

## Advocating for the rights of children in contact with the law

What if all children in contact with the justice system felt safe to participate in legal proceedings that affect them? What if they received support and protection of their rights in legal proceedings with dignity, equality and without discrimination?

Child-friendly justice for all children is the fourth objective of the <u>Strategy for the Rights of the Child</u> (2022- 2027), and a crucial component the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and of various policies and national efforts across Europe and the globe.

Child-friendly justice systems guarantee the respect and the effective implementation of children's rights at the highest attainable level, by providing justice that is accessible, age appropriate, speedy, diligent, child-sensitive and respectful of children's rights including the rights to due process, to participate in and to understand the proceedings, to respect for private and family life and to integrity and dignity.

It is essential that children in contact with the justice system feel safe to participate in legal proceedings that concern them. This is particularly important given the significant impact that judicial decisions can have on their lives and the trauma it may cause. It is encouraging to see that alternatives to detention and restorative approaches have become a part of pedagogical and child-friendly procedures, and it would be highly beneficial to further prioritise these in child justice.

Since 2010, the <u>Council of Europe Guidelines on Child-friendly Justice</u> have been instrumental in guiding Member States in adapting their justice systems to the rights and needs of children. Considering the progress achieved and the evolution of international and Council of Europe standards and jurisprudence over the past fifteen years, the Council of Europe is undertaking a thematic review. The aim of this review is to ensure that these Guidelines continue to lay the foundation for a justice system that is effectively responding to the rights and needs of all children in contact with the law.

#### Aim of the Session

This session will provide an opportunity to inform participants about the ongoing thematic review of the Council of Europe's Guidelines on Child-Friendly Justice, with a focus on enhancing their practical application and adaptation to current and emerging needs.

The session will also aim to raise awareness of key challenges, explore systemic deficiencies, and highlight principles of child justice and restorative justice approaches and strategies that help children rebuild their lives, and make positive contributions to society.
