- 1. secure the necessary budget for the national park administration to run and maintain the infrastructure for visitors and to conduct regular monitoring activities;

The national park budget is approved by a common order of the Ministry of Environment, Waters and Forests, the Ministry of Labour and Social Solidarity and the Ministry of Finance. It is largely (90%) funded by the National Forest Administration (RNP ROMSILVA) with whom the Piatra Craiului National Park Administration signed a contract. The remaining 10% is self-raised, through visitor fees, tourist guiding fees, selling of merchandise in the Visitor Center and fees charged for processing and analyzing plans and projects submitted by various entities as part of the environmental impact assessment procedures.

The contract for the administration of Piatra Craiului National Park and overlapping protected areas was extended in 2024 for another ten years, by the signing of an addendum that makes provision for a guaranteed minimum budget.

The total park budget (without projects) for 2024 was 2,567,000 RON of which salaries amounted to 1,985,000 RON.

In addition to the approved budget, the park administration has been successful in securing funds through several EU-funded projects, either as beneficiary or partner.

2. monitor the effect of climate change on species and habitats and ensure findings are considered in the management of the area;

At the beginning of 2024 new legislation was passed on the monitoring of species (Order 3351/2023) and habitats (Order 3352/2023). Consequently, the park monitoring plan is being revised, to take into account the new requirements. Of particular importance for monitoring the effects of climate change is the investigation of spatiotemporal dynamics of alpine timberline. The ecotone between forest and alpine shrubs is an ideal indicator in this sense. In order to draw any relevant conclusions long-term data must be collected (both remote sensing data and climate variables). In this sense the park administration has been employing drones to build a library of standardized photographs that in time will allow us to make inferences with respect to the response of timberline to climate changes. The revised management plan (after its approval by the environmental authorities) will be valid for ten years and due to its adaptive character, provides a framework for assessing results and adapting management measures.

3. maintain and strengthen the good relations with the local and the county authorities, as well as with tourist organisations to work together on future sustainable tourist development in the area surrounding the national park, with special attention to visitors' hotspots;

The Consultative Council of the park gathers together representatives of various stakeholders operating at local and county level. Sustainable tourism has been a key topic on the agenda of the council meetings. In addition, the park administration continued efforts to build cooperation between local and county level authorities to address issues relating to visitor hotspot management.

Moreover, the park administration is currently working closely with local communities to submit an application for an EU-funded project that, in addition to

implementing active conservation measures will also contribute to improving visitor experience in the park area.

4. continue and strengthen the implementation of the building guide in the sustainable development area of the Piatra Craiului National Park;

The implementation of the building guide is a top priority for the park administration. The guide was widely distributed to local town halls and is available on the park website in order to facilitate compliance by those who wish to build in the park area. The park administration, with the help of the Scientific Council, assesses all requests for approval of building development projects for conformity with the specifications of the guide.

5. maintain regular control measures for forestry activities and enhance co-operation between owners, the forestry authority and the Piatra Craiului National Park administration;

The field personnel conduct regular patrols, independently or in collaboration with competent authorities, to monitor compliance with park rules and specific protection and conservation measures. Where forest harvesting activities are permitted, they work closely with local forest offices to ensure the implementation of specific conditions issued for wood marking and harvesting.

The revised management plan provides for an extension of the park core area (strictly protected and integral protection zones), a result that came from working closely with forest owners and administrators. The meetings of the Consultative Council are also good opportunities for consultation and collaboration between owners, forestry authorities and the park administration.

6. continue the gradual replacement of spruce forests with broad-leaved forests in the middle-mountain level and ensure sustainable forest practices are systematically used within the national park;

The gradual replacement of spruce with broadleaf species is one of the key measures included in the revised management plan and, once the plan is approved, will create the legal framework for forestry activities in the park area. All forest management plans will have to be harmonized with the park management plan and together with monitoring activities undertaken by the park administration, will ensure the implementation of sustainable forestry practices in the area.

In order to promote this measure, the park administration is in the process of applying for an EU-funded project that, among other conservation measures, aims to plant broadleaf species on a 10 ha area that was previously planted with spruce outside its natural range, and thus reconstitute the natural character of the forests.

7. continue giving appropriate visibility to the European Diploma logo in all information material and brochures and explaining the relevance of the diploma wherever appropriate, in particular in the visitors' centres and on the website.

The European Diploma logo is used in all published material, in the administration letterhead and also on the website as well as in the Visitor Center. In May 2004 the national park hosted the Romanian president and a delegation of ministers and high-level representatives, event that contributed further to raising the park's profile and the visibility of the European Diploma logo.
