

RVRN Experience A Coalition to Monitor Hate Crimes

Racist Violecne Recording Network

- Established in 2011 at the initiative of the Office of the UN High Commissioner for Refugees in Greece (UNHCR) and the National Commission for Human Rights (GNCHR).
- Findings:
 - The identified absence, back then in 2011, of an official and effective data collection system on racist violence.
 - The need to coordinate organisations which recorded, on their own initiative, incidents of racist violence against people who sought their services.
- Today, apart from the coordinators UNHCR and GNCHR RVRN is comprised of 47 Non-Governmental Organisations and civil society bodies, as well as the Greek Ombudsman and the Migrant Integration Council of the Municipality of Athens, as observers.

Why a collective response was necessary in 2011?

Escalation of xenophobia and racist violence;

- No reporting of hate crimes and no access to justice and supporting services for victims;
- No common recording methodology, but data of individual NGOs on victims | focus mainly on access to services (e.g. medical or social support);
- Impunity for the perpetrators;
- Impact on victim's communities | Increase of insecurity;
- Impact on institutions.

Why a network was necessary?

Complementarity of structure and functions;

Mandates of UNHCR (Greece) and the Greek National Commission for Human Rights (NCHR);

Capacity of NGOs to have direct contact with the victims and support through their services;

Members of the Network

The Network is consisted of agencies which provide medical, social and legal aid and/or come in direct contact with the victims;

The Network is open to every organization fulfilling the criteria and wishing to participate.

Common aims

Comprehensive indications on the qualitative and quantitative trends;

- Recommendations to authorities based on national and international human rights law;
- Information sharing and public awareness.

Tools and Procedures

- Inclusiveness and coordination;
- Clear objectives and tools;
- Common agreement on definitions, rules, rights and obligations;
- Common methodology on recording the incidents of racist violence;
- Dissemination of common findings (quantitative and qualitive trends of racist violence);
- Development of alliances and cooperation with other stakeholders;
- Internal and external capacity building.

Methodology = Power of data

- Common recording form;
- Recording based on the victim's testimony (other options are explored);
- Anonymous data, used solely and exclusively by the RVRN;
- Recorder's role and responsibility ;

Operational challenges

- Challenges in data collection:
 - Victims' situation and profiles;
 - Members' capacity
- Challenges in victims' support | Project based Services | Access to the needed services

Achievements

- Between 2011 and 2019 the RVRN has documented, through interviews with the victims, 1151 incidents of racist violenceand many victims were supported;
- Nine (9) annual reports on trends widely disseminated and press conferences with pluralistic representation;
- Reliability of trends extracted from incidents acknowledged by UN agencies, ECourtHR, FRA, OSCE etc.;
- Golden Dawn organisation and other individual perpetrators brought to justice;
- Communication for the supervision of the execution of judgments, relating to the case of Sakir v. Greece (pursuant to Rule 9.2 | Application No. 48475/09);
- Special status for the protection of the victims and witnesses of hate crimes in the Greek legal framework;
- Empowerment of communities;
- Institutional influence and recognition: common terminology | RVRN participation in the National Council against Racism and Intolerance | RVRN participation in the Agreement on inter-agency co-operation on addressing racist crimes in Greece (ODIHR | Greek State | Greek Justice System)

RVRN participation in the NCRI

- The regular and alternate members of the NCRI are nominated by the competent Ministers and bodies on the basis of their expertise in matters relating to racism or their powers;
- RVRN participates in NCRI sittings with two representatives (and their deputies);
- RVRN represents in NCRI the civil society;
- RVRN consistently:
 - supports the work of the National Action Plan against Racism on the basis of consultation of the members of the Council and other special bodies or experts on specific issues;
 - submitts recommendations to the competent authorities and proposals for specific actions;
 - informs the members of the Council for developments in the field related to racist violence trends and the challenges regarding the implementation of the legal framework;
 - requests the NCRI intervention when it is needed;

RVRN Domestic Advocacy | Main Points

- Completion of the National Action Plan against Racism, in the implementation of which all the involved Authorities will be engaged;
- Proper recruitment procedure, training and strict guidelines for the Police and especially the special Departments and Offices within the Hellenic Police;
- Training of prosecutors and judges;
- Adequate investigation of racist motive from the early stages of the procedure;
- Victim protection and support;
- Coordination between the involved actors and services for ensuring vistim's support;
- Special measures for facing the institutional racism;
- **Last but not least:** Send a message to all the directions that racist motivated violence is not tolerated.
