EXPERT MEETING FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A COUNCIL OF EUROPE INFORMATION SYSTEM ON THE EUROPEAN LANDSCAPE CONVENTION

REPORT

Document by the General Secretariat Cultural Heritage, Landscape and Spatial Planning Division

1. Opening of the meeting

Mr Jean-François SEGUIN, Chair of the Conference of the Council of Europe on the European Landscape Convention, welcomed the participants (see List of Participants in Appendix 1 to this report) and presented the agenda of the meeting (see Appendix 2).

2. Establishment of a Council of Europe Information System on the European Landscape Convention

The Secretariat of the Council of Europe informed the participants that, on 23 September 2009, the Committee of Ministers of the Council of Europe had taken note of the abridged report of the 2nd plenary session of the Steering Committee for Cultural Heritage and Landscape (CDPATEP, Strasbourg, 12-13 May 2009) (CM/Del/Dec(2009)1066). The report states that the CDPATEP adopted the Guiding Principles for a Council of Europe Database on the European Landscape Convention (Appendix 3 to this report) which should be implemented by a group of specialists with the task of proposing the machinery to be developed for the Florence Convention in parallel to what is already being applied to the cultural heritage conventions.

The Chair presented the aim of the Paris meeting which was to prepare the specification for the Information System on the European Landscape Convention. He will inform the participants at the Eighth Meeting of the Workshops for the implementation of the European Landscape Convention (Malmö, 8-9 October 2009) of the development of this Information System.

The participants:

- examined the working documents of the meeting prepared by the Experts of the Council of Europe, as they appear in Appendix 4 to this report:
- "Projet de cahier des charges pour la réalisation d'un système d'information sur la Convention européenne du paysage", prepared by Mr Yves LUGINBÜHL (version of 6 September 2009);
- "ELC Database3 HEREIN3 Grid Integrated tool Member State or semi-autonomous unit (region etc)", prepared by Mr Adrian OLIVIER (version of 27 September 2009);
- Proposals for a draft glossary, prepared by Mrs Nataša BRATINA JURKOVIČ and Mr Pere SALA MARTÍ (versions of 1st and 6 September 2009):
- amended the documents entitled "Projet de cahier des charges pour la réalisation d'un système d'information sur la Convention européenne du paysage" and ELC Database and decided to combine the documents into one new document to be entitled "Draft template for the specification of the ELC Information System";
- considered that the definition of the words would be part of this process;
- asked Mr Yves LUGINBÜHL and Mr Adrian OLIVIER to send the revised versions of the two documents to the Secretariat by 15 October 2009;
- asked the members of the working group to send their comments on the revised versions of these two document which will be sent by the Secretariat of the Council of Europe, to Mr Luginbühl (luginbuh@univ-paris1) and Mr Olivier (adrian.olivier@english-heritage.org.uk) with a copy to the Secretariat of the Council of Europe (maguelonne.dejeant-pon@coe.int) by 1 December 2009;
- asked the experts to prepare, on the basis of the received comments, a revised version for possible amendment and adoption by the CDPATEP at its 3rd Meeting (Strasbourg, May 2010);
- considered that the Parties to the Convention should be invited to try out the questionnaire in order to test it before its installation as an Information System.

3. Other business

None.

4. Next meeting

The participants decided that the next meeting should be held in the Council of Europe Office in Paris on 29 January 2010 starting at 9.30 hours.

APPENDIX 3

DECISION OF THE STEERING COMMITTEE FOR CULTURAL HERITAGE AND LANDSCAPE (CDPATEP) ON THE GUIDING PRINCIPLES OF THE EUROPEAN LANDSCAPE CONVENTION INFORMATION SYSTEM

2nd plenary session of the Steering Committee for Cultural Heritage and Landscape (CDPATEP, Strasbourg, 12-13 May 2009)

(FINAL VERSION)

The Steering Committee for Cultural Heritage and Landscape (CDPATEP),

- 1. Considering that the aim of the Council of Europe is to achieve greater unity between its members for the purpose of safeguarding and realising the ideals and principles which are their common heritage;
- 2. Having regard to the European Landscape Convention (ETS No 176) adopted by the Committee of Ministers of the Council of Europe on 19 July 2000 and opened for signature by Council Member States in Florence on 20 October 2000;
- 3. Considering that the Convention makes an important contribution to the Council of Europe's objectives of promoting democracy, human rights and the rule of law and seeking common solutions to the main problems facing European society today;
- 4. Underlining that, in taking account of natural, cultural and landscape value of regions, the Council of Europe seeks to preserve the quality of life and human well-being;
- 5. Referring to the provisions of the Convention on monitoring its implementation (Article 10.1) and mutual assistance and exchange of information (Article 8), under which the parties undertake to co-operate in order to enhance the effectiveness of measures taken and, in particular, exchange information on all matters covered by the provisions of the Convention;
- 6. Considering that Recommendation CM/Rec(2008)3 of the Committee of Ministers to Member States on the guidelines for the implementation of the European Landscape Convention proposes that each party should contribute to the setting up of a database to appear on the website of the Council of Europe's European Landscape Convention; pointing out that the recommendation mentions that the database should be a "toolbox" providing technical and scientific assistance through the collection and exchange of landscape experience and research, as provided for in Article 8 of the European Landscape Convention concerning mutual assistance and exchange of information;
- 7. Takes note of the guiding principles which appear in the document in the Appendix.

