28th Plenary meeting

3-5 December 2025

MEETING REPORT

1. Opening of the meeting

The Steering Committee on Media and Information Society (CDMSI) held its 28th Plenary meeting in Strasbourg at the Palais de l'Europe, from 3–5 December 2025, in a hybrid format. The meeting was formally opened by the Chair, Ms Maja Zarić (Serbia), who welcomed members, observers and participants and introduced Mr Matjaz Gruden, Director for Democracy, Directorate General of Democracy and Human Dignity, to deliver the opening address.

Mr Gruden commended members for their relevant and timely contributions to the evolving agenda of the Council of Europe and their role in advancing democratic values in a period marked by technological transformation, societal challenges, and democratic backsliding. He highlighted the importance of the CDMSI's work as part of the broader process towards a [New Democratic Pact for Europe](#), underlining how the activities and deliverables of the CDMSI, particularly on artificial intelligence, disinformation, media literacy, and the safety of journalists, are crucial to the shared European agenda. He informed that the Pact's ambition was to translate political commitments into concrete, better coordinated policy actions and encouraged contributions from all stakeholders to shape the future direction of European democracy. The Director emphasised the relevance of the deliverables to be discussed during the Plenary, including the draft Recommendation on Online Safety and Empowerment of Content Creators and Users, the draft Guidance Note on the Implications of Generative Artificial Intelligence on Freedom of Expression, the policy documents on disinformation, on media literacy and on virtual realities, and the progress of the ongoing '*Journalists Matter*' Campaign on the Safety of Journalists. He concluded by expressing his gratitude to the outgoing Chair and Vice-Chair for their leadership.

2. Adoption of the agenda and order of business

Ms Artemiza-Tatiana Chisca, Secretary to the CDMSI and Head of the Freedom of Expression and CDMSI division, briefly presented the agenda and order of business, highlighting the meeting's focus on the adoption/approval of key deliverables elaborated during the 2024-2025

biennium and clarifying the procedures for the elections and appointments for the Committee's leadership and Expert Committees for the upcoming biennium.

The CDMSI adopted the meeting agenda, available in Appendix 1. The list of participants and information on gender distribution appear in Appendix 2.

3. Future work of the CDMSI / Terms of reference of the CDMSI and its expert committees (biennium 2026-2027)

The Secretariat reminded about the process through which revised terms of reference for the CDMSI and its future expert committees had been developed and approved by the Committee of Ministers and presented the deliverables expected for the 2026-2027 biennium.

The members were informed that another initially foreseen deliverable, in the format of a report on countering foreign information manipulation and interference and their harmful effects on public debate and the integrity of democratic processes, had been deleted from the terms of reference of the CDMSI in view of the Secretary General's initiative to draft a potential legal instrument on this topic. In this sense, a new Committee of Experts on Foreign Information Manipulation and Interference ([PC-FIMI](#)) was [established](#) under the Council of Europe's Committee on Crime Problems ([CDPC](#)) to prepare a feasibility study on the possible elaboration of such a legal instrument. In this context, the Secretariat clarified that, as foreseen by the terms of reference of PC-FIMI, the CDMSI was expected to appoint a representative to participate, without the right to vote, in PC-FIMI meetings and will be consulted on the draft feasibility study before its adoption by the CDPC. The Secretariat also noted the establishment of the Steering Committee for New and Emerging Digital Technologies ([CDNET](#)). The members highlighted the importance for the CDMSI to closely follow the work of PC-FIMI.

CDMSI members also encouraged a further participatory approach to future consultations on CDMSI's mandate. The Secretariat informed that a recent [change](#) to the [CM/Res\(2021\)3 Resolution on intergovernmental committees and subordinate bodies, their terms of reference and working methods](#) now entrusts steering committees with the proposals for future terms of reference – as opposed to steering committees in the past only being consulted on the matter. Also, during the exchange held, members stressed the importance of greater flexibility in the allocation of discussion time for substantive documents in future meetings.

