- Violence against women, whether physical or sexual violence, forced marriages or genital mutilation, are neither free nor isolated. They are part of a social mechanism that allows or tolerates discrimination against women. Violence against women and girls is perhaps today the most widespread human rights violation. Violence against women exists in all countries and societies at home, at school, on the street, at work, on the internet. One in three women or girls is abused in their lifetime, while one in two women is killed as a result of violence by their partner or a family member. In times of conflict, women are the first victims of this violence, which, even in times of peace, is too often trivialized and remains unpunished.
- The Convention on Preventing and Combating Violence against Women and Domestic Violence (the Istanbul Convention) is the most ambitious international treaty to address violence against women. The Istanbul Convention and its provisions stem from an in-depth analysis of the problems and solutions found in Council of Europe member states and in other states: these are good practices that have been elevated to the status of a legally binding instrument. Violence against women and girls is a global phenomenon. The Istanbul Convention was written with the view that measures to address this global problem were not confined to a particular geographical area all countries of the world could join it.
