

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
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Sooo, where do I begin?

I stared back at her. "What? Are you sure?"


"I'm Sure," she insisted. "I put it with the box of gorgonzola chocolates that it came with."

Cheese niblets, my cousin was taking this all very **SERIOUSLY!**


So, I concentrated hard on each question and, feeling quite confident, answered every one!

As usual, Trap tried to **BLAME** me. "It's all your fault, Cousin! You distracted me on the flight because I had to test you!"


Thea, though, tried to reassure me. "It won't be a **problem**. There's no way they won't let us in ... Look, other rodents are already queuing up. Let's join the queue."




government didn't do the right thing, we do everything needed to make sure it doesn't happen again."














European Convention on Human Rights."

She nodded proudly. "Of course! I'll be talking about our work over the last few months as well as *female empowerment*, which is all about giving women more independence and involvement in economic and political life."

the hundreds of different things that the COUNCIL OF EUROPE does.

Two of the representatives talked about the work of the Council of Europe in *children's rights* and education in the various Member States.

GOALS

The mission of the Council of Europe is to **protect democracy** and human rights in Europe. The Organisation fights for:

- the **abolition** of the death penalty;
- 🜟 strengthening human rights;
- 눚 non-discrimination and getting rid of racism;
- freedom of expression;
- gender equality;
- children's rights;
- 🜟 cultural diversity;
- education in human rights and democracy;
- free and democratic elections in Member States;
- quality medicines and healthcare.

ACTIVITIES

The Council of Europe:

- works through conventions and treaties;
- makes recommendations through independent expert monitoring bodies;
- monitors the progress of Member States.

OFFICIAL LANGUAGES

French and **English** are the two official languages of the Council of Europe. **German**, **Italian**, and **Russian** are working languages.



ORGANISATION

The Council of Europe's headquarters are in **Strasbourg**,

France. It employs 2 200 people.

It also has field offices and liaison offices with other international organisations.

The European Youth Centres in Strasbourg and Budapest, for example, offer education to young people in democracy and

human rights.



THE EUROPEAN ANTHEM

The Council of Europe has used the **European anthem** since 1972. The anthem is an excerpt from the prelude to "Ode to Joy" from Beethoven's 9th Symphony.

THE FLAG

The flag has **12 gold stars on a blue background**. The Council of Europe chose
it in 1955. The number 12 symbolises
perfection and never changes. The European
Community – now the **European Union** –
started **using the flag** as well in **1986**.



THE PALAIS DE L'EUROPE

Designed by French architect Henry Bernard and opened in 1977, the Palais de l'Europe is the headquarters of the Council of Europe. On either side of its entrance are the flags of the 46 Member States, arranged side by side in alphabetical order, according to the country names in English.

THE COUNCIL OF EUROPE LOGO

The symbol of the Council of Europe is a **white C** around **12 gold stars on a blue background**. The letter C stands for *Council* and *Conseil* in the two official languages, English and French.





PARLIAMENTARY ASSEMBLY



The Parliamentary Assembly consists of members of parliament from the 46 Member States.

These MPs represent the 830 million Europeans who elected them.

The Assembly elects the Secretary General, the Human Rights Commissioner, as well as the judges who work in the European Court of Human Rights. It's a democratic forum for discussion. It also monitors elections. It forms committees that play a key role in examining current issues.

The Assembly meets in the **Chamber of the Palais de** l'Europe. Inside, the MPs aren't divided by country but in alphabetical order according to their surnames. This is because their main job is to look after the interests of Europe and not just their own country's.

COMMITTEE OF MINISTERS

The Committee of Ministers is the part of the Council of Europe that makes decisions. It's made up of the foreign affairs Ministers from each Member States or their permanent diplomatic representatives (ambassadors) in Strasbourg.

SECRETARY GENERAL

Elected by the Parliamentary Assembly for five-year terms, the Secretary General leads and represents the Council of Europe.

BUT THERE'S MUCH MORE!

The Council of Europe also works through:

- the Congress of Local and Regional Authorities;
- the European Court of Human Rights;
- the Commissioner for Human Rights;
- the Conference of INGOs (non-governmental organisations).

The Council of Europe works in close partnership with the **European Union**. It also co-operates with the **United Nations**, the **Organisation** for Security and Co-operation in Europe, and with partner nations, both nearby and around the world.

TREATIES AND CONVENTIONS

The Council of Europe has **produced over 200 treaties and conventions** in many areas. These include the European Convention on Human Rights, and the Istanbul Convention against Violence against Women and Domestic Violence.

THE EUROPEAN CONVENTION **ON HUMAN RIGHTS**

The Council of Europe adopted the **European Convention** on Human Rights (ECHR) in 1950. It protects our civil and political rights.

The convention is very important for **protecting human** rights, since it's the only one with a permanent mechanism - the **European Court of Human Rights** in Strasbourg that people can appeal to so they can be sure their rights are protected.

The European Court of Human Rights has one judge from each country that's agreed to the convention and makes sure that each country follows its rules.

DID YOU KNOW?

Anyone can appeal to the European Court of Human Rights (it doesn't matter what their citizenship is or where they live) if they believe that a country that's agreed to the **ECHR** hasn't met its obligations and they have exhausted all national legal options.



★ DON'T GET CONFUSED!★

THE COUNCIL OF EUROPE IS NOT ...

... THE EUROPEAN UNION (EU) - The EU has 27 Member States. They've all delegated some of their sovereignty so that decisions that affect all of Europe can be made at the European level.

... THE EUROPEAN COUNCIL - This is part of the EU made up of the heads of State from its member countries, the President of the European Commission, and the President of the European Council. Its job is to plan EU policies.

THE PARLIAMENTARY ASSEMBLY OF THE COUNCIL OF EUROPE IS NOT ...

... THE EUROPEAN PARLIAMENT - This is the parliament of the EU. It has 705 members from the 27 EU countries, all of them elected by the people.