4. Committee of Experts on the Implications of Generative Artificial Intelligence for Freedom of Expression (MSI-AI)

The CDMSI discussed the draft Guidance Note on the Implications of Generative AI for Freedom of Expression, presented by Mr Andrin Eichin, Chair of the Expert Committee tasked to draft the document ([MSI-AI](#)), together with the drafting co-rapporteurs Ms Murielle Popa-Fabre (in person), Ms Iva Nenadic and Ms Patricia Shaw (online). They reported on the outcome of the fourth meeting of the MSI-AI, held in Strasbourg on 15-16 October 2025, as well as on the public consultations conducted over the summer period. They also provided a final overview of the draft Guidance Note, as agreed by the Committee of Experts, and informed about envisaged follow-up steps aimed at raising awareness of the document.

The members discussed the draft Guidance Note and reviewed it section-by-section. They agreed that the document offers a thoughtful and balanced analysis of the benefits and risks to the freedom of expression associated with the developments in the field of generative AI and its use throughout society. Some amendments were proposed, including to avoid overly

prescriptive language, to ensure full account of emerging and diverse national approaches to AI monitoring and regulation, and to add sources where needed. The CDMSI discussed the proposed amendments and incorporated these in the text as agreed.

The CDMSI adopted the Guidance Note on the Implications of Generative AI for Freedom of Expression.

5. Committee of Experts on Online Safety and Empowerment of Users and Content Creators ([MSI-eSEC](#))

Ms Nicole Stellou, Chair of the MSI-eSEC reported on the outcomes of the last meeting of MSI-eSEC, held in Strasbourg on 21-22 October 2025, and Mr Martin Husovec, drafting co-rapporteur, briefly presented the draft Recommendation, as agreed by the MSI-eSEC.

The CDMSI discussed the draft Recommendation section by section. The representative of the EC informed the Plenary that the Council of the European Union had endorsed a common position on the text of draft Recommendation, which is binding under EU law for the EU member states, and presented a number of remaining amendment proposals.

The CDMSI discussed the amendments proposed by the EC representatives as well as by some of its members and introduced a number of changes to the draft. The CDMSI further discussed the draft Explanatory Memorandum to the future recommendation and, upon amendment proposals, agreed on several modifications. It subsequently approved the text of the draft Recommendation, as revised and adopted the revised Explanatory Memorandum.

The Committee decided to submit the approved draft Recommendation and its Explanatory Memorandum to the Committee of Ministers, inviting it to adopt the Recommendation and to take note of the Explanatory Memorandum.

6. Co-operation with UNESCO

The Chair welcomed Mr Andrea Cairola, Senior Programme Specialist, Freedom of Expression and Safety of Journalists, [UNESCO](#), for an exchange of views on UNESCO's current priorities and co-operation with the Council of Europe. Mr Cairola underlined the importance of inter-organisational collaboration in a rapidly evolving information environment and highlighted ongoing cooperation in areas such as freedom of expression, artificial intelligence, media and information literacy, and the safety of journalists. He referred in particular to UNESCO's work on AI and generative AI, namely the [Guidance for generative AI in education and research](#), the [UN Plan of Action](#) on the Safety of Journalists and the Issue of Impunity, [initiatives](#) addressing gender-based threats against women journalists, the SLAPPS - initiatives such as [the "misuse" of the judicial system to attack freedom of expression](#), and the report on [Strategic lawsuits against freedom of expression: How justice can respond](#) -, media viability, platform governance, and national-level cooperation, including with judicial and law-enforcement authorities; concrete engagement in Ukraine, the Republic of Moldova, and Southeast Europe was mentioned.

The CDMSI took note of the information provided and acknowledged, inter alia, the strong complementarity between UNESCO's work and the *Journalists Matter* Campaign. Members expressed interest in further strengthening regular exchanges and co-ordination, including on technical issues and ongoing initiatives, as well as in enhanced co-operation among relevant Groups of Friends for the safety of journalists and media freedom that have been formed

across other multilateral international organisations, such as the ones in Paris and Geneva. The Chair reaffirmed the CDMSI commitment to continued co-operation with UNESCO.

