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# Background

Deportation of people during the armed conflicts, separation of families, violence and abuse constitute flagrant violations of human rights of the civilian population. Since the beginning of the Russian aggression against Ukraine, deportation of Ukrainian civilians, in particular children, constitute a serious feature of aggression and example of a state actor's abuse, resulting in violations of International Humanitarian Law (IHL), International Human Rights Law (IHRL), and international criminal law. These violations include, but are not limited to, the illegal deportation, forcible transfer, unlawful alteration of custody, and adoption of Ukrainian children.

In April 2023, the Parliamentary Assembly of the Council of Europe adopted the Recommendation 2253(2023) on "Deportations and forcible transfers of Ukrainian children and other civilians to Russian Federation or to Ukrainian territories temporarily occupied, create conditions for their safe return, stop these crimes and punish the perpetrators". The recommendation encourages the development of a new Human Rights Education for Legal Professionals online course on the deportation of children.

# About the course

This HELP course was developed in 2024 by the Council of Europe HELP programme, within the framework of the Project "HELP (Human Rights Education for Legal Professionals) for Ukraine, including during wartime", implemented as a part of the Council of Europe Action Plan for Ukraine "Resilience, Recovery and Reconstruction" (2023-2026) and as follow-up to the PACE Recommendation 2253(2023).

Through a detailed examination of applicable IHL and IHRL frameworks, this course provides legal professionals with advanced knowledge of the legal standards governing forced displacement in conflict zones. It equips with the knowledge and skills necessary to apply these frameworks in the prosecution and adjudication of international crimes, thereby reinforcing accountability for the perpetrators of such egregious violations, to address the complex issues of child deportation in conflict zones and to enforce international legal standards effectively.

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Additionally, the course covers the treatment of children during forced displacement, as well as the rights to family reunification and return, emphasising the roles of states, international organisations, and other actors in facilitating these processes. Finally, the course explores the mechanisms for holding both individuals and states accountable for illegal deportations.
