

Ms Ia Dadunashvili is a Georgian national. She holds an Economy and Law degree, as well as a Public Administration degree from the Georgian Technical University in Tbilisi, an LL.M degree from the Central European University in Budapest, and a PHD from the Georgian Technical University. She also holds the University of Essex certificate on research methods on hidden and marginal populations. She has a number of publications on the topics of trafficking in human beings, migration, and gender issues.

Ms Dadunashvili has 20 years of the human dimension project management experience in the fields of human rights, rule of law, and democratisation, having worked for organizations such as OSCE, ILO, and UNODC, as well as for a number of international NGOs.

Until 2019, Ms Dadunashvili was a member of the interagency working group on children in street situations in Georgia. During 2007- 2014, she was a member of the Permanent Identification Group on the status of victims of trafficking in human beings in Georgia, and in 2007-2011, she was a member of the Inter-agency Co-ordination Council for implementation of measures against human trafficking in Georgia. In 2012, together with the Women's Information Centre she worked on the development of the monitoring report on implementation of the National Action Plan against trafficking in human beings in Georgia. In 2012, she facilitated the establishment of the Georgian Coalition for Child and Youth Welfare.

From 2007 to 2018, Ms Dadunashvili worked for the ILO Project Office in Georgia coordinating the EU funded anti-trafficking projects, and later, US DOL funded labour law reform projects. Subsequently, until 2022, she worked as Chief of Analysis and Reporting Cell of the Human Rights and Communities Department at the OSCE Mission in Kosovo*.

Currently, Ms Dadunashvili is working as an advisor on Civil Society, Political Economy Analysis and Gender Equality and Social Inclusion for the United States Agency for International Development (USAID) National Governance Programme in Georgia.