7. Country-specific developments in the field of freedom of expression. Implementation of existing standards

CDMSI members provided written contributions regarding country-specific developments in the implementation of freedom of expression standards.

Luxembourg informed about its ongoing comprehensive reform of national media legislation, aimed at safeguarding fundamental rights and ensuring free and democratic public discourse. The draft [Media Act](#), submitted in October, establishes core principles for all media service providers, including freedoms of communication, reception, retransmission, provision of media services, and editorial independence, while allowing for proportionate and strictly necessary restrictions. The reform seeks to strengthen media pluralism and independence. In parallel, Luxembourg launched the [DAB+](#) broadcasting on 1 December 2025, with 12 channels selected through a public call to promote a diverse and complementary radio landscape.

The Republic of Moldova provided information regarding recent and forthcoming legislative measures aimed at strengthening the protection of journalists and media freedom. These include amendments to the Criminal Code criminalising intentional obstruction of media activity and intimidation of the press, as well as the introduction of new provisions in the Administrative Code. Moldova also reported amendments to the Code of Audiovisual Media Services to reinforce the independence of the audiovisual regulator and public broadcaster governance, in line with Council of Europe recommendations.

Ukraine informed about recent assessments and ongoing efforts to advance media reform and safeguard freedom of expression in the context of European integration and ongoing security challenges. Ukraine highlighted the launch in April 2025 of [Phase II](#) of the Council of Europe project on safeguarding freedom of expression and media freedom, aimed at aligning legislation and practice with European standards, protecting journalists and public broadcasting, and promoting balanced media coverage. Reference was also made to progress in transposing key European instruments, the need to balance freedom of expression with national security under martial law, and ongoing measures to counter disinformation and propaganda.

8. [Resisting Disinformation: 10 Building Blocks to Strengthen Information Integrity](#)

Mr Konrad Bleyer-Simon and Mr Urbano Reviglio, consultants, presented the draft policy document on “Resisting Disinformation: 10 Building Blocks to Strengthen Information Integrity”. They clarified that, in line with the related tasks in the Terms of reference of the CDMSI, the document is intended as a strategic, accessible tool for member States to design and implement national strategies against disinformation, grounded in existing standards and adaptable to various domestic contexts. They explained that, while the overall approach was maintained, the title and structure of the document were revised following an [expert consultation workshop](#), and a particular focus was put throughout the document on the preservation of the integrity of the information space and related necessary policies and measures.

During the ensuing discussion, it was stressed that the document aligns with the Organisation’s priorities under the [New Democratic Pact for Europe](#) and agreed to reflect this

in its introduction. Delegations provided information on their domestic efforts to counter disinformation. Several proposals were made to improve the clarity and relevance of the policy document, with clearer terminology, stronger safeguards for freedom of expression and more practical approaches to stakeholder engagement. These suggestions were discussed and agreed by the Plenary, resulting in several textual adjustments.

The CDMSI adopted the document, as revised.

9. Guidelines for [National Media and Information Literacy \(MIL\) Strategies - Practical Steps and Indicators](#)

The Secretariat informed about the outcome of the online thematic expert workshop held on 29 September 2025 to gather feedback on the draft policy paper.

Mr Brian O'Neill, consultant, presented the document, emphasising that it consolidates two decades of Council of Europe work on MIL and offers detailed guidance on how member States can most effectively develop MIL strategies. He noted that, to this end, the document is also accompanied by an explanatory report, a set of practical indicators, and a list of useful resources. The CDMSI reviewed the document section-by-section. Members' proposed amendments were incorporated into the text.

The CDMSI adopted the document and its explanatory memorandum.