Appendix

European Landscape Convention Information System

Introduction

1. The European Landscape Convention represents a major contribution to the attainment of the goals of the Council of Europe, which are to promote democracy, human rights and rule of law and to seek common solutions to the major problems of Europe's society. Therefore, as required by Article 10.1 of the Convention on the monitoring of its implementation, and by the provisions in the terms of reference of the Steering Committee for Cultural Heritage and Landscape (CDPATEP) on monitoring of the cultural heritage and landscape conventions, it is expedient to have an information system established for documenting measures taken, experience gained and trials conducted in support of the Convention's implementation, under the aegis of the Council of Europe Conference on the European Landscape Convention.

Article 8 of the Convention on mutual assistance and exchange of information provides that the Parties undertake to co-operate in order to enhance the effectiveness of measures taken and in particular to exchange information on all matters covered by the provisions of the Convention; accordingly, this European Landscape Convention Information System will foster international co-operation in landscape matters.

- 2. A document presenting the landscape policies pursued in the Council of Europe member states, which sets out the essential facts concerning the status of landscape in those countries, is regularly produced by the Council of Europe Secretariat [Document of the 5th Council of Europe Conference on the European Landscape Convention CEP-CDPATEP (2009) 3Bil].
- 3. Recommendation CM/Rec(2008)3 of the Committee of Ministers to Member States on the guidelines for the implementation of the European Landscape Convention proposes that each party contribute to the setting up of a database to appear on the website of the Council of Europe's European Landscape Convention. It indicates that the database would be a "toolbox" helping to provide mutual technical and scientific assistance through the collection and exchange of landscape-related experience, experimentation and research work, as provided for in the aforementioned Article 8 of the Convention on mutual assistance and exchange of information. The European Landscape Convention Information System will constitute that toolbox.

The creation of a European Landscape Convention Information System requires that its objectives and implementation procedures be settled, that is:

1) its architecture,

2) its accessibility,

3) its form,

4) its content,

5) the languages used,

6) its interactive mode of operation,

7) the links established with existing networks,

8) its development in the medium term,

9) its implementation.

I. OBJECTIVES OF THE INFORMATION SYSTEM

Having regard to the prerequisites stipulated above, it is proposed to create within the Council of Europe an interactive information system aiding the implementation of the European Landscape Convention and conforming to the Convention's main articles:

- Article 1: Definitions of the terms protection, management and planning;
- Article 6: Specific measures:
 - C, Identification and assessment,
 - D, Landscape quality objectives,
 - E, Implementation,
- Article 8: Mutual assistance and exchange of information;
- Article 10: Monitoring of the implementation of the Convention.

The information system should permit the fulfilment of the following objectives:

Main objectives:

- 1) put at the CDPATEP disposal a tool for the monitoring of the implementation of the European Landscape Convention;
- 2) highlight actual effects of the implementation of the European Landscape Convention;
- maintaining and extending landscape co-operation networks, and fostering transnational cooperation;
- 4) provide useful information for research and action.

Particular objectives:

- affording administrations and the public access to sources of essential facts and experiences of landscape protection, management and planning;
- acting as an "observatory" in order to analyse and forecast the advantages which a rapidly changing society can derive from taking care of the landscape;
- making it easier to monitor the development of landscape policies "in keeping" with the European Landscape Convention;
- creating a landscape portal in order to disseminate information effectively, facilitate the organisation of
 interactive professional forums and data networks, and encourage people, especially youth, to take an
 interest in landscape;

This information system will result in the establishment of a European Landscape Convention Information System for handling certain subject areas of relevance to landscapes and their development.

II. ACCESSIBILITY OF THE INFORMATION SYSTEM

The principle of the European Landscape Convention Information System's information system is founded on accessibility of the information to all publics; however, a distinction should be drawn between:

- entities providing input into the information system and the public consulting it,
- factual information (policies, official texts) as opposed to programmatic and problematic information.

The principle of input and consultation is applied as outlined below:

Logging of an information item

Validation of the information

Information system



1. Entities contributing to the information system

- Council of Europe Secretariat, CDPATEP, Committee of Ministers,
- Council of Europe official Parties,
- Political authorities,
- Central, local and regional public authorities of the Council of Europe countries,

- General public, NGOs, all agents in the economic or social sectors,
- Educational and scientific bodies,

According to the validation procedures specified below.

2. Public consulting the information system

As a matter of principle, the information system is accessible to all types of public.

III. ARCHITECTURE OF THE INFORMATION SYSTEM

The information system of the European Landscape Convention is constituted by networked databases and a forum, linked in turn to national, regional or local and thematic websites, with entry-points marked by specific tabs.

- The advantage of such a system is to avoid constituting unduly voluminous databases and to allow distinct, separate management of each database;
- It also allows interconnection of the whole of the existing databases and networks with direct or indirect bearing on the question of landscapes.

This Internet network will be associated with a database containing "original" items which is specific to the European dimension of the Information System, gathering together the data produced by the Council of Europe Secretariat.

An operator will be selected by the Council of Europe on the basis of a set of specifications itemising the tasks to be completed for the system's construction and also its maintenance. Drawing up the specifications is one of the short-term objectives of the group of experts.

IV. CONTENT OF THE INFORMATION SYSTEM OF THE EUROPEAN LANDSCAPE CONVENTION INFORMATION SYSTEM

The Information System functions have the following components:

- one (or more) databases made up of:
 - a compendium of the policies of the Parties to the Convention,
 - a roundup of Council of Europe publications on landscape,
 - a diary of Council of Europe landscape-related events;
 - information on Interreg and other Programmes of the European Union and other organisations;
- a record of experience or experimentation with landscape protection, management and planning actions, conducted in accordance with the principles of the European Landscape Convention or innovative where landscape is concerned;
- a discussion forum available, on the one hand to the Parties to the Convention and to authorized bodies by the Parties, on the other to all types of public according to the procedures below specified;
- a thesaurus/glossary, taking into account the CEMAT Spatial development glossary;
- a portal for accessing projects and initiatives sustained by all types of players and validated according to the procedure discussed below;

The diary section may be provided at other levels (regional, local): see below.

