5. Summary of the purpose of the committee: (no more than 100 words)

In a world dominated by conflict, ongoing inter-religious and inter-convictional dialogue is needed as a sustainable process to strengthen democratic and peaceful co-existence. Our committee has been engaged in this dialogue since 2021.

<u>Central objective</u>: the establishment of a permanent platform for interreligious, interconvictional, democratic and equality-based dialogue within the Council of Europe, with a view to constructive cooperation between religions and convictions to meet the challenges of today: democratic crisis, migration crisis, protection of religious and ethnic minorities, prevention of discrimination, violence and extremism.

Education is a decisive factor, and we are building up a database of good practice in dialogue.

12. Please summarise how the new committee contribute to and advance the priorities and influence of CINGO and Civil Society within the Council of Europe? (no more than 200 words)

Our committee intends to contribute to the implementation of the **Parliamentary Assembly's REC-2080 (2015**) entitled "Religious freedom and coexistence in a democratic society" and supports in particular point 3 aimed at creating **a permanent platform for dialogue** between representatives of religions and philosophical and non-confessional organisations within the CoE.

We consider it important to involve representatives of civil society, the Congress and PACE in all formats of inter-religious dialogue to ensure that they are meaningful.

The Council of Ministers has asked PACE(*CM/AS*(2016)Rec2080-final, 15 April 2016) to further define the dialogue platform in terms of activity, composition and possible funding.

We also refer to the work of the Congress "Organising intercultural and interreligious activities, a toolbox for local authorities" <u>www.congress-intercultural.eu/en/initiative/12-organising-intercultural-and-interreligious-activities--a-toolkit-for-local-authorities--resolution-397-2016-.html</u>

Our committee is working for the development of formats for inter-religious and inter-faith dialogue that include the 4 pillars of the CoE, including COING, in order to contribute to <u>the revitalisation of</u> <u>European democracies</u>.

We recommend that a <u>drafting group</u> composed of representatives of PACE, the Congress and the Conference of INGOs be set up to define the form a more inclusive and gender-balanced permanent DIR-Dialogue platform could adopt.
