



Eradication of Ruddy Ducks in the UK to protect the White-headed Duck

Short-term UK population trend





Current situation

 Estimated UK population around 13 birds.

 Two main regional populations with 2-5 birds (NW England, SW England).



Date of last confirmed breeding

- Scotland 2008
- Wales 2010
- Northern Ireland 2013
- England 2021



Breeding since 2018 - English regions

- 2018 one brood (London), removed in December.
- 2019 No records
- 2020 One brood confirmed and a second suspected (SW England/West Midlands)
- 2021 Two broods (NW England and SW England)
- 2022 No records



Control effort 2022/23

- One adult female shot January 2022
- One adult male located 27 June 2023 and intention to shoot this bird on 29 June 2023.



Strategy in 2023/24

- Increase monitoring nationally and ensure successful local eradications.
- Responsibility for control in Northern Ireland now lies with NI Government.
- Top priorities
 removal of adult females and prevention of breeding and recruitment.
- Secondary priority removal of adult males.

The future

- UK Government recognises the importance of full eradication in the UK and is committed to achieving this.
- Low level control expected to take place for a number of years and it may be longer until population dies out completely.
- UK Government strongly supports the eradication of Ruddy Ducks throughout Europe as the only long-term solution.
