

Mr Frédéric Kurz is a Belgian national. He holds a law degree and a specialist degree in international and European law.

After eight years as a lawyer specialising in social issues for the Liege Bar, he served as a judge in the Labour Court for nearly ten years before being appointed Deputy Public Prosecutor and Advocate General at the Liege Labour Court.

Since 2004 he has been a senior co-ordinator for the network of expertise in human trafficking of the College of Prosecutors General. In this capacity, he participated in the development of the criminal policy of prosecution for human trafficking and co-ordinates its implementation by prosecutors and labour inspectors. He also leads a co-ordination team tasked with analysing the problems faced by judges in the application of Belgian law on human trafficking, and organises training of judges specialised in this field.

Mr. Kurz is also a member of the network of expertise in social criminal law of the College of Prosecutors General and is partially delegated to the federal Bureau of orientation of the Social Research and Information Service, which is responsible for a more effective fight against social fraud and illegal work. He exercises a judicial function before the Boards of Appeal in the field of social security and education.

His publications cover subjects including the principle of human dignity in Belgian law, the notions of forced labour and human trafficking for economic purposes, and trafficking in human beings as a world-wide phenomenon.