The CDMSI Chair noted that this document represents one of the CDMSI's contributions to the [New Democratic Pact for Europe](#) and will be launched alongside the "Resist Disinformation: 10 Building Blocks to Strengthen Information Integrity" document at a high-level conference that will take place in Chisinau, Moldova, on 20 March 2026, under the auspices of the Moldovan Presidency of the Committee of Ministers.

10. Exchange of views with the Secretariat of the European Platform of Regulatory Authorities (EPRA)

Ms Emanuelle Machet, Head of the EPRA Secretariat, delivered an update on EPRA's activities, particularly its autumn [meeting in Yerevan, Armenia](#) (22–24 October 2025), hosted by the Commission on TV and Radio of Armenia, which brought together around 115 participants from 45 regulators, permanent observers, including [the Council of Europe](#), and invited experts. The meeting addressed media pluralism in the digital age, with a focus on the impact of online platforms and artificial intelligence.

Ms Machet underlined EPRA's close co-operation with the Council of Europe, stressing the relevance of recent and future deliverables for regulators and outlined EPRA's ongoing and upcoming activities, including the resumption of the [AI and Regulators online roundtable](#), the regular meetings of the [Taskforce on Media and Information Literacy "EMIL"](#), and the forthcoming meetings in Tirana (20–22 May 2026) and Dublin (October 2026).

11. Exchange of Views with Congress of Local and Regional Authorities

The Chair welcomed Stewart Dickson, Rapporteur of the Congress of Local and Regional Authorities, who presented the Congress [Recommendation 525\(2025\)](#) and [Resolution 508\(2025\)](#) on Foreign Interference in Electoral Processes at Local and Regional Levels. Mr Dickson underlined the increased scale and sophistication of foreign interference, often targeting less regulated local and regional elections. Key risks included disinformation

campaigns, manipulation of information spaces, and targeted propaganda, all of which threaten social cohesion and the right to freely formed opinion.

The Congress calls, in the above-mentioned documents, for improved monitoring, transparency, legal frameworks for electoral processes, targeted regulation on campaign funding, and enhanced education and resilience-building at the grassroots. Mr Dickson stressed the importance of robust local media for trustworthy news and the risks of foreign agent laws being abused to suppress legitimate opposition. He concluded by encouraging CDMSI members to support comprehensive, multi-layered responses at domestic level.

12. Exchange with News Media Coalition

Mr Andrew Moger, Chief Executive Officer of the [News Media Coalition](#), presented the results of a News Media Coalition Newsgathering Survey. Resulting trends highlighted increasing restrictions on journalistic access to information, due in particular to legislative control, copyright claims, and the strategic use of accreditation and credentialing. The survey noted challenges to primary source journalism in the fields of sports, entertainment, and political reporting, where access is increasingly controlled by private actors and non-transparent practices.

Mr Moger called the attention to the critical importance of “primary source journalism” in ensuring information authenticity and resilience against disinformation. CDMSI members discussed definitions of professional journalism, while also cautioning against generalised or politically determined “reliable news” labels.

13. Elections

The CDMSI was informed by the Secretariat on rules and nominations for the elections of the CDMSI leading organs for 2026–2027.

Aikaterini Polyzou (Greece) was elected Chair and Maya Zarić (Serbia) was elected Vice-Chair of the CDMSI for the year 2026.

The CDMSI also elected five Bureau members: Ms Céline Flammang (Luxembourg), for the year 2026, Mr Serge Robillard (Monaco), Ms Inge Welbergen (the Netherlands), Mr Marius Jitea (Romania) and Mr Andrin Eichin (Switzerland), for the years 2026-2027.

