## **Speakers and Moderators**



Natalija Aceska has been active in education for more than twenty years in Macedonia. She started as a biology teacher and worked her way up to becoming a high school principal. Now, she advises the Ministry of Education and Science and leads an NGO called "Knowledge Harvest" in Prilep.

Throughout her career, Natalija has gained various certifications and achievements. She became a certified GLOBE International trainer in 2007 and has been a Scientix Ambassador for Macedonia since 2013. She's also recognized as an expert in European policy networks and plays a significant role in a Council of Europe project focused on sustainable development education.

Natalija's main focus is on improving education. She conducts training sessions for teachers and emphasizes the importance of STEM education and education for sustainable development. She's written research papers on democratic education, sustainable development, and STEM initiatives.

In her academic pursuits, Natalija completed a doctoral dissertation on integrating sustainable development into education. She's passionate about equipping educators with the skills they need to prepare students for the future.



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Andrew Azzopardi is an Associate Professor and Dean of the Faculty for Social Wellbeing and Head of the Department of Youth and Community Studies. His lecturing and research focus on inclusive education, sociology, critical pedagogy, disability politics, youth and community studies. He has contributed extensively to a number of lauded journals, and has published various texts on disability politics, young people, and inclusive education. He is a Member of the Editorial Panel of the highly acclaimed International Journal of Inclusive Education, and co-editor of Inclusive communities: A Critical Reader (2012). Azzopardi has also edited Youth: Responding to Lives - An International Reader (2013), coedited Perspectives on wellbeing - a reader (2019) and also co-edits societas.expert.



**Nevena Čabrilo** is a highly experienced and accomplished professional in the field of education. With over 30 years of experience and master's degree in biochemistry, she currently holds the position of senior advisor at Montenegro's Bureau for Educational Services. Throughout her career, she has gained extensive expertise in curriculum development for primary and secondary schools, education for sustainable development as well as in the integration of key competences into the education system of Montenegro.

In addition to her role as a senior advisor, Nevena is an active member of various international and national bodies for education and has authored numerous publications. Furthermore, she is teacher trainer and coordinator of various projects.

He has been designing, managing, implementing and monitoring social impact projects since 2007. Moreover, he is an experienced trainer in project cycle management and global education. Currently, he is Chairperson of SKOP (the National Platform of Maltese development NGOs) and the National Focal Point for AidWatch, representing SKOP in CONCORD structures, particularly in advocacy and monitoring of international aid for sustainable development. He works full-time as the Executive Director of the Maltese non-profit organisation Kopin (VO/0200).



Dr. Sallah has numerous publications in the fields of poetry; work with black young people; young Muslims; and globalisation/global youth work. His research interests include diversity, participatory methodologies, globalisation in relation especially to young people, and public engagement.

**Karim Tedjani** is a consultant and trainer whose journey began in 2010, as an environmental activist, with the creation of the first web portal in Algeria entirely dedicated to ecology, the environment and sustainable development. The portal was named "Nouara" after the first name of his great aunt, a rural woman from the northeast of Algeria who played a big role in his education in Algerian nature, both literally and figuratively.

With several thousands of press and scientific articles as well as hundreds of editorial articles by Karim Tedjani, "Nouara" quickly became a reference site for all those active in Algeria in all areas related to the environment. Karim travelled his vast country to understand on the ground the environmental issues affecting Algeria, to make them known to the general public and advocate to mitigate their effects. From 2018 onwards, he became a consultant and trainer for numerous Algerian or international associations and companies. He is the founding father of a concept, "Darology" which is a North African approach to political ecology and sustainable development.
