2024 AT A GLANCE

The Council of Europe launched the fourth iteration of the Action Plan for Georgia in January 2024 for a period of four years (2024-2027). This strategic instrument aims to advance reforms that bring Georgia's laws, institutions, and practices in line with European standards in human rights, democracy, and the rule of law.

Key priorities include enhancing freedom of expression, advancing gender equality, strengthening judicial independence, combating corruption, implementing the European Convention on Human Rights, and promoting education for democracy.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS



Enhanced juvenile justice

The Council of Europe empowered a pool of investigators and psychologists from the Ministry of Internal Affairs, to bring behavioural change through human rights compliant innovative interviewing methodology with juvenile victims and offenders.

Effective drug prevention through positive parenting

To enhance drug prevention efforts, the Pompidou Group developed and piloted the Positive Parenting Programme in particular among socially vulnerable communities to strengthen their members self-belief to be good parents and their capacity to act as such.



Rights of women with disabilities strengthened

The needs of women with disabilities are at the centre in the process of administration of justice by judges and prosecutors who took part in training sessions by the Council of Europe.

Effective actions against discrimination and hate speech by civil society organisations (CSOs)

In partnership with the Coalition for Equality and with the Council of Europe support, CSOs from four regions of Georgia are now empowered to contribute to the fight against discrimination and hate-motivated violence against vulnerable groups and national minority communities.



Prevention of violence in schools

With the support of the Council of Europe, police officers cultivated the capacity of children and adolescents to prevent violence, bullying, anti-social behaviour, substance abuse and their resilience against these phenomena in schools.