The CDMSI also designated, for the forthcoming terms of reference of the CDMSI (2026-2027), member states’ representatives in the two new committees of experts subordinate to the CDMSI:

- For the Committee of Experts on Safeguarding Media Pluralism in the Online Environment (MSI-ePLU): Mr Michael Kogler (Austria), Ms Nicole Stellou (Greece), Ms Claudia Sartori (Italy), Ms Aneta Gonța (Republic of Moldova), Ms Fenna van Haefen (Netherlands), Mr Candaş Aynagöz (Türkiye), Ms Raphaela Cueni (Switzerland).
- For the Committee of Experts on Media Regulators in a Platform-Based Environment (MSI-REG): Ms Katerina Mantzou (Greece), Ms Stephanie Comey (Ireland), Mr Mark D. Cole (Luxembourg), Mr Audun Aagre (Norway), Mr Michael Hradicky (Slovakia), Mr Salih Karabulut (Türkiye), Ms Rowena Burke (United Kingdom).

The CDMSI then appointed as rapporteurs on mainstreamed perspectives, for the forthcoming terms of reference of the CDMSI (2026-2027): Ms Maja Zarić (Serbia) on the rights of the child, Mr Marius Jitea (Romania) on youth, and Mr Martin Željko Sampor (Slovakia) on gender equality.

Finally, the CDMSI appointed Ms Inge Welbergen (the Netherlands) as CDMSI representative to the PC-FIMI.

14. Council of Europe *Journalists Matter* Campaign for the Safety of Journalists

The CDMSI took note of the presentation of the [Mid-Term Evaluation Report](#) of the *Journalists Matter* Campaign, prepared by Mr Peter Noorlander, independent expert, at the midpoint of the five-year Campaign launched in October 2023.

The aim of the Report is to assess progress achieved so far, identify strengths and weaknesses, and outline options for the second half of the Campaign and its possible continuation beyond 2027. The evaluation was based on desk research, a stakeholder survey, and 17 anonymous interviews with key actors, complemented by 34 survey responses, following the Council of Europe's standard evaluation criteria.

The evaluation highlighted the catalytic impact of the Campaign despite limited resources, notably through the establishment of national focal points and committees, increased visibility of journalists' safety as a Council of Europe priority, and improved dialogue between journalists and authorities.

It also identified challenges, including uneven engagement at national level, the need to better animate existing structures, limited involvement of certain stakeholders, and the importance of addressing further emerging threats, including online harassment, gender-based abuse, strategic lawsuits against public participation (SLAPPs), and political and economic pressure on journalism.

CDMSI members welcomed the evaluation and held a *tour de table* to share updates about national experiences. They underlined the value of focal points and committees as coordination mechanisms, reported concrete follow-up activities at national level, and expressed broad support for continued work on journalist safety beyond 2027, including consideration of permanent co-ordination arrangements. The Chair concluded that the evaluation provides a valuable basis for guiding the next phase of the Campaign and will inform further work within the CDMSI, as well as discussions at the forthcoming Focal Points Meeting and Annual Conference in Moldova in 2026. The CDMSI endorsed the mid-term evaluation of the Campaign.

The Secretariat informed the CDMSI about relevant developments, including the outcomes of the [Training of Trainers on SLAPPs](#) held on 9-10 October 2025 in Prague; and next steps and activities, notably the Fourth meeting of the National Focal Points and the Annual thematic conference *Defending truth - Comprehensive approaches to journalistic safety and quality journalism* focusing on the "Prevention pillar" of the Recommendation [CM/Rec\(2016\)4](#) on the protection of journalism and safety of journalists and other media actors, both to be held under the Moldovan Presidency of the Committee of Ministers, in Chişinău, on 22 and 23 April 2026, respectively. The CDMSI also took note of the event *Youth Facing Disinformation - Why*

Journalists Matter, to be held under the Monaco Presidency of the Committee of Ministers, in the framework of the Campaign, on 9-10 November 2026, at the European Youth Centre, in Strasbourg.

