




But then...

 understanding by building on and expanding existing knowledge, where possible.



Students should:

Be given

• the chance to contribute to their learning through elements of codesign.

Be guided

 towards becoming independent / self-directed learners.

Benefit

• from ongoing feedback on their learning as they participate.






- 1. Courses in human rights law
 - specific units in place of face-to-face teaching
 - units to allow students to develop their awareness of materials presented earlier in class
 - EG: CONSTITUTIONAL LAW
 - HUMAN RIGHTS LAW

- 2. Courses in other legal / political, etc subjects
 - 'embedded' HR modules in courses
 - EG : FAMILY LAW, CRIMINAL LAW, PROPERTY LAW
 - MEDICINE: BIOETHICS









Perceived threat to our standing as 'sources of knowledge'




