The Global Education Week

What?

The Global Education Week (GEW) is an international awareness-rising initiative that inspires people to take action for a more sustainable and inclusive world. Through local initiatives and learning activities, it promotes civic engagement, global solidarity, and active citizenship for sustainable development.

The GEW is organised within the framework of [iLEGEND III – Intercultural Learning Exchange through Global Education, Networking and Dialogue](#), a joint project co-funded by the European Union and the Council of Europe.

Who ?

The GEW is implemented by the North-South Centre of the Council of Europe, who coordinates it at the international level. The [Global Education Network](#), composed of civil society organisations, academia and public authorities, coordinates the campaign at the national and regional level.

Everyone is invited to take part or organise activities, including:

- Policymakers
- Teachers and educators
- Students and learners
- Civil society organisations
- Local authorities
- Anyone interested in creating positive change!



When ?

Held every year since 1999, the Global Education Week takes place during the third week of November.

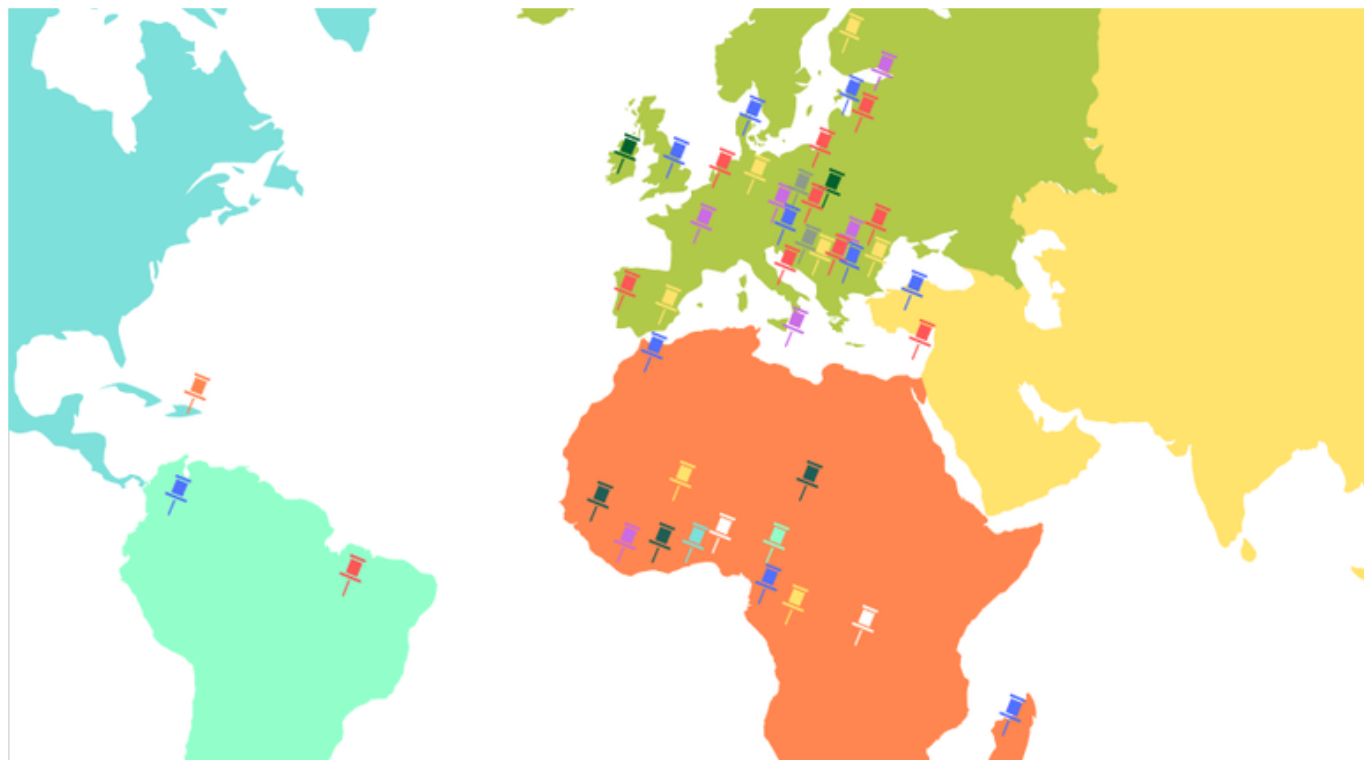
This year's edition will run from 16 to 22 November.