1. Database on the policies of the Parties to the European Landscape Convention

The database will be stocked with:

- a) Information on the landscape policies of the various states, derived from the work of the Member States' representatives, gathered by means of the Secretariat's survey of Council of Europe Parties conducted by questionnaire;
- b) Information on sectoral policies with a landscape-related component (for example, agricultural policy embodying provisions for landscape enhancement or construction policy with provisions taking landscape into account) and also derived from the same survey;

- c) Information should be validated with regard to its precision and correctness. Several levels of validation can be specified:
- the first, priority, level of validation is the national, regional or local level: the representatives of the Parties to the European Landscape Convention will satisfy themselves as to the validity of the information in relation to the corpus of landscape policies and other policies embodying a landscape dimension, whatever the levels where these policies are framed, the representatives of the Parties and the authorized authorities and bodies are responsible for the quality of the information system available information and its validation,
- another level is that of the Council of Europe Secretariat which will verify the conformity of the information to the objectives of the database. It may be assisted by a group of experts which will provide support in testing the validity of the information.

2. Database on experimental landscape protection, management or planning

It will concern experiments in landscape protection, management and planning carried out by member states, local and regional authorities or NGOs according to the principles of the European Landscape Convention or according to innovative methods not necessarily identified with the European Landscape Convention but conducive to improvement or enrichment of the methods. The pinpointing of these experiments will be left to the initiative of all publics so as to allow their protagonists all possible scope for expression.

3. Discussion forum

- a) The discussion forum was designed as a forum with two entry-points. One reserved to the Parties, and to the authorized authorities and bodies. "Virtual space enabling a free discussion on several miscellaneous subjects", this forum is run by a moderator, either coming from the Group of Experts or chosen for his/her specific skills, who organises discussions on current subjects during a limited time which ended when no more information is added. At this stage, the discussion forum is available to all types of public on the issues discussed by Parties. Nonetheless, the possibility to ask new questions is restricted to few weeks and, in particular, during the workshop sessions of the European Landscape Convention.
- b) Designed on an interactive pattern, the discussion forum will be consultable by all publics. The running of the forum rests with the Secretariat assisted by a moderator, either coming from the group of experts or chosen for his/her specific skills on the discussed issues, under arrangements to be considered when the specifications for setting up the information system are established. Activities in this connection may include thematic discussions with reference to current concerns, and acute landscape issues.
- c) Any other kind of discussion forum is left to the initiative of the Parties, the political authorities at other levels or the other bodies and NGOs interested in landscape matters. The information system may set up links with these other forums.
- d) Utilisation of the informational and speculative material delivered by the contributors to the forum will be handled by the group of experts, which will make analyses of this material and produce synopses of it for posting on the site. Study of utilisation practices will be part of the questions considered in making out the specifications of the information system.

4. Thesaurus/glossary

- a) To aid communication and comprehension of the terms used in the information from the various Member States which goes towards the completion of the databases, a thesaurus/glossary will be compiled with reference to the terms defined in the European Landscape Convention, viz.:
 - Term equivalent to "landscape" in each country and definition(s) of the term according to the scientific publications of the country concerned,
 - Landscape policy,
 - Landscape quality goal,
 - Landscape protection,
 - Landscape management,
 - Landscape planning,
 - And any other term that may appear relevant (eg landscape atlas = cataleg de paisatge).

The method implemented consists in analysing the European Landscape Convention text and then in extracting the terms used in the official languages of the Council of Europe, that is to say English and French. As a first stage, an experimentation will be done with two other languages, using terms from the translations of the European Landscape Convention, in order to see the relevance of the construction of a glossary in all the Member State of the Council of Europe languages.

- b) Others terms may be added to the above depending on the significance attached to them by the national correspondents. The latter will need to verify the validity of the information they deliver and will be able to consult the specialists of their countries.
- c) Links will be established with the thesauruses of the HEREIN and ECLAS databases.
- d) The organisation of the thesaurus will be founded mainly on keywords drawn from the words and phrases of the European Landscape Convention.
- e) Management of the thesaurus is ensured by another group of experts than the one assisting with the running of the information system but the groups will be in contact under arrangements discussed when the specifications of the information system are worked out.
- 5. Portal for accessing databases, open to projects and initiatives identified in conjunction with the Parties and associated with the implementation of the Convention
- Miscellaneous information on landscape protection, management and planning which may be directly entered in the database by public authorities and the public according to the criteria to be proposed by the Secretariat and the experts' working group;
- b) Council of Europe publications;
 - reference texts (of the European Landscape Convention, explanatory report and sundry recommendations, particularly for the implementation of the convention, conference reports, etc.);
 - records and communications of the meetings of Council of Europe workshops on the implementation of the European Landscape Convention;
 - records and communications of the Council of Europe national seminars on the implementation of the European Landscape Convention;
- c) News about the Council of Europe Landscape Prize: candidates, winners, winning entries;
- d) Chart of signatures and ratifications of the European Landscape Convention;
- e) Bibliographies of non-Council of Europe publications: *link to external sites*:
 - scientific publications,
 - publications of research reports,
 - books on various topics, particularly landscape painting;
- f) Institutions specialising in the study, protection, management and planning of landscapes and especially in the implementation of the European Landscape Convention: *link to external websites*;
- g) Identification and mapping of landscapes placed under special protection status (protected landscapes, part of the UNESCO World Heritage, etc.): *link to external websites*;
- h) Scientific laboratories specialising in landscape research: *link to external websites*;
- i) Transfrontier experiences: *link to external websites*;
- j) Photographic landscape observatories: *link to external websites*.