15. Co-operation with Group of Friends on the Safety of Journalists and Media Freedom

The CDMSI exchanges with Ms Kari H. Riisøen, Deputy Permanent Representative of Norway, representing the Presidency of the Group of Friends on the Safety of Journalists and Media Freedom (formed of a number of Council of Europe member States' ambassadors). Ms Riisøen provided an overview of the Group's recent activities and priorities. She underlined the Group's continued support for Council of Europe standard-setting and close co-operation with the Platform for the Protection of Journalism and Safety of Journalists, as well as with external partners such as the OSCE, UNESCO, the UN Plan of Action on the Safety of Journalists, and the Media Freedom Coalition. She highlighted the Group's focus on at-risk journalists, including women journalists and journalists in exile, the role of media organizations and media owners, and the importance of media freedom and democracy in countering disinformation, notably in the context of the Moldovan Presidency.

During the discussion, several CDMSI members welcomed the work of the Group of Friends in support of freedom of expression. Several delegations underlined the importance of enhanced co-ordination between similar groups of friends across international organisations and better information-sharing on respective activities. The Group of Friends expressed openness to strengthening co-ordination with relevant partners.

16. Platform to Promote the Protection of Journalism and Safety of Journalists

Ms Flutura Kusari (European Centre for Press and Media Freedom) and Ms Joanna Szymańska (ARTICLE 19), representing partner organisations of the [Platform to Promote the Protection of Journalism and Safety of Journalists](#), presented recent developments and key trends emerging from the Platform's work, including elements of the forthcoming Annual Report. They reported a continued deterioration of the safety environment for journalists in 2025, including a rise in alerts related to detention of journalists, violence during protests, online harassment, criminal prosecution and an alarming increase in cases of transnational repression, involving misuse of international policing mechanisms, financial retaliation and cyberattacks. Particular attention was drawn to gender-based threats against women journalists, which will be the subject of a dedicated thematic focus in the next Platform's Annual Report. Positive developments were also noted, including strengthened dialogue between the Platform and member states.

The Platform representatives further highlighted developments related to SLAPPs, noting increased legislative activity in member states to implement the Council of Europe Recommendation of the Committee of Ministers to the member States on countering strategic lawsuits against public participation ([CM/Rec\(2024\)2](#)) and the [EU Directive 2024/1069](#) on protecting persons who engage in public participation from manifestly unfounded claims or abusive court proceedings, and encouraged comprehensive transposition to address both cross-border and domestic cases. Concerns were also raised about the growing use of "foreign agent" laws and similar legal instruments to restrict media freedom and civil society.

CDMSI members welcomed the Platform's alert tools and practical engagement and referred to national improvements inspired by Council of Europe standards. The CDMSI underlined the continued importance of co-operation with the Platform and encouraged sustained dialogue and follow-up at national level.

17. Feasibility Study on Benefits and Challenges to Freedom of Expression in Immersive Realities

Ms Brittan Heller, consultant, presented the draft [Feasibility Study](#) on Benefits and Challenges to Freedom of Expression in Immersive Realities (XR), prepared, under the CDMSI terms of Reference, as a follow-up to the joint Council of Europe/IEEE work: [The Metaverse and its Impact on Human Rights, Rule of Law, and Democracy](#). Ms Heller noted that the study examines how XR technologies, characterised by immersion, embodiment and presence, affect the exercise and protection of freedom of expression under Article 10 of the European Convention on Human Rights, highlighting both opportunities (such as new forms of storytelling, inclusion and civic participation) and risks (including intensified harassment, pervasive data collection, complex moderation challenges and unequal access).

The CDMSI took note of the study's conclusions, notably that, while existing Council of Europe's legal frameworks remain robust, and applicable to virtual realities, they may require context-sensitive interpretation to address the specific risks of immersive and embodied environments. The study therefore proposes two complementary tracks for future work within the CDMSI mandate: awareness-raising (through exchanges and workshops with potentially relevant actors, including the European Court of Human Rights), and a structured review of existing standards to identify any genuine gaps and possible need for further guidance. The CDMSI endorsed the proposed next steps and adopted the Feasibility Study.