How can you participate?

1) Take part in an existing initiative

2. Explore the registered initiatives

3. Register for activities

If you have found an opportunity that matches your interests, register and secure your place.

4. Get ready to learn, engage and take action

Show up ready to exchange ideas and take action for a more inclusive and sustainable world. Share your experience on social media, using the hashtags in this info pack, and inspire others to join!



How can you participate?

2) Organise your own initiative

1. Define your initiative

Start by deciding what type of initiative you would like to organise and ensure that you have the necessary resources to implement it. If you do not yet have a specific idea in mind, you will find a selection of activity ideas at the end of this information pack to help inspire you and get started.

2. Contact your National Coordinator

Once you have decided on your initiative, get in touch with your National Coordinator to register it as part of Global Education Week.

3. Promote your event

4. Document your initiative

During the event, if possible, take photos and videos to showcase your activity.

Please ensure that participants have signed the media consent form, which is available in this infopack.

5. Share your results

After the GEW, your National Coordinator will send you an online form to share information and feedback on your initiative.

6. Receive your certificate!

Once you have submitted your form, you may receive an official Certificate of Participation in Global Education Week 2026, subject to agreement with your National Coordinator.

Guidelines to promote your initiative

The following guidelines cover everything you need to know about running events and initiatives under the Global Education Week banner.

1) Use the official visuals of the campaign

A wide range of free, customisable templates are available for GEW 2026 on Canva.

Whether you are promoting your initiative online or on the ground, you will use visuals to communicate your event with impact, such as:

Online materials:

Simply download, personalise if necessary, and share. Before using them, don't forget to read the instructions below.

2) Use the appropriate acknowledgement

All communication material should display the following acknowledgment:

“The event is organised in the context of the Global Education Week campaign of the iLEGEND III Joint project of the European Union and the Council of Europe: co-funded by the European Union and the Council of Europe and implemented by the North-South Centre of the Council of Europe”.

And, when relevant:

*The activity “**name of the activity**” is organised and funded by “**name of your organisation**”.*

3) Use the appropriate disclaimer

The following disclaimer should be added on communication material about events organised as part of the Global Education Week:

*“This activity organised in the framework of the Global Education Week are the sole responsibility of the “**name of your organisation**” and do not necessarily reflect the views of the European Union or the Council of Europe.”*

And, when relevant:

“The translation of the original material is not official”.

5) Use pictures taken during your initiative

Capture your event with high-quality images, as they bring your initiative to life and help amplify GEW's reach.

To enable the North-South Centre to share your photos and give your initiative international visibility, ensure all participants have signed [the media consent form](#). If collecting signed forms is not feasible, opt for group shots where individuals are not individually identifiable.

Some ideas of initiatives

The following ideas are just the starting point. Pick one, mix and match, or come up with something entirely your own!

Debates and discussions



Simulated school assembly

Students debate and vote on proposals for a sustainable future, regarding climate justice, gender equality, digital citizenship, economic stability for youth.

Cine Forum

Screen a film, then debate its vision of the future through the lens of peace, human rights, or sustainability.

Rights on trial

A mock trial format where participants argue for and against a human rights dilemma, such as freedom of speech vs. hate speech, privacy vs. security.

Human Rights Today panel

Invite local lawyers, activists, or NGO workers to discuss the state of human rights in your region and globally.

Intergenerational dialogue panel

Bring together young people, educators, and older community members to exchange visions of the future and reflect on how different generations experience justice, peace, and sustainability.

Ethics café

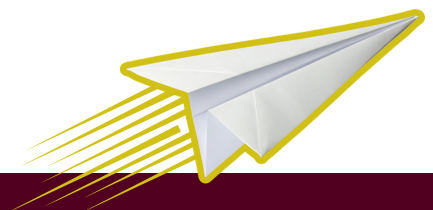
An informal, open discussion format where participants explore ethical dilemmas related to climate, technology, migration, or inequality over coffee.

