

Workshop on a blueprint for multilevel governance for co-ordinated integration policies in Cyprus

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It is often said that the European way of life is an inclusive one. Effective integration and inclusion policies are key to welcoming people into local communities, and to the long-term well-being of our societies and the stability of our economies. If we want to help our societies and economies thrive, we need to support everyone who is part of society, with integration being both a right and a duty for all.

Multilevel governance is increasingly seen as an important approach for effective intercultural integration because integration is, by its nature, a responsibility of all governmental levels and requires interdepartmental co-ordination at each level of government, as well as effective partnerships with non-governmental organisations. The role that cities and regions are playing in migrant integration also needs to be acknowledged by introducing mechanisms for a bottom-up transfer of knowledge, expertise, and decision-making. This approach is outlined in the Council of Europe Recommendation on multilevel policies and governance for intercultural integration (CM/Rec(2022)10).

The "Building structures for intercultural integration in Cyprus" project, implemented by the Intercultural Cities Programme of the Council of Europe and the European Commission's Directorate General for Structural Reform Support, in partnership with the Civil Registry and Migration Department of the Ministry of Interior of the Republic of Cyprus, prepared a study on elements of multilevel governance of intercultural integration across Europe and their applicability to the Republic of Cyprus. This study formed the basis for the blueprint for a multilevel coordination mechanism for integration policy in Cyprus which will be presented at this workshop. The purpose of this workshop is to discuss this approach and explore ways to strengthen local authorities, civil society and NGO cooperation with the State's competent authorities. In the framework of this discussion, social practices and intercultural aspects of social integration will be looked at with examples provided from other EU countries.
