Language Support for Adult Refugees: a Council of Europe toolkit

The Council of Europe is the continent's leading human rights organisation. As part of its project on Linguistic Integration of Adult Migrants (LIAM) it has developed a toolkit to support member states in their efforts to respond to the challenges posed by unprecedented migration flows.

The toolkit is designed to assist organisations that provide language support for refugees, and especially the volunteers working for them. In due course it will be made available on a dedicated website in 7 languages: English and French – the Council of Europe's official languages – Dutch, German, Greek, Italian and Turkish.

The Council of Europe (47 member states; headquarters in Strasbourg, France) aims to create a common democratic and legal area throughout the continent where respect for human rights, democracy and the rule of law are ensured. All the Council of Europe's actions are shaped by these values and by an enduring concern to promote social inclusion, social cohesion and respect for diversity.

For the past five decades one of the Council's major education programmes has focused on language policy; more recently it has also addressed the linguistic integration of adult migrants (LIAM). Migrants' acquisition of competence in the language(s) of the host country is a focus for political debate and policy initiatives in a growing number of Council of Europe member states.
