The Burren Programme ended, as planned, in December 2022. Upon the commencement of the new Common Agricultural Policy (CAP) in 2023, a new National Agri Environment Programme called 'ACRES' was introduced. Building on some of the principles of the Burren Programme (e.g. local support team, result-based payments, supporting actions), ACRES contained a Scheme dedicated to 'High Nature Value Farming' (HNVF) landscapes, including the Burren.

The target area for this 'Burren Aran ACRES Cooperation Project' includes the Burren, the Aran Islands and a section of south Galway. HNV Services, who previously managed the Burren Programme, is managing this project under a 5-year contract with the Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine. Over 14 staff (some part-time), based in the heart of the Burren, are now working with c.1,300 farmers in the extended region, with each farmer expected to receive annual payments of €7,500 for actions and outcomes. The team have carried out extensive education and training events with farmers and farm advisors and have generated a range of useful information resources to help farmers and their advisors.

While the new Project is well-funded (thus meeting the 'Condition' attached to the EDPA Award) and has an excellent local team to manage it, it has been beset thus far with admin and IT challenges at Department level which have delayed payments to farmers. It is hoped that these issues will soon be resolved and Burren farmers will be supported to improve their farmed environments.

- 1. prepare an overarching management framework document for the Burren Region diploma-holding area, outlining the various management initiatives and their inter-relationships; Under the ACRES Burren Aran Project, a Local Area Plan (LAP) has been developed in consultation with a wide range of stakeholders. This plan outlines the key attributes of the area, the management challenges facing its natural and cultural heritage, and the measures which will be taken to address these challenges under ACRES. A copy of this plan is included with this report.
- 2. aim both to increase the quality of the natural heritage and to prevent damage to the cultural heritage in those areas of the Burren Region not included within the three Special Areas of Conservation;

Under the ACRES Burren Aran Project, a whole-farm approach is being taken across a wider geographical area than previously under the Burren Programme (which targeted only species-rich areas of the farms, mostly within SACs). The new Project will include protection, and enhancement of, the Burren's natural and cultural heritage over a much wider area as part of its key objectives. In addition, Burrenbeo Trust has a Conservation Volunteer Group who, usually twice monthly, work to improve the natural and cultural heritage of the Burren – from archaeological excavations to litter picking to seed collection.

A Steering Committee has been established to help guide the new ACRES Burren Aran Project and to assess its progress relative to the objectives and targets set out in the Local Area Plan. Stakeholders dealing with tourism, planning and heritage are part of this Committee, as well local community representatives. The ACRES CP team also liaise closely with the Burrenbeo Trust, and with Local Authorities and the NPWS.

4. consider the development of further walking trails throughout the Burren Region.

While this is out width of the remit of the ACRES CP team and project, the ACRES CP Project Steering Committee will include the development of walking trails in its discussions. Burrenbeo Trust continues to host monthly walks in the Burren, many of them led by local farmers, thus opening out new areas of the Burren to visitors and students.

There have been no significant changes to site management since the last annual report (2023) when the new ACRES CP Burren Aran Project was launched. One small change has been the extension of NPWS property in the Burren to include 'McGann's farm' in the central Burren. Stocked with rare breeds of conservation-grazing cattle, the farm hosted the 2024 Burren Winterage Cattle drive with close to 1000 people in attendance. The event was covered on national TV news, highlighting the importance of farming in the Burren.

Regarding unresolved difficulties, certainly, the introduction of the new ACRES Project has not been without challenge. As part of a National Programme working with over 50,000 farmers and introducing new approaches (such as result-based payments) the paying agency (the Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine) have struggled to establish the required Admin and IT infrastructure in a short timeframe. This has resulted in delayed payments and delays in approving environmental works which has been frustrating for farmers, farm advisors and for local teams.

However, these issues are gradually being resolved and so we expect stronger progress in the years ahead.

Burrenbeo Trust carried out heritage courses in 8 local schools under its 'Calf and Cuckoo' Programme.

HNVS Staff hosted a number of national and international study groups – including the DG of the FAO – as well as addressing a number of National conferences on sustainable farming.

The Burren case study continues to regularly features on National TV, Radio, Newspapers and social media.

The ACRES Burren Aran Cooperation Project Team hosted, or contributed to, a large number of farmer training and advisor training events in 2024.

11. Influence of the award of the European Diploma for Protected Areas

The EDPA award positively influenced the 2016 decision to continue, and expand, the Burren Programme, a decision which has been fundamental to the management of the Burren's natural and cultural heritage across 30,000ha of the Burren region, including most of the Natura 2000 designated land. This in turn has helped inform the ACRES Burren Aran Cooperation Programme which is the successor to the Burren Programme, operating over a much wider area (with the EDPA area at its core). It is hoped that this Programme will overcome initial challenges and deliver positive outcomes for the Burren.