18. Exchange of views with the Secretariat of the European Audiovisual Observatory

The Chair welcomed Ms Pauline Durand-Vialle, the newly appointed Executive Director of the Observatory, and Ms Sophie Valais, Deputy Head of the Legal Department. The Executive Director underlined the importance of [Ukraine joining the Observatory as a member](#). She outlined the 2026 workplan, which includes, inter alia, a conference on jurisdiction of audiovisual services and a new workstream on the video game sector. Ms Valais informed about the work of the Legal Department in 2025, in particular the published reports, in the four clusters covering: authors and creation ([status of artists](#)), audiovisual works ([state aid and the audiovisual sector](#), [commercial communications](#) and [governance and funding of public service media](#)), audiovisual services and platforms ([jurisdictional challenges in audiovisual regulation](#) and societal issues ([impact of digital technologies on news sector](#) and [resilience to FIMI](#))). She also underlined the continuing relevance of the various databases managed by the Observatory.

The CDMSI congratulated the Observatory on its work and welcomed continued collaboration with the Steering Committee.

19. Council of Europe Co-operation Activities on Freedom of Expression

Ms Alina Tatarenko, Head of the Division for Cooperation on Freedom of Expression, presented an overview of 2025 projects and priorities. Cooperation activities covered 22 countries and beneficiaries, aimed at providing support in enhancing policies, legislation, and

capacities related to freedom of expression, media, access to information and protection of information integrity. Related activities included the Council of Europe Training Programme on Countering the use of SLAPPS and projects relevant to EU accession processes. The new project [RESIST](#) – Strengthening Societal Resilience to Disinformation in Europe, funded by the Norway Grants, was launched with the participation of 10 EU member States. Further details on the activities in 2025 are available in the [related annual report](#). The CDMSI welcomed continued participation and offers for national engagement.

20. World Forum for Democracy

Ms Irena Guidikova, Head of Democratic Institutions and Freedoms Department, Council of Europe, presented the outcomes of the [World Forum for Democracy](#) *Democracy at risk: how can we revive it?*, which took place in Strasbourg, on 5-7 November 2025.

The Forum convened participants from 61 countries and 122 speakers to discuss democracy's current challenges, notably focusing on culture and media. Key concerns included global democratic backsliding and threats to freedom of expression, particularly through artificial intelligence and disinformation. Creative, citizen-driven and state-supported solutions were highlighted, including ethical AI, art, games, and relevant media regulation. The forum emphasised the importance of citizen engagement, innovation in traditional media and stronger presence of democratic narratives online. The CDMSI members noted convergence between the Forum's recommendations and recent CDMSI deliverables, particularly on AI, public-interest journalism and the regulatory challenges of digital platforms.

In the framework of the Forum, the Secretariat organised the "Time for ideas" panel, "[Who said boring? Journalism, art, and games against disinformation](#)". Speakers from academia and media explored how creative approaches, such as art, satire, gaming, and tailored communication, can more effectively engage diverse audiences and counter disinformation, providing context for the presentation of three innovative initiatives selected by the Forum.

21. Contribution of CDMSI to the New Democratic Pact for Europe

The CDMSI discussed the Steering Committee's role in contributing to the [New Democratic Pact for Europe](#), as presented by Irena Guidikova and Director Gruden. Several CDMSI members and observers encouraged further reflection on the importance of clarifying the boundaries of professional journalism and media actors in the digital age. Suggestions included revitalising discussions on the Council of Europe Recommendation of the Committee of Ministers to the member States on a new notion of media ([CM/Rec\(2011\)7](#)) and launching a campaign on media and information literacy.

Ms Urška Umek, Head of the Democratic Institutions and Civil Society Division, presented the 'Parameters to facilitate the application and implementation of the Reykjavík Principles for Democracy', adopted by the Steering Committee on Democracy ([CDDEM](#)) at its 4th Plenary meeting, on 26-28 November 2025, with a specific focus on references to freedom of expression, media pluralism, and digital literacy. She clarified that the parameters are intended both as a practical tool for self-assessment and for the basis of future reviews of democratic performance at national or regional level. The Secretariat confirmed ongoing co-ordination between the CDDEM and the CDMSI.