6. News spot

This will function at three levels:

- A diary of events organised or sponsored by the Council of Europe Secretariat concerning the European Landscape Convention (colloquies, workshops, seminars and exhibitions in progress or announced);
- A diary of events organised by the other Parties and other local and regional authorities; these will be tagged with a link to the relevant websites;
- A diary of events concerned by the proceedings of the thematic forum and tagged with a link to the relevant websites.

V. LANGUAGES USED IN THE DATABASES

- a) The languages used at the Council of Europe are English and French. These will be the languages used for the databases, but the information coming from a State Party will also appear in the national language.
- b) For the forum hosting discussion between the Parties, the languages used will be English and French together with the language of the country or community concerned.
- c) For the other discussion forums hyperlinked with the information system, the initiative of having translation into the Council of Europe official languages carried out rests with those in charge of the forums.
- d) A link is established with the thesaurus/glossary.

VI. LINKS WITH EXISTING NETWORKS

Prime links will be established with intergovernmental or non-governmental networks and databases.

The databases of the Council of Europe, HEREIN and CEMAT, the governments and the LE NOTRE website of ECLAS or of certain NGOs will be given pride of place.

- a) The principle of the link is founded on the central theme covered by the network, institution or NGO;
- b) The institutional or NGO networks are the following:

Council of Europe:

- HEREIN: link under the heading of protection (heritage database);
- CEMAT: themes to be determined according to an instruction of the Conference;

Parties:

Other links with the institutions of the Parties (ministries especially).

Non-governmental organisations:

- ECLAS: link to the thesaurus principally, and training matters;
- NGOs: links provided with the NGOs holding observer status with the Council of Europe in respect of the European Landscape Convention; the link will operate at the level of the Secretariat.

VII. MEDIUM-TERM DEVELOPMENT

- a) The information system will be put into effect starting with the preparation of a study specifying its architecture and proposing answers to the outstanding questions that will have been debated at the Conference of the European Landscape Convention in March 2009.
- b) Data collection might begin by inquiry among the correspondents of the Parties about national policies, then compilation of the database on national or regional policies.

- c) Work on the other databases, the glossary and the discussion forum will be spread out over progressives stages in collaboration with the technical operators. A timetable of these stages might be proposed together with the set of specifications for the information system. A trial model should be set up for testing and validation. These stages should lead to the creation of the European Landscape Convention Information System whose acronym will be OCEP in French and ELCO in English.
- d) In future, links may be established with other NGOs according to the state of progress with implementation of the European Landscape Convention and the subject areas covered by these NGOs.

VIII. ACTUATION

- a) The creation of the information system requires the development of a user-friendly technical and ergonomic model comprising tabs for access to the various databases and the other sections, in particular the discussion forum and the glossary/thesaurus. It should allow the incorporation of all forms of documents relating to the landscapes issue, such as maps, photographs, sketches, graphs and possibly 3D representations, etc. The system should be accessible to visually challenged persons, as already appears possible now with the development of new technologies.
- b) Actuation will begin by laying down the specifications of the information system, to which the present group of experts will contribute, assisting the Council of Europe Secretariat and the CDPATEP. This group might work in collaboration with the technical operator and form the agency looking after the validation and quality control of the data or leading the discussion forum. The choice of the group of experts rests with the Council of Europe Secretariat.

Préambule:

Le Comité directeur du patrimoine culturel et du paysage a pris note de l'opportunité de mettre en place un système d'information sur la Convention Européenne du Paysage.

1°) Il rappelle:

les dispositions de la Convention concernant le suivi de sa mise en œuvre (article 10.1) et l'assistance mutuelle et l'échange d'informations (article 8), selon lesquelles les Parties s'engagent à coopérer pour renforcer l'efficacité des mesures prises et en particulier à échanger des informations sur toutes les questions visées par les dispositions de la Convention ;

2°) Il considère:

que la Recommandation CM/Rec(2008)3 du Comité des Ministres aux Etats membres sur les orientations pour la mise en œuvre de la Convention européenne du paysage propose que chacune des Parties contribue à la constitution d'une base de données figurant sur le site Internet de la Convention européenne du paysage du Conseil de l'Europe ; rappelant que la Recommandation mentionne que cette Base de données constituera une « boîte à outils » favorisant une assistance technique et scientifique par la collecte et l'échange d'expériences et de travaux de recherche en matière de paysage, comme prévu à l'article 8 de la Convention mentionné ci-dessus sur l'assistance mutuelle et l'échange d'informations ;

3°) Il prend note

des principes directeurs figurant dans le document réalisé par un groupe d'experts en vue de la réalisation du système d'information sur la Convention Européenne du Paysage.

Rappel des objectifs du système d'information sur la Convention Européenne du Paysage :

Il est proposé de créer au Conseil de l'Europe un Système d'information interactif servant la mise en œuvre de la Convention européenne du paysage et s'inscrivant dans les principaux articles de la Convention :

- article 1 : Définitions des termes de protection, gestion et aménagement ;
- article 6 : Mesures particulières :
 - C., Identification et qualification,
 - D., Objectifs de qualité paysagère,

- E., Mise en œuvre,
- article 8 : Assistance mutuelle et échange d'informations ;
- article 10 : Suivi de la mise en œuvre de la Convention.

