#### Context

The European Union / Council of Europe project on "Ensuring child-friendly justice through the effective operation of the Barnahus-units in Finland" is proud to be hosting its final conference, following 24 months of great results and excellent collaboration with the European Commission DG-REFORM, the Ministry of Health and Social Affairs, and the Finnish Institute of Health and Welfare (THL).
