

Biodiversity and Natural Resources Management Project, Association for the Conservation of Nature



Turkey stretches over a vast area and contains four distinct biogeographic zones. Providing adequate protection for all landscapes poses a great challenge, as 75% of all European plant life is represented in the country. Since 2000, the Biodiversity and Natural Resources Management Project has been promoting the assessment and analysis of protected areas and their potential threats. Effective, intersectoral, participatory planning, as well as the sustainable development of protected areas, was carried out successfully. In order to achieve this, work was divided into three main spheres: attempts to strengthen the national framework for biodiversity conservation; the development of prototypes for protected area management and project management and monitoring. The work allowed for a review of legal and regulatory frameworks regarding the environment, and the conduct of biodiversity monitoring whilst continuing a campaign for increased national awareness of biodiversity. The project has had an impact in two important areas: the creation of a national institution for landscape and the institutionalisation of nature conservation.

The Committee of Ministers of the Council of Europe congratulated the organisers of the project.