Ce système d'information devrait permettre de **remplir les objectifs suivants** :

- permettre aux administrations et au public d'accéder à des sources de données et fondamentales relatives à la protection, la gestion et l'aménagement du paysage;
- jouer un rôle « d'observatoire » afin d'analyser et de prévoir les avantages qu'une société en mutation rapide peut avoir à prendre soin du paysage;
- faciliter le suivi du développement des politiques du paysage « en accord », avec la Convention européenne du paysage ;
- entretenir et développer des réseaux de coopération en matière de paysage, et de favoriser la coopération transnationale;

- 1°) Le présent projet de cahier des charges précise les modalités d'élaboration et de mise en œuvre de ce système d'information qui devra répondre aux objectifs précédents et aux conditions suivantes :

 - 13) les langues utilisées,
 - 14) son mode de fonctionnement interactif,
 - 15) les liens établis avec des réseaux existants,

- 2°) Ce protocole est établi entre l'opérateur chargé de l'élaboration du système interactif d'information et le Secrétariat Général du Conseil de l'Europe, qui sera assisté et conseillé par un groupe d'experts sur la question du paysage.
- 3°) L'opérateur qui sera chargé de cette élaboration prendra en compte les modalités d'exécution suivantes :

I. ACCESSIBILITÉ DU SYSTÈME D'INFORMATION

Le principe du Système d'information de la Convention européenne du paysage repose sur une accessibilité des informations à tout public ; cependant, il convient de distinguer :

- les entités qui alimentent le système d'information du public qui le consulte, d'une part,

- les informations factuelles (politiques, textes officiels) et les informations programmatiques et problématiques d'autre part.

Le principe d'alimentation et de consultation se fait selon le schéma suivant :

Le système d'information devra répondre à ce schéma et permettre de distinguer d'une part les diverses entités qui alimentent le système du public qui le consulte et d'autre part les informations factuelles et les informations programmatiques et problématiques. Cette distinction se fera par une accessibilité sélective fondée sur l'attribution de codes respectifs.

1. Entités alimentant le système d'information

- Secrétariat général du Conseil de l'Europe, CDPATEP,
- Parties officielles du Conseil de l'Europe,
- Autorités politiques,
- Administrations publiques des États, des pouvoirs locaux et régionaux du Conseil de l'Europe,
- Grand public, ONG, tous acteurs des secteurs économique ou social,
- Organismes d'enseignement et scientifiques,

Selon des procédures de validation qui sont précisées ci-après.

2. Public consultant le système d'information

Par principe, le système d'information est accessible à tous les types de public.

II. FORME DU SYSTÈME D'INFORMATION

Le Système d'information de la Convention européenne du paysage est constitué par des bases de données mises en réseau et un forum, eux-mêmes articulés avec les sites Internet nationaux, régionaux ou locaux et thématiques, avec des entrées identifiées **par des onglets spécifiques**.

- L'avantage d'un tel système évite la constitution de trop volumineuses bases de données et permet une gestion spécifique et autonome de chacune d'elles ;
- il permet également de relier l'ensemble à des bases de données et à des réseaux existants ayant un lien direct ou indirect avec la question des paysages.

Ce réseau internet sera associé à une base de données « originales », spécifique à la dimension européenne du Système d'information, qui rassemblera les données élaborées par le Secrétariat Général du Conseil de l'Europe.

La forme du système d'information devra permettre à tout moment de l'alimentation et de la consultation d'accéder aux différentes rubriques du système à l'aide des onglets.

III. CONTENU DU SYSTÈME D'INFORMATION DE LA CONVENTION EUROPÉENNE DU PAYSAGE

Les fonctions du Système d'information comprennent les éléments suivants :

- une (ou des) Base(s) de données comportant :
 - un recueil sur les politiques des Parties à la Convention,

- le rassemblement des publications du Conseil de l'Europe sur le paysage,
- un agenda des manifestations du Conseil de l'Europe autour des paysages ;
- des informations sur les projets Interreg et autres programmes de l'Union européenne ;
- une base d'expériences de protection, gestion et aménagement de paysages, conduites en accord avec les principes de la Convention européenne du paysage ou innovantes en matière de paysage;
- deux forums de discussion, l'un entre les Parties à la Convention et l'autre en lien avec les autorités locales et régionales ainsi qu'avec les ONG ;
- un thésaurus/glossaire tenant comte du Glossaire du développement territorial de la CEMAT ;
- un portail d'accès à des travaux et initiatives, alimentés par tous types d'acteurs et validés selon la procédure examinée ci-après ;

La rubrique « agenda » peut exister à d'autres échelles (régionale, locale) : voir ci-après.

1. Base de données sur les politiques des Parties à la Convention européenne du paysage

Cette base de données sera remplie :

- d) Avec les informations sur les politiques de paysage des divers Etats issues du travail des représentants des Etats membres à partir de l'enquête conduite par questionnaire par le Secrétariat Général auprès des Parties du Conseil de l'Europe ;
- e) Avec des informations sur les politiques sectorielles présentant un volet sur les paysages (par exemple, politique agricole contenant des dispositions en faveur de l'amélioration du paysage ou politique de construction présentant des dispositions prenant en compte le paysage) et également issues de la même enquête ;
- f) Les informations doivent être validées pour leur rigueur et exactitude ; plusieurs niveaux de validation peuvent être identifiés :
 - le premier niveau de validation, prioritaire, est le niveau national, régional ou local : les représentants des Parties de la Convention européenne du paysage s'assureront de la validité des informations par rapport au corpus des politiques paysagères et autres politiques contenant une dimension paysagère quelles que soient les échelles auxquelles ces politiques sont élaborées,
 - un autre niveau est celui du Secrétariat du Conseil de l'Europe qui vérifiera la conformité des informations par rapport aux objectifs de la base de données. Il pourra être assisté par un groupe d'experts qui assurera un soutien dans l'examen de la validité des informations.

