The Burren Programme (BP) is funded under Ireland's Rural Development Programme (2014-2020) with 5-year contracts awarded to participating farmers, some of which will run until 31/12/2022. Negotiations for the new CAP are currently underway, and it is anticipated that each Member State will have to develop their own CAP Strategic Plan in due course. While negotiations on the post 2022 scenario are premature, every effort is being made to ensure that the BP remains high on the Agenda. For example, the DG Agri Commissioner, The Minister for Agriculture, Food and the Marine (DAFM), the Secretary General of the DAFM have all visited the BP, which is considered to be a flagship programme by the DAFM and by the European Commission. Details of the successor programme will be shared with EDPA group of specialists, but probably not until 2022 at the earliest.

Approximately 5% of the BP area is non-designated, Annex I habitat. The remainder of the non-designated Annex I habitat is protected under Local Authority plans.

3. work with other stakeholders, especially those involved in tourism predicated on the farm holdings, as well as the natural and cultural heritage, to support communities living and working in the Burren Region;

In November 2018 Failte Ireland published a Draft Visitor Experience Development Plan (VEDP) for consultation. This contains 12 'Catalyst Projects' including one to 'support farmers keen to diversify their business to include tourism'. This plan, once agreed, will be the key tourism management strategy for the region. Further information on this VEDP will be provided in future reports.

The most noteworthy development with regard to site management has been the continued expansion of the number of farmers, and area under management, in the Burren Programme.

Currently 331 farmers, managing 23,122ha of designated and additional Annex 1 habitat, are in the BP. Conservation works are taking place on many of these farms and condition scoring of the grasslands continues on an annual basis, indicating a gradual improvement in site condition year-on-year.

The BP staff complement remains stable, with 4 full-time and 4 part-time staff.

The Burren and Cliffs of Moher Geopark Project concluded in 2017 but the Local Authority has employed a full-time Burren Geopark Geologist

A number of significant events highlighting the sustainable use of the EDPA site were organised in 2018:

The Learning Landscape Symposium (Burrenbeo Trust, March 2018) Burren in Bloom (Burrenbeo Trust, May 2018)

The Burren Winterage Festival (Burrenbeo Trust and the Burren Programme), October 2018

In addition, Burrenbeo Trust carried out 10-week heritage-education courses in local schools (8 primary, 2 secondary) and organised monthly heritage walks and talks.

Burren Programme staff hosted a number of international study groups – including a number of farming groups wishing to avail of European Innovation Partnership funding to establish their own sustainable farming programmes. The work of the BBT and BP featured on National TV, Radio, Newspapers and social media.