TED-Style talks

Young people research and present on a GEW theme of their choice in short, engaging talks open to their school or community.

Digital rights debate

Are algorithms discriminatory? Does everyone have a right to internet access? Who owns your data? Spark debate on the rights and risks of the digital age.



Asylum seeker simulation

A structured roleplay where participants experience the asylum-seeking process and reflect on systemic barriers to protection and dignity.

World café

Participants rotate between tables, each tackling a different GEW question. Ideas build across rounds, creating a rich collective conversation.

Mock United Nations

Students represent different countries and negotiate resolutions on global challenges such as food security, climate finance, or digital governance.

Philosophical debate

Facilitate open-ended philosophical questions with young people: What is justice? Can peace exist without equality? What do we owe future generations?

Podcast series

Young people record short episodes interviewing peers, educators, or activists on GEW themes.

Workshops and trainings



Digital literacy

Lectures or workshops on how digital technologies are reshaping society: human rights in digital spaces, online safety, and digital citizenship.

Advocacy and democratic participation

Equip people with tools to express their values as active citizens, know and defend their rights, and act safely for a better future.

Fact-checking & media literacy

Teach participants how to identify misinformation, evaluate sources, and navigate the digital information landscape critically.

Climate action planning workshop

Groups map out concrete local actions they can take to address climate change in their school, neighbourhood, or city.

Human rights in practice

Interactive workshop exploring real-world human rights cases and how international frameworks apply to everyday life.

Social entrepreneurship bootcamp

Teams pitch solutions to a local sustainability or social challenge, developing entrepreneurial thinking alongside global awareness.

Online open lecture

Partner with a university or think tank to deliver a free, publicly accessible lecture on a GEW-related issue.

Community-based actions



Community clean-up & reflection

Combine local environmental action with a structured discussion on the links between everyday behaviour and global sustainability.

Solidarity market

A fair showcasing local ethical, sustainable, or social enterprises, paired with awareness-raising about fair trade and conscious consumption.

Letter-writing campaign

Young people write letters to local or national decision-makers advocating policy changes on issues they care about.

Volunteer fair

Connect students and community members with local NGOs, social enterprises, and civic initiatives they can join beyond GEW.

Repair café

A community event where people bring broken items to fix together, sparking conversations about consumption, waste, and sustainability.

Seed Swap & Urban Gardening Session

Combine hands-on environmental action with reflection on food sovereignty, biodiversity, and community resilience.

Intercultural Potluck

Share food, stories, and traditions from different cultures as a starting point for dialogue on identity, belonging, and global citizenship.

Neighbourhood Mapping

Groups map their local area through the lens of sustainability, equity, or accessibility, identifying strengths and gaps.

Online initiatives



Live Instagram or YouTube Q&A

Host a live session with an activist, expert, or changemaker answering questions from people in real time.

Online Quiz or Trivia challenge

A fun, competitive quiz on global development, human rights, climate facts, and sustainable development goals.

Open webinar for all

A publicly accessible online session on a GEW theme, designed to be engaging and accessible regardless of background or expertise.

Digital storytelling challenge

Participants create and share short videos, reels, or photo essays on a GEW theme using a dedicated hashtag.

Virtual reality experience

Use accessible VR tools or 360° videos to immerse participants in realities different from their own: refugee camps, climate-affected regions, or inspiring communities.

Webinar with activists

Invite inspiring speakers from NGOs, grassroots movements, or international organisations to share their work and answer questions live.

Art and exhibitions



Photo exhibition

A curated collection of images exploring GEW themes, exposed in a public space.

Mural Project

Co-create a physical or digital mural representing the community's vision for a just and sustainable future.

Poetry slam

An open mic event where participants perform original poetry on justice, identity, the environment, or human rights.

Photography Walk

Participants explore their neighbourhood with a camera, then gather to reflect on what they captured and why.

Music & activism

Explore how music has historically driven social change, then invite participants to write or perform their own protest songs or anthems.

Future newspaper

Groups design a fictional front page from 2050 imagining a world that achieved or failed the Sustainable Development Goals.