L'opérateur aura pour charge d'élaborer la structure de la base de données en distinguant les divers types d'informations enregistrées selon des rubriques signalées par des onglets spécifiques; chaque donnée sera identifiée selon le pays. Une procédure devra être proposée pour permettre aux représentants des Parties de la Convention Européenne du Paysage de n'enregistrer que des informations validées.

2. Base d'expériences de protection, de gestion ou d'aménagement des paysages

Il s'agira d'expériences de protection, gestion et aménagement des paysages mises en œuvre par des Etats membres, des collectivités territoriales ou des ONG selon les principes de la Convention européenne du paysage ou selon des méthodes innovantes ne se réclamant pas forcément de la Convention européenne du paysage mais permettant d'améliorer ou d'enrichir les méthodes. L'identification de ces expériences sera à l'initiative de tout public de manière à permettre l'expression la plus large des acteurs de ces expériences.

L'opérateur aura également pour charge d'élaborer la structure de la base de données : chaque donnée sera identifiée par sa localisation, ses caractéristiques paysagères et administratives ; elle pourra faire l'objet d'une annexe comprenant des cartes et des photographies appropriées et fournies par le public alimentant la base. La base de données devra permettre de naviguer de la partie textuelle à la partie d'illustrations.

3. Forum de discussion

e) Le forum de discussion est destiné aux Parties. Il permettra d'informer un site Internet interactif sur des activités ou des réflexions concernant le paysage et les expériences de protection, gestion, aménagement des paysages, les échanges d'information, les coopérations transfrontalières, c'est-à-dire tout sujet relatif aux paysages européens ou extra-européens.

- f) Réalisé selon une forme interactive, ce forum de discussion sera consultable par tout public. L'animation du forum est du ressort du Secrétariat Général assisté par le groupe d'experts selon des modalités à examiner lors de l'établissement du cahier des charges de l'élaboration du système d'information. Cette animation peut comprendre des discussions thématiques en fonction de l'actualité et des questions vives du paysage.
- g) Toute autre forme de forum de discussion est laissée à l'initiative des Parties, des autorités politiques d'autres échelles ou des autres organes et ONG s'intéressant aux questions de paysage. Le système d'information peut établir des liens avec ces autres forums.
- h) La valorisation des informations et réflexions livrées par les intervenants au forum se fera par le groupe d'experts qui en fera des analyses et en tirera des synthèses qui seront placées sur le site. L'étude des modalités de cette valorisation fera partie des questions examinées lors de l'établissement du cahier des charges du système d'information.

L'opérateur sera chargé d'élaborer et de structurer le site interactif de manière à enregistrer dans une rubrique spécifique les réflexions et expériences fournies par le public en aménageant un dispositif limitant leur durée de consultation; une rubrique sera organisée pour la valorisation des informations et réflexions livrées par les intervenants au forum par le groupe d'experts. Chacune de ces rubriques sera accessible par un onglet spécifique. Un lien internet sera prévu dans une rubrique spécifique pour accéder aux forums de discussion proposés par les Parties, les autorités politiques d'autres échelles ou les autres organes et ONG s'intéressant aux questions de paysage.

4. Thésaurus/glossaire

- e) Afin de faciliter la communication et la compréhension des termes utilisés dans les informations en provenance des divers Etats membres contribuant à compléter les bases de données, un thésaurus/glossaire sera organisé sur la base des termes définis dans la Convention européenne du paysage, c'est-à-dire:
 - terme équivalent au mot paysage dans chaque pays et définition(s) de ce terme selon les publications scientifiques du pays concerné,
 - politique du paysage,
 - objectif de qualité paysagère,
 - protection des paysages,
 - gestion des paysages,
 - aménagement des paysages,
 - et tout autre terme qui semblera pertinent (ex. Atlas de paysage = cataleg de paisatge) ou qui sera identifié par son usage dans les méthodes d'analyse des paysages ou d'aménagement, protection et gestion des paysages ;
- f) D'autres termes pourront être ajoutés à ces derniers selon l'importance que les correspondants nationaux leur attribueront. Ceux-ci devront s'assurer de la validité des informations qu'ils délivrent et pourront consulter les spécialistes de leur pays.
- g) Des liens seront établis avec les thesaurus de la base de données HEREIN et d'ECLAS.
- h) L'organisation du thésaurus reposera notamment sur des mots-clés puisés dans les expressions et mots de la Convention européenne du paysage ou dans le vocabulaire propre au domaine du paysage dans les pays membres du Conseil de l'Europe.
- i) La gestion du thésaurus est assurée par un groupe d'experts différent du groupe d'experts contribuant à l'animation du système d'information mais ces deux groupes seront en relation selon des modalités examinées lors de l'établissement du cahier des charges du système d'information.

L'opérateur sera chargé

1) d'établir la structure du thésaurus/glossaire selon des catégories proposées par le groupe d'experts ; cette structure permettra d'accéder aux termes équivalents à un concept selon les langues par un onglet spécifique à une langue déterminée

2) d'aménager les liens avec les autres thésaurus/glossaires nommés ci-dessus ou avec d'autres thésaurus/glossaires qui auraient pu être élaborés dans d'autres organismes ou ONG. Ces liens seront accessibles selon les termes présents dans les divers thésaurus/glossaires.

5. Portail d'accès à des bases de données ouvertes à des travaux et initiatives, identifiées en liaison avec les Parties et reliées à la mise en œuvre de la Convention.

