Regional workshop on judicial training curricula on cybercrime, electronic evidence and online crime proceeds

**in cooperation with the Regional Centre for judicial training on Cybercrime
(Judicial Academy of Croatia)**

Background

As the use of and reliance on information technology becomes ever more pervasive in society, the targeting and exploitation of computer systems has also become increasingly common. Offences involving computers have grown rapidly both in number and in sophistication, but there has been a time lag in developing effective countermeasures. Bringing offenders to justice requires evidence of guilt beyond a reasonable doubt, but evidence derived from electronic devices is volatile, often intangible and probably in another jurisdiction. This means the importance of effective, legally compliant and robust procedures for the identification, collection and preservation of electronic evidence is vital. Criminal proceedings increasingly entail cybercrime or electronic evidence found on computer systems or storage devices. In a similar way this applies also to crime proceeds.

All judges and prosecutors need to have at least basic skills to handle such cases. They need to know and understand the nature and evidential implications of cases of cybercrime and search, seizure and confiscation of online crime proceeds, as well as the available legal instruments and approaches to international cooperation.

This needs to be underpinned and reinforced by dedicated comprehensive, coherent and sustainable training curricula for judges and prosecutors.

Expected result 6 is related to judicial training:

Judicial training academies are providing training on cybercrime and electronic evidence and related financial investigations and anti-money laundering measures.

The approach of the iPROCEEDS project with regard to judicial training consists of the following:

- Review of the current state of judicial training curricula on cybercrime, electronic evidence and online proceeds.
- Development/update of introductory and advanced training modules.
- Training of trainers on delivery of the training module on cybercrime, electronic evidence and online crime proceeds.
- Integration of these modules into the initial and in-service training curricula of judicial training institutions.
- Delivery of pilot introductory training course.

The regional workshop on review of judicial training curricula is aimed at initiating this process. Following this workshop, the development/update of the basic and advanced training modules will commence.

Objective

The objectives of the workshop are:

- To discuss the current state of judicial training curricula on cybercrime, electronic evidence and online proceeds in each project country/area.
- To reach agreement on the structure of the basic and advanced modules that is to be developed/updated under the project.
- To define the steps to be taken in each country/area in view of introducing these modules into the training curricula.

Participants

- One representative from the judicial training institution responsible for development/management of curricula from each project country/area.
- One prosecutor/judge with subject-matter expertise in cybercrime and electronic evidence issues from each project country/area.
- One prosecutor/judge/law enforcement representative with subject-matter expertise in financial investigation of online crime proceeds from each project country/area.

The workshop is organised in cooperation with the Regional Centre for judicial training on Cybercrime in Zagreb, Croatia.
