Freedom of association is a fundamental human right

It is protected as an individual's fundamental human right by the European Convention on Human Rights and may only be subjected to restrictions "necessary in a democratic society¹. Freedom of association is also an important enabling factor to the enjoyment of other fundamental rights, notably freedom of expression and freedom of assembly.

A vibrant civic space is the bedrock of a genuine democracy

A trend toward restricting civic space, is increasingly impacting on the freedom of association and on civil society's ability to fulfil its mission and fully participate in public life². This happens through national legislation reducing or complicating access to information, to resources, to public media or to decision-making processes by civil society and NGOs. It is a major concern for European democracies currently striving to increase connectivity and mutual trust between citizens and their democratic institutions.

Strengthening Freedom of Association: a multilateral project to support an enabling environment for civil society in the Member States

The Project will:

- Deliver well-researched substantive information and assessment of risks or threats to civil society (NGOs and INGOs);
- Provide expert analysis of specific legislation, policy or practice in light of relevant CoE and international standards;
- Propose legislative, policy or good practice solutions for the legal and practical challenges to the existence of free, open civic space;
- ▶ Identify common challenges or trends over time and across geographical areas; and
- Facilitate greater exchange and visibility of best practices in and between the Member States.

Working Methods:

The project will be implemented by the Civil Society Division of the Directorate General of Democracy with the Conference of INGO3s and its Expert Council for NGO Law⁴ and in close partnership with leading INGOs in this field. The project will ensure:

- Widely accessible interface for input from civil society
- Evaluation, fact-checking, research and with verified partners
- Analysis and expertise
- ► Transparency of process and outputs
- Dialogue with the Member States, CoE bodies relevant international organisations and civil society

Outputs:

The project will strengthen freedom of association through an enhanced enabling environment for civil society in the Member States. The tangible deliverables will include:

- Recommendations for action with legislative, policy reform on local, regional, national or Council of Europe level
- Specific co-operation or tailor-made assistance activities
- ▶ Dialogue, exchange between Council of Europe bodies (Conference of INGOs, Committee of Ministers, Parliamentary Assembly, Congress of Local and Regional Authorities, Human Rights Commissioner)
- Round tables, conferences and thematic debates at local, regional, national or Council
 of Europe level
- ▶ Online and print publications of studies, surveys, research and assessments

Resources:

The project will benefit from the management, supervision and support of the Civil Society Division, from the network, expertise and experience of the Conference of INGOs and its Expert Council on NGO Law. Additional project specific resource needs are primarily for:

- Legal Adviser/Senior Project Officer, IT web support, financial and logistics assistant
- Funds for contracted research, fact-checking, analysis and evaluation
- Funds for expert travel, subsistence and fees, for interpretation and event organisation
- Funds for translations, publications, awareness-raising and visibility campaigns

The total budget of the four-year project is \leq 2000000. A preliminary funding threshold of \leq 350000 is necessary to launch the project and ensure quality and sustainability.