- b) Informations diverses relatives à la protection, la gestion et l'aménagement des paysages qui pourront être directement introduites par des autorités publiques et le public dans la base de données selon des critères que le Secrétariat et le groupe de travail des experts proposeront ;
- b) Publications du Conseil de l'Europe ;
 - textes de référence, (de la Convention européenne du paysage, rapport explicatif, recommandations diverses et notamment pour la mise en œuvre de la convention, rapports des conférences, etc.);
 - actes et communications des réunions des ateliers du Conseil de l'Europe sur la mise en œuvre de la Convention européenne du paysage ;
 - actes et communications des séminaires nationaux du Conseil de l'Europe sur la mise en œuvre de la Convention européenne du paysage ;
- c) Actualités sur le Prix du paysage du Conseil de l'Europe : candidats, lauréats, expériences lauréates ;
- d) Etat des signatures et ratifications de la Convention européenne du paysage ;
- e) Bibliographies de publications hors Conseil de l'Europe : lien avec des sites extérieurs :
 - publications scientifiques,
 - publications de rapports d'études,
 - ouvrages divers et notamment sur la peinture de paysage ;
- f) Institutions spécialisées dans la question de l'étude et de la protection, la gestion et l'aménagement des paysages et en particulier dans la mise en œuvre de la Convention européenne du paysage : *lien avec des sites extérieurs* ;
- k) Identification et cartographie des paysages placés sous un statut de protection particulier (paysages protégés, du Patrimoine mondial de l'UNESCO, etc.) : *lien avec des sites extérieurs* ;
- l) Laboratoires scientifiques spécialisés dans la recherche sur les paysages : lien avec des sites extérieurs ;

Cette rubrique fonctionnera à trois niveaux :

– un agenda des manifestations organisées par le Secrétariat général du Conseil de l'Europe ou placées sous son patronage autour de la Convention européenne du paysage (colloques, ateliers, séminaires et expositions en cours ou annoncées) ;

- un agenda des manifestations organisées par les Parties et autres collectivités territoriales signalées par un lien vers les sites Internet concernés;
- un agenda des manifestations concernées par les débats du Forum thématique et signalées par un lien vers les sites Internet concernés.

L'opérateur aura pour charge de structurer cette rubrique qui permettra d'identifier par des onglets appropriés les manifestations selon un calendrier précis et selon leurs responsables, leur localisation et leurs caractéristiques spécifiques. Il devra également prévoir les liens Internet vers les sites concernés par les débats du Forum thématique.

IV. LANGUES UTILISÉES DANS LES BASES DE DONNÉES

- e) Les langues utilisées au Conseil de l'Europe sont l'anglais et le français. Ce seront les langues utilisées pour les bases de données, mais les informations provenant d'un pays Partie figureront également dans la langue du pays.
- f) Pour le Forum de discussion entre les Parties, les langues utilisées seront l'anglais et le français ainsi que la langue du pays ou de la collectivité concernés.
- g) Pour les autres Forums de discussion liés au système d'information par un lien internet, l'initiative de la traduction dans les langues officielles du Conseil de l'Europe revient aux responsables de ces Forums.
- h) Un lien est établi avec le thesaurus/glossaire.

L'opérateur devra rédiger les textes techniques du système d'information (titres des rubriques, onglets, etc.) dans les deux langues du Conseil de l'Europe, l'anglais et le français. Il disposera pour toute information issue d'un pays dont la langue n'est ni l'anglais, ni le français de la version linguistique de ce pays et de ses traductions en anglais et en français. Pour les autres langues, l'initiative de la traduction et la responsabilité de sa qualité revient aux responsables des Parties et des autres Forums. L'opérateur n'aura pas à traduire les informations lui-même.

- e) La mise en œuvre du système d'information débutera par l'élaboration d'une étude précisant l'architecture du système et permettant de répondre aux questions restant en suspens et qui auront été débattues lors de la Conférence de la Convention européenne du paysage de mars 2009.
- f) La collecte des données pourrait débuter par l'enquête auprès des correspondants des Parties sur les politiques nationales et la constitution de la base de données des politiques nationales ou régionales.
- g) La réalisation des autres bases de données, du glossaire, du forum de discussion s'échelonnera selon des étapes progressives en collaboration avec les opérateurs techniques. Un calendrier de ces étapes pourrait être proposé avec le cahier des charges du système d'information. Un modèle expérimental devrait être mis en place afin de l'éprouver et de le valider. Ces étapes devraient conduire à la création d'un Système d'information de la Convention européenne du paysage dont les sigles seront respectivement OCEP en langue française et ELCO en langue anglaise.
- h) Dans l'avenir, des liens pourront être établis avec d'autres ONG selon le degré d'avancement de la mise en œuvre de la Convention européenne du paysage et les thématiques abordées par ces ONG.

VII. MISE EN ŒUVRE

- c) La réalisation du système d'information demande le développement d'un modèle technique et ergonomique convivial comportant des onglets permettant d'accéder aux diverses bases de données et aux autres rubriques, notamment au forum de discussion et au glossaire/thésaurus. Il doit permettre d'intégrer toutes les formes de documents relatifs à la question des paysages tels que cartes, photographies, croquis, graphiques, et éventuellement représentations 3D, etc. Ce système devrait être accessible aux personnes malvoyantes, comme cela semble possible désormais avec le développement de nouvelles technologies.
- d) La mise en œuvre débutera par l'établissement du cahier des charges du système d'information auquel l'actuel groupe d'experts contribuera, assistant le Secrétariat du Conseil de l'Europe et le CDPATEP. Ce groupe pourrait travailler en collaboration avec l'opérateur technique et constituer l'instance de validation et de contrôle de qualité des données ou d'animation du forum de discussion. Le choix du groupe d'experts est du ressort du Secrétariat du Conseil de l'Europe.

