Draft ABRIDGED REPORT

Directorate General of Human Rights and Rule of Law

The Bureau of the Consultative Committee of the Convention for the Protection of Individuals with regard to Automatic Processing of Data ("Convention 108") held its 41st meeting in Paris from 29 to 31 March 2017 with Ms Alessandra Pierucci (Italy) in the chair. The agenda, as adopted by the Bureau, and the list of participants are set out in Appendices I and II.

The Bureau of the Committee of Convention 108:

1. expressed its satisfaction that Burkina Faso had been invited to accede to Convention 108 and the additional protocol thereto, and welcomed the participation of Ms Marguerite Ouedraogo Bonane, the Chair of the national data protection agency ("Information Technology and Freedoms Commission"), who informed the Bureau of the action taken following the Committee's opinion on its request,¹

2. took note of the information presented by the Secretariat on the activities carried out since the beginning of the year (see http://www.coe.int/fr/web/data-protection/news);

3. took note of the information on the latest discussions concerning the **modernisation of Convention 108** at the level of the Committee of Ministers' Rapporteur Group on Legal Co-operation (GR-J) (item on the agenda of its meeting of 6 April);

4. examined the draft recommendation on the protection of **health-related data**, presented by the expert, Ms Jeanne Bossi Malafosse, held an exchange of views, which partly took the form of a joint meeting with the Bureau of the Committee on Bioethics (DH-BIO),² and decided that the draft would be revised in the light of these discussions and distributed to the Committee delegations and the DH-BIO with a view to further consideration at the 34th plenary meeting on the basis of the written comments received;

5. examined the draft practical guide on the use of personal data in **the police sector**, held an exchange of views and decided that the draft would be revised by the Secretariat on the basis of these discussions and distributed to the Committee delegations and to the other committees concerned with a view to further consideration at the 34th plenary meeting, on the basis of the written comments received;

6. took note of the requests for **observer status** made by Japan and the Philippines and asked the Secretariat to consult the delegations by written procedure before the 34th plenary meeting;

7. examined the draft **agenda** of the 34th plenary meeting, for finalisation and dispatch to the delegations within the agreed timeframe, and held an exchange of views on the Committee's working methods and Rules of Procedure with a view to the possible amendment of the Rules at the 34th plenary meeting;

8. held an exchange of views on the Committee's draft **work programme** for the 2018-2019 biennium with a view to submission for approval at the 34th plenary meeting;

9. took note of the activities and major developments related to the work of the Committee, particularly the forthcoming European Conference of Data Protection Authorities (Limassol, 27 and 28 April 2017) and the activity report by the UN Special Rapporteur on the Right to Privacy, Mr Joseph Cannataci. In this connection the Bureau decided to step up its involvement in the activities carried out by the Special Rapporteur (particularly those relating to surveillance measures, co-operation with ICANN health-related data and big data);

10. took note of the presentation by Mr Nigel Hickson (Vice-President, ICANN) and the information given by the Chair of the Committee and the Secretariat on the events of the "**Privacy Day at ICANN58**", held an exchange of views and confirmed the need to continue to be involved in the work of this organisation;

11. took note of the information on **co-operation with other Council of Europe bodies**, particularly the work of the Steering Committee on Media and Information Society (CDMSI) and its Committee of Experts on Internet Intermediaries (MSI-NET), the work of the Cybercrime Committee (TC-Y) and the Committee on Bioethics (DH-BIO) and the priority areas of co-operation with the DH-BIO (particularly on the genome

and "direct-to-consumer" genetic testing), the Action Plan on Combating Transnational Organised Crime adopted by the European Committee on Crime Problems (CDPC), the preparation of "Guidelines to empower, protect and support children's safe access to their rights on the Internet" by the Ad hoc Committee for the Rights of the Child (CAHENF) and the work of the Parliamentary Assembly on technological convergence, artificial intelligence and human rights;

12. took note of the latest developments with regard to the Common Reporting Standard (CRS) of the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) and the **automatic exchange of information on financial accounts**, held an exchange of views on the current situation in this area and invited the delegations to make enquiries at national level about the notification of data protection carried out by their respective countries (see also Appendix C of the multilateral agreement);

13. took note of the information presented by the **observers**, namely recent developments relating to the activities of the ICRC, the AEDH (European Association for the Defence of Human Rights), the AFAPDP (French-Speaking Association of Personal Data Protection Authorities) and the European Commission;

14. confirmed the following **meeting dates for 2017**: 42nd Bureau meeting in Paris from 11 to 13 September and 43rd Bureau meeting in Geneva from 18 to 20 December. The dates of the Committee's plenary meetings are as follows: 34th plenary meeting from 19 to 21 June and 35th plenary meeting from 22 to 24 November, both in Strasbourg.
