Panel 1: The online dimension of Human Rights - freedom of expression VS content moderation

Content moderation on internet is a tool used to address a variety of issues arising as a result of users' activity, legal as well as illegal, in the online environment. The use of this tool poses particular challenges because, due to evolving technologies, the possibilities they offer and the constant evolution of human behaviour in the online environment, including the evolution of online offences, there is at this stage no end-state of content moderation with stable rules or regulatory forms; it will always be a matter of contestation, iteration and technological evolution.

Where is the borderline between censoring the freedom of expression and moderating harmful or illegal content? Who decides what is harmful or illegal? Who is responsible for taking actions, states, private actors, internet platforms and intermediaries?

In order to answer these questions, it is fundamental in this area that policies are designed with a clear understanding and recognition of the nature of the content and the accountability of the decision-making process.

Human rights obligations of all involved stakeholders, including with regard to the rights to freedom of expression, privacy, freedom of assembly and association, equality and non-discrimination, and the right to an effective remedy are at the centre of the debate of this panel.

Full enjoyment of our rights in cyberspace comes with an adequate protection against related risks in an online environment. The rights to private life, human dignity, safety, integrity of the person, non-discrimination are at stake being threatened by cybercrime.