Questions à débattre lors de la réunion du 28 septembre 2009 :

1°) La mise en œuvre du système d'information débutera par l'élaboration d'une étude précisant **l'architecture du système** et permettant de répondre aux questions restant en suspens et qui auront été débattues lors de la Conférence de la Convention européenne du paysage de mars 2009.

Suggestion: l'architecture du système est tracée en grande partie par le présent projet. C'est sa formalisation technique qui fera l'objet de cette étude.

2°) La collecte des données pourrait débuter par l'enquête auprès des correspondants des Parties sur les politiques nationales et la constitution de la base de données des politiques nationales ou régionales.

Suggestion: l'organisation de cette base de données ne peut relever uniquement du travail de l'opérateur: il s'agit d'une tache sur le fond des questions de paysage; le groupe d'experts pourrait intervenir pour assister le Secrétariat dans ce travail.

3°) La réalisation des autres bases de données, du glossaire, du forum de discussion s'échelonnera selon des étapes progressives en collaboration avec les opérateurs techniques. **Un calendrier de ces étapes pourrait être proposé avec le cahier des charges du système d'information. Un modèle expérimental devrait être mis en place** afin de l'éprouver et de le valider. Ces étapes devraient conduire à la création d'un Système d'information de la Convention européenne du paysage dont les sigles seront respectivement OCEP en langue française et ELCO en langue anglaise.

Suggestion : un calendrier pourrait être discuté en réunion ; il pourrait s'échelonner sur 3 ans ; le plus urgent est l'établissement du modèle expérimental.

4°) Validation des informations de la base de données **sur les politiques des Parties** : un autre niveau est celui du Secrétariat du Conseil de l'Europe qui vérifiera la conformité des informations par rapport aux objectifs de la base de données. **Il pourra être assisté par un groupe d'experts** qui assurera un soutien dans l'examen de la validité des informations.

Suggestion: la validation ne peut intervenir que lorsque les objectifs de la base de données seront fixés. C'est davantage sur l'organisation des données que le groupe d'experts intervient que sur leur contenu qui est validé par les Parties.

5°) Réalisé selon une forme interactive, le forum de discussion sera consultable par tout public. **L'animation du forum** est du ressort du Secrétariat Général assisté par le groupe d'experts selon des modalités à examiner lors de l'établissement du cahier des charges de l'élaboration du système d'information. **Cette animation peut comprendre des discussions thématiques** en fonction de l'actualité et des questions vives du paysage.

Suggestion: il est nécessaire de s'entendre sur la définition de l'animation; le groupe d'experts pourrait se réunir à des périodes fixes (voir calendrier) et examiner le contenu des questions issues du Forum, proposer une sélection des thématiques les plus récurrentes et procéder alors à une discussion interne au groupe destinée à des réponses introduites dans la base du Forum.

6°) La valorisation des informations et réflexions livrées par les intervenants au forum se fera par le groupe d'experts qui en fera des analyses et en tirera des synthèses qui seront placées sur le site. L'étude des modalités de cette valorisation fera partie des questions examinées lors de l'établissement du cahier des charges du système d'information.

Suggestion: voir précédemment; les réponses du groupe d'experts pourraient être assorties d'exemples ou d'expériences, de publications se référant aux thématiques retenues et issues du contenu des questions et réflexions livrées par les intervenants au Forum.

On pourrait alors de préférence procéder à une consultation d'experts spécialisés sur des termes ou des expressions renvoyant à une thématique particulière. Le groupe d'experts chargé de l'animation du site pourrait alors faire appel à eux quand la nécessité s'en fait sentir. Il faut prendre garde à la singularité des significations de ces termes et expressions selon les langues et le contexte dans lequel ils sont apparus. C'est pourquoi la consultation d'experts connus dans un pays pourrait être plus bénéfique et moins risquée.

8°) Rôle du groupe d'experts dans **l'identification des institutions et opérations** figurant dans le portail du système (point III. 5).

Suggestion: il y a là une question de déontologie à respecter. Le nombre des institutions ayant une compétence sur les questions de paysage, de publications, d'expériences, etc., est très important. Le protocole indique que le choix se fera en « en liaison avec les Parties et reliées à la mise en œuvre de la Convention »; il y a là un risque de clientélisme ou d'effets de groupes de pression. Il convient d'avoir une discussion approfondie sur cette question lors de la réunion du 28 septembre 2009 et notamment sur le rôle que pourrait jouer le groupe d'experts.

- c. to exchange information on all matters covered by the provisions of the Convention". (Article 8)

Landscape Award of the Council of Europe

- 1. The Landscape award of the Council of Europe is a distinction which may be conferred on local and regional authorities and their groupings that have instituted, as part of the landscape policy of a Party to this Convention, a policy or measures to protect, manage and/or plan their landscape, which have proved lastingly effective and can thus serve as an example to other territorial authorities in Europe. The distinction may be also conferred on non-governmental organisations having made particularly remarkable contributions to landscape protection, management or planning.
- Applications for the Landscape award of the Council of Europe shall be submitted to the Committees of Experts mentioned in Article 10 by the Parties. Transfrontier local and regional authorities and groupings of local and regional authorities concerned, may apply provided that they jointly manage the landscape in question.
- On proposals from the Committees of Experts mentioned in Article 10 the Committee of Ministers shall
 define and publish the criteria for conferring the Landscape award of the Council of Europe, adopt the
 relevant rules and confer the Award.
- 4. The granting of the Landscape award of the Council of Europe is to encourage those receiving the award to ensure the sustainable protection, management and/or planning of the landscape areas concerned. (article 11).
