Who we are

The Congress of Local and Regional Authorities is an assembly of grassroots elected politicians representing 150,000 territorial communities in the 47-member States of the Council of Europe. It is a consultative organ for the Committee of Ministers and the Parliamentary Assembly and a forum of exchange for politicians from the wider Europe.

Its primary mission is to monitor the implementation of the European Charter of Local Self-Government across the continent and to promote, defend and improve the rights of local and regional authorities and the working conditions of local and regional elected representatives as well as citizen participation. This is being achieved in permanent dialogue with national governments.

The Congress regularly assesses the quality of local and regional democracy. It prepares monitoring reports, organises missions to observe local and regional elections and implements cooperation programmes in several member States in the framework of the Council of Europe Action plans. These activities on the ground provide local and regional politicians, cities and regions as well as their associations with the means to acquire new skills and know-how, and to strengthen their institutional capacities. Handbooks and guidelines on Human Rights at local level and a toolkit for organising intercultural and interreligious activities, a strategy on preventing corruption and promoting public ethics and transparency and the European Alliance of Cities and Regions for Roma inclusion complement the reports and legal and policy recommendations which are prepared by the Congress members and adopted in its sessions. All this aims at contributing to building more inclusive and sustainable societies.

Our focus on the SDGs

Based on its mandate as an international organisation with a focus on democracy, human rights and the rule of law, the Council of Europe contributes especially to the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) 1, 3, 4, 5, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 15, 16 and 17, defined in the United Nations Agenda 2030 for Sustainable Development¹.

The Congress believes that several key principles must form the basis of the action in achieving Sustainable Development Goals through integrated community development in a broader sense. These principles are the following:

Achieving SDGs is a shared responsibility of all levels of government: global, European, national, local and regional. The final objective of SDGs is improving the well-being of the citizens and of the communities where they live. It is impossible to implement a policy nationally if its implementation fails

locally. National governments must therefore establish a constant dialogue with regional and local authorities on implementing SDGs, through proper consultation mechanisms.

Local and regional authorities must have proper autonomy of action and decision making to achieve SDGs – which includes proper competences, financial and budget autonomy, and freedom to make decisions on the use of local resources and planning local development.

Citizens must always remain at the heart of the action for achieving SDGs. Local and regional authorities bear the primary responsibility for addressing citizens' needs, as the authorities closest to them. Citizens must therefore be engaged in local decision making on the issues of community development. They must be co-owners of the decisions on integrated territorial planning and the use of resources of their communities.

Our partners

Within the Council of Europe, the Congress contributes to the implementation of 12 of the 17 objectives at the local and regional level and co-operates closely with the Parliamentary Assembly, the Commissioner for Human Rights and the inter-governmental sector.

In order to facilitate the implementation of the SDGs and in the spirit of SDG 17 "Revitalize the global partnership for sustainable development", the Congress cooperates with international actors and networks representing local and regional authorities or their associations, such as United Cities and Local Governments (UCLG), the Council of European Municipalities and Regions (CEMR); the Assembly of European Regions (AER); the Conference of European Regional Legislative Assemblies (CALRE); the Network of Associations of Local Authorities of South-East Europe (NALAS) and with European Union institutions such as the European Committee of the Regions.

SDG 5: Achieve gender equality and empower all women and girls



Congress action

The Congress actively supports efforts to achieve gender equality and empower women and girls at the local and regional level through both the adoption of texts and participation by its members in events/conferences.

To strengthen gender equality, the Congress has developed activities and encourage local authorities to provide political efforts to: increase the decision-making power of women, guarantee women's rights and guarantee the integration of women from religious and cultural minorities.

Furthermore, The Congress is undertaking work on women participation to public life, equality between men and women, as well as on women's rights, for example by introducing quotas in its national delegations, adopting resolutions and recommendations on gender equality, and contributing to actions fighting violence against women. Through its co-operation activities, it also stresses the importance of adopting and implementing the European Charter for Equality of Women and Men in Local Life as a sound step towards gender equality, gender mainstreaming and the promotion of equal opportunities for women and men in local political and public life.

In 2014, the <u>European Alliance of Cities and Regions for the Inclusion of</u> <u>Roma and Travellers</u> was set up to encourage inclusive policies, bringing together 130 cities from 29 countries. The Congress promotes the Declaration against Anti-Gypsyism which, to date, has been signed by 122 local and regional authorities from 34 countries, indicating their determination to fight discrimination against Roma. The Congress also awards the <u>Dosta! Prize</u> biannually to municipalities that implement innovative initiatives to ensure long-term inclusion of Roma.

Congress action

In 2015, faced with the rise of hate speech and the terrorist threat, the Congress has adopted a Strategy to fight radicalisation at grassroots level and developed a <u>Toolkit</u> (for the use by local authorities) to promote intercultural and interreligious dialogue. Furthermore, it organised 3 <u>Summits of Mayors for the Alliance of European Cities against Violent</u> <u>Extremism</u>. It also developed the first edition of a human rights handbook for local and regional authorities on the right of non-discrimination towards refugees, asylum seekers, migrants and IDPs, Roma and

Congress action

The Congress acts for the promotion of inclusive and sustainable societies, by fostering regional democracy, based on human rights, respectful of its citizens rights, liberties and freedoms. It also monitors the situation of local and regional democracy in the 47 Member States of the Council of Europe in the light of the European Charter on Local Self-Government and provides recommendations to all governments in order to improve local self-government in Europe and, pending an official invitation, it observes local and regional elections on a peer-to-peer basis, involving local and regional politicians from the 47 Council of

Europe member States.

To enable a better understanding of the role and responsibilities of local authorities in promoting public ethics and in the prevention and fight of political and administrative corruption, the Congress has recently adopted a series of thematic reports which propose mechanisms to report any wrongdoings. The Congress has also developed country-specific <u>Handbooks on Transparency and Citizen</u> <u>Participation</u> and a guide for local authorities on the <u>misuse of administrative resources and fair</u> <u>elections</u>.
