put their knowledge at the disposal of practitioners and officials. Workshops can also be used to provide specific advanced training.

Training courses – allow participants to acquire new knowledge and/or professional skills through interaction with a qualified trainer. Elements of self-education can be included.

Research/Surveys – a way to get a comprehensive overview of a given issue to serve a basis for further analysis, and/or provide situation/status data which would assist in identifying issues of concern and be used as recommendation/benchmarking basis and justification. Follow up of these kind of activities serves also to assess progress and measure change through previously set up indicators.

Translations - make important texts and information accessible in local languages and can be used as a tool in training activities and seminars.

Publication and dissemination of texts and/or audiovisual CD-ROMs - ensure that certain expertise or knowledge is made available to the widest possible audience.

The following activities were carried out during the inception phase of the project:

3.2 Finalisation and adoption by stakeholders of the final Workplan and logical framework

A working meeting with representatives of the Office of the State Minister on Reforms Coordination and one international expert was organised on 16-18 October 2007 in Strasbourg in order to prepare the project's Work Plan and discuss key organisational and logistics issues related to the implementation of the project. The Work Plan (Annex 1) was then presented and approved at the project's Start-up Event on 26 October in Tbilisi. As a result, a calendar of activities (Annex 2) was determined, taking into consideration the Work Plan, as well as the ongoing political crisis in Georgia.

3.3 Set-up of Project Team

The project team both based in Strasbourg and Tbilisi will be composed of 6 members.

In Strasbourg, a Project Officer was nominated within the Anti-corruption and Fraud unit in order to start the implementation and delivery of the project's objectives. The Project Officer, Ms Tanya Peshovska, will be dealing with day-to-day management of project activities under the authority of the Head of Unit, Ms Ardita Abdiu.

In Tbilisi, a Project Implementation Unit (PIU) was set-up. Mr Levan Khetsuriani was selected for the position of GEPAC National Long-term Advisor. For the start-up period two more national advisors were selected - Mr Givi Kutidze and Ms Natia Khantadze¹. The PIU members are responsible for the day-to-day implementation of the major part of the activities of the project. The PIU will be supported by one Local Project Officer (LPO) for administration and secretarial/translations assistance. The position of LPO was offered to Ms Tamara Katsitadze.

The PIU will be located in the premises of the Ministry on Reforms Coordination in Tbilisi. The Ministry is currently trying to find appropriate premises; however, at the time of writing, no office space had been identified for the project team, yet.

3.4 Start-up Event and adoption of Workplan (Tbilisi, 26 October 2007)

The project's Start-up Event was organied, in consultation with the Embassy of the Kingdom of the Netherlands in Georgia, on 26 October 2007 at Marriott Hotel in Tbilisi. The aim of the Start-up Event was to publicize the commencement of the project, to introduce the project's concept and objectives, and to present and adopt the project's Work Plan.

The meeting was opened by the State Minister on Reforms Coordination of Georgia, Mr Kakha Bendookidze. In his opening remarks, the Minister confirmed the commitment to the fight against corruption and to the project in particular. He stressed the importance of the elaboration of a concept on the nature, legal and institutional framework of a future specialized anti-corruption structure of Georgia. The participants were also addressed by Mr Onno Eledrenbosch, Ambassador of the Kingdom of Netherlands to Georgia, and Mr Giovanni Palmieri, Head of the Technical Co-operation Department of the Council of Europe (Agenda in Annex 3).

Representatives of all beneficiary institutions and international organizations, about 30 participants, were invited. The discussions on the project objectives and Work Plan confirmed that there was considerable need to identify practical solutions to combat corruption in Georgia.

3.5 Visibility/Media Coverage

The launching of the project was announced on the webpage of the Economic Crime Division (www.coe.int/economiccrime) as well as through the Council of Europe press release (Annex 4), which was translated into Georgian. The State Ministry on Reforms Coordination issued a second press release on the day of the conference. The meeting was attended by the most important Georgian TV channels and newspapers which contributed to the publicity of the project.

3.6 Planning of Project Activities under the Project's Work Plan

In spite of the political situation in the country, the project has initiated the first activities under the Work Plan.

First, discussions have been undertaken between the Project Team and the Ministry on Reforms Coordination about the preparation of the feasibility study and possible models for the future specialized anti-corruption structure. The first draft paper containing the President's and government's proposals will be prepared by the end of December 2007.

Second, initial steps have been undertaken to design a special webpage on anti-corruption activities on the Office of the State Minister on Reforms Coordination's website which concept has to be finalised by the end of January 2008. It will then be regularly up-dated. The Economic Crime Division is also building a specialised anti-corruption webpage and one dedicated to the project itself.

The Project team plans also to start organising the first activities in January 2008.

In addition, the PIU, together with the project management unit in Strasbourg and the Ministry on Reforms Coordination in Tbilisi, is establishing a pool of national and international experts for the implementation of GEPAC's activities. Necessary administrative arrangements are being discussed to ensure the smooth procurement of expertise and activities.

4. CONCLUSION

The main partners/beneficiaries (the Ministry on Reforms Coordination, the Ministry of Interior, and the General Prosecutor's Office) reaffirmed their will to further engage in the implementation of the project with the aim to empower national authorities to better fight against corruption. During the Start-up Event organized in Tbilisi in October, the Ministry on Reforms Coordination stressed that the creation of a specialized structure against corruption was one of the main objectives of the Government. Therefore, the project will provide international assistance in the establishment of such a mechanism. The preparation of a feasibility study for the specialized anti-corruption structure is to start in December 2007.

Strasbourg, 18.10.2007 – The Council of Europe is launching a new technical co-operation project in Georgia, entitled "Support to the Anti-corruption Strategy of Georgia" (GEPAC), as part of its co-operation programme in the South Caucasus. The two-year project will also help to implement the recommendations made to Georgia by the Council's group of states against corruption (GRECO). It is funded by a voluntary contribution from the Ministry for Development Co-operation of the Netherlands.

The project will focus on five main areas: strengthening the capacities of anti-corruption institutions; co-ordinating and monitoring the implementation of the anti-corruption plan; elaborating and improving primary and secondary legislation concerning the criminalisation and prevention of corruption; strengthening capacities to investigate and prosecute high-level corruption; and introducing pilot activities to enhance integrity and institutional capacities as tools for the prevention of corruption.
